

State Logging Laws Outlined At Meets

More than 175 Douglas County operators and loggers this week were given first-hand interpretation of new and revised state legislation as it affects them.

The occasions were three cooperative meetings held in various portions of the county by the Oregon State Board of Forestry, the Douglas Forest Protective Assn. and the loggers. The sessions were held in Canyonville Tuesday, Roseburg Wednesday and Drain Thursday.

Three main speakers attended each of the dinner meetings. Additionally, the state forest inspector in each particular area spoke to the loggers.

Down from Salem to help interpret legislation were Lee Harter, conservation supervisor for the state board, and Frank Hamilton, district supervisor of state forests. Les Cummings, Roseburg, a re conservation inspector for the state, also appeared at each session.

Special information on "slash disposal" was presented by different speakers. They were: Canyonville, Don Wright; Roseburg, Frank Blizard; and Drain, Gieu Cole.

The programs were introduced by Fred Southwick, district warden of the DFPA.

Enough Vaccine Said Available For Second Shots

PORTLAND (AP)—Enough polio vaccine should be available to enable Oregon to give the second shot to children in the school inoculation program by June 30, the State Board of Health reported Thursday.

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis sent word that there is "every reason to believe sufficient vaccine will be available before the end of June," Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer, said.

He added that the regional federal public health office at San Francisco said the re-checking of vaccine is continuing at full speed in order to make it available as soon as possible.

First shots have been administered in some sections of the state, but most counties will begin giving first shots to the first and second grade pupils in the program next Monday.

Curry County in Southwest Oregon is far ahead of that, though. At Gold Beach 90 students received their second shots Thursday. They got their first shots early in May, before delays in the program were ordered.

Erickson said vaccine will be ordered for the second shots as soon as the number of children participating is determined. He said the national foundation will not accept orders for more vaccine until the number has been determined.

Illinois School Girl Wins Spelling Champion

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sandra (Sandy) Sloss, 13, of Granite City, Ill., is the new national spelling bee champion.

Sandra, an eighth-grader at St. Joseph's School, won over 61 other crack spellers Thursday in one of the most toughly contested of the 28 national spelling bees sponsored by Scripps-Howard Newspapers and other papers.

It took 541 words—116 more than last year—before Sandra finally won over Jean Copeland, 12, of Prescott, Ariz.

After successfully spelling many a tongue-twister, Jean finally stumbled on the comparatively short but unfamiliar word "abacy," which means a place where an abbot lives. She spelled it "ab-boy."

Sandra spelled it correctly and then clinched her victory by managing "crustaceology," which means the study of shellfish.

Prices On Coffee Dropped Again By Big Companies

NEW YORK (AP)—Coffee prices are coming down again.

The two biggest independent distributors of coffee, General Foods Corp. and Standard Brands, reduced wholesale prices Friday and some chain stores said they will pass on the reductions at retail right away.

General Food trimmed the price of Maxwell House regular coffee by four cents a pound at wholesale, dropping it to 88 cents. It cut Kaffee Hag and Sanka by five cents a pound and knocked two cents off the price of the two-ounce jar of instant coffee and proportionately more off larger sizes.

Standard Brands' Chase & Sanborn also was reduced four cents a pound and the company's instant coffee was cut by two cents on the two-ounce size and four cents on the four-ounce jar.

The reductions follow a further decline in quotations of green coffee. Latin American producers have been trying to agree on a way to stabilize green coffee prices, but have not yet been successful.

Freed American Sentenced For Revealing Secrets

BERLIN (AP)—Pvt. William T. Marchuk of Norristown, Pa., held captive in Russia for six years, was sentenced Friday to 12 years in prison for giving U. S. military secrets to the Soviet Union.

The sentence was handed down by an Army court-martial which had also convicted Marchuk of deserting to the Communists in East Berlin in February 1949, when he was drunk. The sentence includes a dishonorable discharge and forfeiture of all pay and allowances.

The 39-year-old soldier was near tears as the sentence was announced by the seven-officer court. His findings are subject to review by higher military authorities.

Marchuk was accused of telling the Russians about the inner workings of his former Army intelligence unit in West Berlin. He was charged also with trying to get better treatment at the Soviet slave labor camp in Vorkuta by associating with secret police informers.

Two American ex-inmates of Vorkuta testified Marchuk acted "pro-Communist" and had said he did not "consider himself a representative of America."

Marchuk pleaded innocent to all charges. He did not take the stand in his own defense.

Abductor Of Girl Friend Apprehended By Police

DETROIT (AP)—State Police reported they took into custody Friday a 6-foot-1 inch, pistol-toting snail who abducted petite 21-year-old June Dallen from the apartment of a girl friend in Detroit Thursday night.

Police said they found Murray Sinuk, 28, and Miss Dallen shortly after 6 a.m. at a motel four miles north of Monroe, Mich. The girl was bruised but otherwise unharmed.

Corporal Must Face Court-Martial Charge

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Cpl. Thomas Bayes Jr., 32, recreation director at Letterman General Hospital, is to stand court-martial on charges of "unnecessarily cooperating" with the Chinese Reds while a prisoner of war in Korea. No date was set.

The U. S. 6th Army announced yesterday that Bayes, a native of Flat Lick, Ky., was charged after an extensive investigation. The corporal—who continues in his present duty—denied the charges.
