Johann Sebastian Bach's great Magnificat in D, presented Sunday evening at 5 o'clock in combined strength of the First Christian Church Choir and the Roseburg Symphony Group, proved a stunning success. More than 500 music loving people crowded into the church auditorium to hear this old master's exciting work.

The augmented choir of some 40 voices sang with precision. They effected good attacks and releases and managed all the dynamic contrasts and shadings called for in a work of such complicated structure. The contrapuntal delineations were well defined in each of the five choral voices, of which this work is composed. The basses were vigorous, at times they

lacked a fine sense of pulsation and tempi. The infrequent hesitation in forte voice of the two upper parts was due to lack of numbers as a result of illness, but which was more than compensated for in individual enthusiasm.

Glenn Leuning, tenor, carried the difficult, "He hath put down the mighty" with verve and spirit. The violins supported him in brilliant fashion.

The vibrant, "For He Hath Regarded," delivered by soprano Patricia Dishman showed fine intonation and vocal support, presented in a relaxed and meaningful manner. This exceptional voice played a contrapuntal game with the skillful William Jelski and his oboe, the both supported by organ and
