MR. AND MRS. LOOMIS TO CELEBRATE 40TH ANNIVERSARY SUNDAY

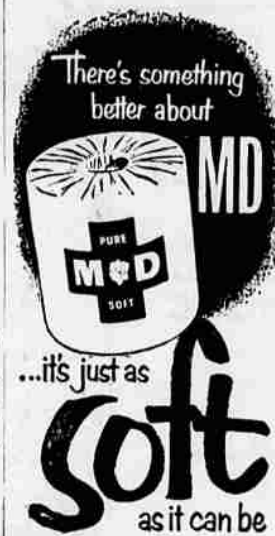

DILLARD SCHOOL SETS PRE-SCHOOL VISIT

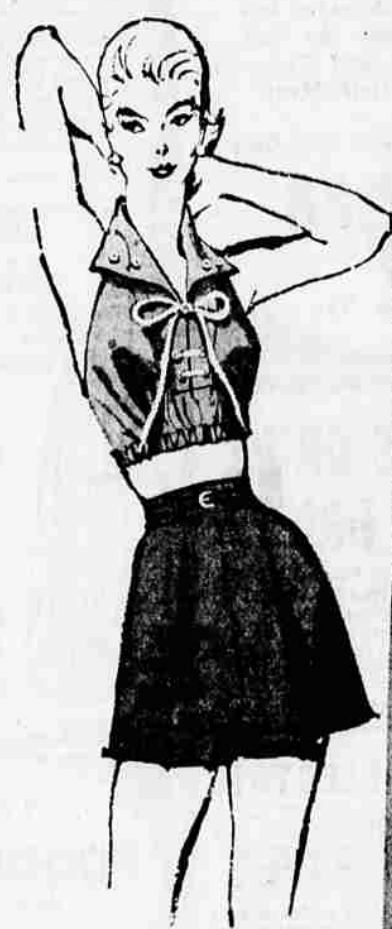

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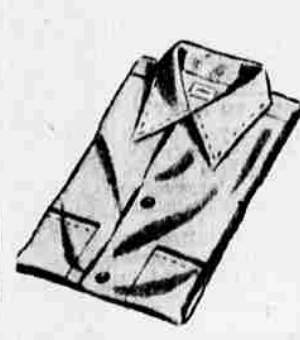

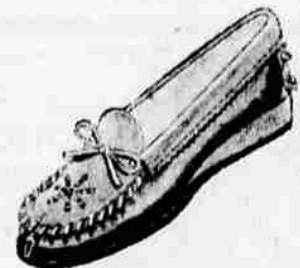
