control the distribution" of the vaccine in the event black markets or any other unforeseen factor would develop.

Chairman Priest (D-Ten) of the House Commerce Committee announced plans to start hearings Wednesday on Eisenhower's request for \$28 million dollars to assure vaccine shots for children whose families could not afford to pay for them.

In Chicago, a hope "that every child can get the vaccine" was voiced by Mrs. Newton P. Leonard, of Providence, R. I., outgoing president of the national Congress of Parents and Teachers.

In Chicago for the PT's annual convention, Mrs. Leonard told newsmen the organization has "every confidence" in the vaccine program "although it might have been put in operation a bit hastily."

There was added urgency in the situation because of the imminent closing of schools for the summer. If second shots of the vaccine are not given to first and second-grade children by then in the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis' free program, presumably clinics will have to be set up.

## 2 Timber Sales Slated For June

Two more timber sales have been scheduled for the latter part of June by the U. S. Forest Service. Sales will be conducted at 2 p.m. in Room 203 of the Roseburg Post Office building on June 24 and 27.

The June 24 sale involves 23,400,000 board feet on 405 acres in the Butler Butte area 30 miles east of Tiller in the Jackvick Creek drainage. Total appraisal is \$205,503.

Douglas fir and pine of 16,000,000 board feet is appraised at \$11.25 per thousand; 7,400,000 feet of white fir and other species is appraised at \$3.45 per thousand.

The June 27 sale involves 3,700,000 board feet in the Deep Creek area 45 miles east of Roseburg on the Steamboat Creek drainage. Total appraisal value of the timber on 86 acres is \$107,515.

Douglas fir totaling 2,900,000 feet is appraised at \$30.35 per thousand; 400,000 feet of pine is appraised at \$38.85 a thousand; 400,000 feet of hemlock and other species is appraised at \$10.10.

## Oregon's Polio Season Starting Early This Year

PORTLAND — Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer, reported Friday the Oregon polio season seems to be starting somewhat earlier this year.

"But we should not attempt to interpret from one or two weeks' incidence this early in the year what our final total is likely to be," Erickson said.

He reported there had been 41 cases so far in 1955. That is the highest total for a May 20 since 1951 when there were 43. The total number of cases in 1951 was 373.

He said the year of greatest incidence was 1950 when there were 520 cases, 33 of which had been reported through May 20.

## Postal Pay Veto May Receive Split Verdict

WASHINGTON — House Majority Leader McCormack (D-Mass.) said today there is a "good chance" the House will override President Eisenhower's veto of the postal pay hike if it gets a chance.

Eisenhower turned down a compromise 8.6 per cent average pay boost for the half million postal workers Thursday, saying the bill was too expensive and not fair to some groups it would have affected.

The veto comes up for a Senate test tomorrow, and Eisenhower supporters say they've got enough votes to uphold the veto there. If they fail, the bill goes to the House for final action.

McCormack said he supported the 8.6 per cent measure as a compromise, including job reclassification features which the administration asked for.

Justices Harlan and Reed wrote dissenting opinions. Justice Minton joined in Reed's dissent.

Thomas Quinn, a field organizer for the union, by the majority opinion with which Harlan agreed.

Reed wrote a dissenting opinion with Minton joining.

The case of the union leaders had been closely watched because of the First Amendment angle to the appeal.

Both were adjudged in contempt for refusing to answer questions asked by the House Un-American Activities Committee during a 1949 investigation of Communist infiltration into labor unions.

The UE was expelled from the CIO on the ground it was Communist-dominated.

In Emspak's case, the high court said the House committee asked 58 questions concerning the witnesses' associations.

Chief Justice Warren said in the majority opinion:

"It seems clear that answers to the questions might be dangerous because injurious disclosure could result."

If Emspak had revealed knowledge about certain individuals, all of whom had previously been charged with communist affiliations, Warren said, he might well "have furnished a link in the chain of evidence" needed to prosecute Emspak for a federal crime.

Lower courts decided Emspak had failed to invoke the Fifth Amendment in his appearance before the committee. Emspak's appeal insisted that he had done so.

Both Quinn and Emspak also claimed protection of the Constitution's First Amendment.

In Quinn's case, the U. S. Court of Appeals here had ordered a new trial but he appealed to the high tribunal with the contention the appeals court should have directed his acquittal.

Quinn refused to tell the House committee whether he ever had been a member of the Communist Party.

Emspak was sentenced to six months in jail and fined \$500. He has been free on bond pending outcome of his Supreme Court appeal.

## Jailing Of American Priests In China Told

HONG KONG — Three American priests in Red China's Fukien Province were jailed sometime last year, according to a German priest who arrived here Monday.

Father Ludwig Heifeld, 54, of Bochum, who spent 22 months imprisoned in Fochow, said the three priests were in the same prison, but he never was able to see them. He identified them as Fathers Frederick A. Gordon, of Somerset, Ohio; J. G. Joyce, of Clinton, Mass., and J. E. Hyde of Lowell, Mass. They had been under house arrest at least two years before their imprisonment.

Heifeld said other prisoners told him the U. S. priests were imprisoned presumably for alleged spying, but he did not know their sentences.
