First Annual Public Garden Tour Enjoyed

Well over 100 residents of Roseburg and surrounding areas were highly elated over their visits to the seven beautiful gardens open to the public last Sunday. This first tour of its kind in the area was another one of the "firsts" recorded in the activities of the Roseburg Woman's Club, which sponsored it and will make it one of its annual projects.

Of special interest to those enjoying the beauty of the day, were the gorgeous display of rhododendrons and azaleas and the attractive outdoor living area, and also the rose planting, at the Kenneth Ford gardens; the informal garden featuring lilacs, mountain ash, and other flowering shrubs, of Mrs. Ira Riddle; the lush roof cover for protection of shade-loving plants and summer gardening, particularly fuchsias and tuberous begonias, and special methods for displaying them, such as hanging containers, etc., at the Bruce Elliott home; native dogwood, red-bud, the blended array of yellow to deep orange of the Hollis azaleas, the massive and colorful display of the terrace planting of evergreen azaleas interspersed with other plantings, and the brilliant cerise red tree peony, at the W. F. Chapman gardens; the varied display of blooming shrubs and interesting plantings, the wisteria tree and greenhouse, at the Noble Goetts; the intriguing design and wide variety of plants and tree (a haven for the botanist) at Rosa B. Parrott's estate; and again the brilliance of azaleas and peonies, feathery hedge of spirea and rainbow-hued iris at the Frederick J. Porter home, along with the prospect of Lotus Porter of growing thousands of azaleas from cuttings.

The climax of the tour was the gorgeous array of floral arrangements at the clubhouse, where refreshments were served from a beautifully decorated table. Mrs. Horace Berg arranged the room
