It took 10 innings but Spokane finally won a Northwest League baseball game.

Chet Sheets singled scoring Joe Porter in the 10th inning Wednesday night and the Indians took a 4-3 decision from Eugene. The win, snapping an eight-game losing streak, was only the sixth of the year for the Indians, against 21 defeats.

Wenatchee showed signs of acting human. The Chiefs, who have made a runaway of the pennant race thus far, dropped their second game in three nights, bowing 7-4 to Yakima.

Tri-City shaded Lewiston, 4-3, in the league's other scheduled game.

While Sheets drove in the winning run, the 250 Spokane fans who saw him do it found a matching

hero in pitcher Pat Treirweiler. Treirweiler allowed Eugene only seven hits and struck out nine. Eugene loaded the bases in the 10th with two away. But Treirweiler fired three straight strikes past Whitey Thomson to end the threat.

At Wenatchee, the visiting Bears scored five runs in the top of the ninth to take a 2-1 lead in the series with Yakima. The Bears tallied twice in the first inning on a pair of walks and Herm Lewis' double. Wenatchee tied it in the fourth and moved ahead with runs in the fifth and seventh. Dennis Luby started the ninth inning rally with a 400-foot homer with a man aboard. The Bears added three for insurance.

Jack Widner spaced four hits in pacing Tri-City to its first win in the Pacific Coast League in 1951-52 and after two years in the service played with Billings, Mont., in the Pioneer League last year.

Mountain Lakes Open Saturday, But Fishermen Face Ice And Snow

PORTLAND — Some Cascade mountain lakes open to fishing Saturday and the Oregon State Game Commission called attention to the fact that at high elevations there is still ice and snow.

The commission in its weekly report of the fishing outlook for the weekend was generally optimistic Thursday as it gave these views, by districts:

Northwest
North coast streams are good and angling fair. Trask River is closed through June 14 from Highway 101 up to a point 200 feet below the hatchery rack. Alsea River has been fair in tide water but Siletz and Siuslaw have been slow for trout. Lakes in the Florence area have been good for trout, perch, catfish and bass.

Lower Willamette tributaries have a favorable outlook. Good fishing can be expected on the McKenzie and tributaries, and the Willamette itself should be fair to good. Fair prospects are seen for the Row, Long Tom and Calapooya rivers. Lookout Point Reservoir continues good and so is Fern Ridge Reservoir for crappies. Dorena and Cottage Grove reservoirs have been fair. Trolling is probably the best bet in Detroit Reservoir, with prospects fair. Most tributaries in that area are still too cold and there has been rolling of Cascade streams from snow runoff. There still are steelhead in the Santiam system.

Southwest
Smith River has been slow for trout fishing but some striped bass have been taken in the lower river.

Albany Favored In Prep Playoff

ALBANY, Ore. — The annual Oregon class A high school baseball tournament was to open here Thursday with the host Albany Bulldogs favored.

The Albany lineup is virtually the same as the one that won the state American Legion title last summer. Albany has a record this spring of seven wins and two losses.

The three-day tournament was to open at 1:30 p. m. with a pair of Portland teams clashing, Cleveland (18-4) vs. Central Catholic (12-4). They were to be followed by Columbia Prep (9-5) of Portland vs. Springfield (12-3) at 3:30 p. m.; Oregon City (10-2) vs. Grants Pass (14-4) at 7 p. m., and Albany vs. The Dalles (16-4) at 9 p. m.

Angling in Tenmile Lake has been fair to good. Sixes, Elks, Chetco and Winchuck rivers have been good for trout fishing but the Coos has ranged from fair to good. Shad angling in the Coos, though, on red headed flies has been good to excellent.

The Coquille River's north, east and middle forks have been fair to good for trout angling while the south fork has been fair on bait and good to excellent on flies.

Lower Rogue salmon angling has been slow. The middle and upper Rogue, though, have been better with chinook angling good and trout angling improving. Umpqua draining rivers have been improving and while trout angling has been slow, if streams continue to fall improvement is in sight.

Central
There is generally good or fair to good angling in streams of the Hood River area. Ice is breaking up on Big Lava Lake and fishermen should be able to use it this weekend. The road is to be plowed to within a mile or closer to the lake. Elk Lake is frozen and East and Paulina lakes are heavily coated while camp grounds are snow-covered. The road into Blue Lake is open and fishing has been excellent. Suttle Lake angling has been very good in mornings and evenings but the camp area there is not accessible.

Opening Saturday are Williamson River, Wood River, and Lake of the Woods as well as lakes in the Rogue River National Forest. Klamath River closes June 2.

Klamath area fishing has been good with limits taken on the Klamath River, Upper Klamath Lake has been fair and some fish have been taken at Gerber Reservoir. Most of the streams are low and good and roads are open.

Northeast
Rains have made streams murky. Although McKav reservoir is a little muddy, catches have been good. Some higher Willowa County streams are fairly clear. The Willowa River has produced some fair catches and so has Little Sheep Creek. Blueback and rainbow limits have been taken on troll in Willowa Lake.

Southeast
In Lake County the upper section of Silver Creek's west fork has been excellent for small Eastern brook trout. Lower Silver Creek has been fair for rainbow. Ana Reservoir and river are fair. Deep Creek still is high but Camas Creek is improving. Crooked Creek is fair. Drews Reservoir is poor. In Harney County most streams are clearing and should improve.

PCC Officials Mull Violations

PORTLAND — Pacific Coast Conference officials continued Thursday to mull over reported violations of conference rules against recruiting athletes.

Any action taken is expected to be announced at the close of the annual spring meeting Thursday evening.

The faculty representatives who make up the ruling body of the conference apparently spent most of Wednesday on reported violations. They announced action on only one.

That dealt with the case of half-back Ronnie Knox, who enrolled at California, then later transferred to UCLA. The conference ordered California to divorce itself from the Southern Seas Club of Los Angeles, a University of California booster club accused of hiring Knox's father at a \$400 monthly salary to recruit athletes.

The conference said no blame was to be attached to California, UCLA or to half-back Knox.

Commissioner Victor Schmidt also said officials had decided to delay until the winter meeting any action on basketball schedules. He said basketball coaches apparently had met difficulties in trying to change next year's schedule to a home-and-home round-robin.

That apparently means the schedule will go on as planned with each team meeting half the opponents at home, the other half on the road.

Schmidt also said the conference henceforth will allow its football and basketball teams to play in Hawaii under the auspices of the University of Hawaii.

Such games will not count against the conference limit of 26 basketball games in one season, 10 football games.

New Year's Day football games will be ruled out, however, by another conference rule forbidding games after the second Saturday following the last Saturday in November.

The annual Rose Bowl game is an exception to the rule banning New Year's Day football.

University of Florida baseball coach Dave Fuller was a three-sport star at Wake Forest. He played baseball, basketball and football.
