

Viks Win UVL Meet; 12 Marks Broken

A total of 12 Umpqua Valley League records were smashed and one tied as trackmen from four league schools, led by first place Myrtle Creek, almost completely rewrote the league's track and field record book at Myrtle Creek Wednesday.

The Vikings won the meet by scoring 81½ points to second place Sutherlin's 54½ points. Douglas had 51 for third and Glendale scored 18.

Aside from the record-breaking, in which many mediocre performances from the league's initial track test of a year ago were broken, the meet was highlighted by three outstanding performances Wednesday.

These were a 21.3 low hurdle run by Douglas' Brent Strickland, a javelin throw of 163-7½ by Myrtle Creek's Harold Reubush and a pole vault tie at a first place height of 11-3 by Gregg Bowman of Myrtle Creek and Les Wright of Sutherlin.

Reubush also won firsts in the

discus and shot put to win possession of the individual high scorer rotating trophy. Strickland of Douglas finished with firsts in the low hurdles and the 190-yard dash. No other athlete took more than one blue ribbon.

Although he topped records in both the shot and javelin, strangely enough, Reubush fell 10 feet short of his own discus record set last year. That was the only meet record that was tied or broken.

The one record that was tied was the 220-yard mark of 24.6.

The meet was marked by top performances down through second and third places. Reubush twice went over the 160-foot mark in the javelin and three top placers, all from Myrtle Creek, in the shot, went over 40 feet. The three top men in the broad jump, won by Newton of Douglas, bettered 19 feet.

After reaching the height of 11-3 in the pole vault, both Bowman and Wright, the old record-holder, broke their individual poles. Neither could go any higher with the use of borrowed poles.

A sophomore, Stan Bennett of Myrtle Creek, took third place in the event with a vault of 10-6.

Myrtle Creek won in spite of taking only one running first place, three clear-cut field event firsts and sharing in two others. Douglas led in firsts with six running blue ribbons and one field event first. Sutherlin had one clear-cut first and shared in two others and Glendale shared a first in the high jump.

The 31-year-old Cuban will be kept in the hospital overnight for observation but Dr. Sidney Gaynor, the New York Yankees' physician, said Minoso probably will be able to play in the series with Kansas City starting Friday. The White Sox are idle Thursday.

Minoso was hit on the left cheekbone. At first it was thought he had been struck on the temple.

The Wenatchee Chiefs pounded Lewiston pitching for 20 hits Wednesday night to post their 15th win in 20 starts in Northwest League baseball.

The barrage included a pair of homers by Bob Duretto and a solo round-tripper by Al Zuvella as the Chiefs handed the Bronces their third straight pasting, 12-6.

The win, coupled with Salem's 8-6 triumph over Tri-City, opened Wenatchee's lead to 3½ games. Yakima edged Spokane, 8-7, in the loop's third scheduled game. Eugene was idle.

Lewiston sent three pitchers to the mound to try to muffle the Wenatchee bats. Bob Roberts went the distance for Wenatchee, allowing nine hits including two triples by Ralph Rose which drove in three of Lewiston's runs. Three Lewiston errors helped the Chiefs.

Errors were a major factor in Salem's victory over Tri-City. The Senators got only seven hits but there were eight Tri-City errors and only one Salem run was earned.

Tri-City led 6-5 going into the eighth. Then Ralph Burns walked two Salem batters and hit another to fill the bases. A groundout tied the score and an overthrow at first let in the winning runs.

At Yakima, Herm Lewis homered in the ninth with a man aboard and Spokane absorbed its 15th loss. Chuck Dillard held the Indians hitless until the sixth while his teammates sent five runners over the plate. Dillard weakened and Spokane mixed bases on balls and base hits for two runs apiece in the sixth, seventh and eighth innings and a singleton on the ninth. Then came Lewis' bottom of the ninth homer.

Weekend Anglers Still Need To Be Choosey In Picking Their Streams

PORTLAND (AP)—Oregon anglers still are going to have to pick their waters carefully to have good luck this weekend.

The State Game Commission looking over reports from around the state, said that the weather has continued to have a disturbing effect with few streams stabilized for good fishing.

Some very fine catches have been made in all sections of Oregon—but not in all waters. Many of the areas report poor angling. The report by districts:

Northwest
Angling improving on most north coast streams but upstream fishing is disappointing in Neahcoco, Salmon and Tillamook areas. Tide water angling has been poor to fair. However salmon fishing in Tillamook Bay has improved and there has been some good fishing at Pacific City. Trout fishing in the Sandy River and Clackamas tributaries has been fair to poor. The outlook is only fair on the Yamhill, Tualatin and Scappoose drainages. Detroit Reservoir is fair. Lookout Point Reservoir good to excellent. Dexter good for small trout. Dorena fair to good. Cottage Grove fair to poor. Fern Ridge poor and Triangle Lake fair. McKenzie and Willamette boat fishing has been excellent and the Long Tom below Fern Ridge has been good for cutthroat and rainbow.

Southwest
In Lower Smith River trout angling has been only fair but a few striped bass have been taken. Tenuille Lake has been good and El Lake fair in the mornings. The south fork of the Coos River, only fair recently, is expected to improve by the weekend for trout fishing. Also improving if weather clears and water warms, will be the four forks of the Coquille River. They have been fair and should become good. Coos River striped bass angling has been poor but weekend improvement is expected if there is help from clear, wet weather. Shad fishing in both forks of the Coquille has been good and may become excellent. The Rogue system water is clearing and chinook and trout angling is getting better. The Umpqua system has not been very good and the upper and middle Umpqua area waters do not hold much promise of improvement by the weekend. Fish Lake in Jackson County has been producing many trout over 12 inches.

Central
Smaller streams in the Hood River Valley have been generally good for trout. Odell Lake has given up some small lake trout and the kokanee fishing there has been good. Wickiup Reservoir has been fair during periods of mild weather. The Deschutes above Bend is good. Below Bend to the mouth of the Crooked River it has been fair to good with the water rather low. In the Cove area the Crooked River has been murky but bait fishing has been good. The Metolius has been good for fly fishing and the Deschutes has been low and good. Suttle Lake has been good for kokanee and rainbow. Ochoco Reservoir has been productive on troll and bait.

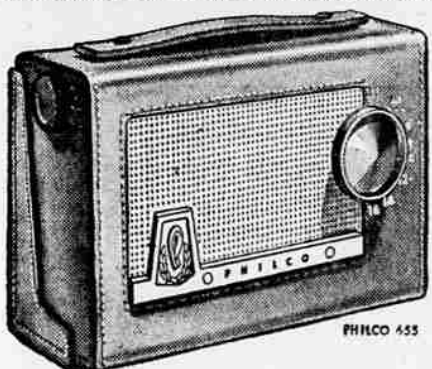
Southeast
Malheur Reservoir is poor. Beulah Reservoir is good. Owyhee Reservoir and river are poor. The Malheur River north fork is good. Big Creek summit and Lake Creek are fair. Small streams in the Steens Mountains have produced excellent rainbow catches. Blitzen River is poor due to high water. In Lake County, Twenty Mile and Drake creeks and other small Camas Creek tributaries have been fair. Improvement is expected in Camas and Deep creeks and Chewaucan River, which have been high and muddy. Ana River and reservoir are fair. Drews and Thompson reservoirs have been poor.

Northeast
Wallowa Lake has been giving limit catches of rainbow from boat and bank. There has been good fishing, with some limit catches, in the Upper Wallowa River, Prairie Creek and Little Sheep Creek. The Innahs and tributaries has been improving. The lower Wallowa remains murky. Some rainbow are being caught in the upper Grande Ronde and tributaries.
