Funeral services are scheduled Thursday at 2 p. m. in the Elkhorn High School gymnasium for Lloyd Ellsworth Dement, lifelong resident of Oregon.

Dement, 53, died Sunday at a Roseburg hospital. He was born May 23, 1902, in Myrtle Point. He lived at Elkhorn at the time of his death and had been a truck driver for Bob Baimbridge Logging Co. He was a former resident of Myrtle Creek and a member of the First Methodist Church there.

The Rev. Phillip Ryan will conduct services and the Roseburg Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements. Vault interment will follow in the Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

7 Fliers Killed As Air Force C47 Crashes, Burns

ALAMOGORDO, N.M. — A twin-engine Air Force C47, its engines apparently stalled over the rugged Sacramento Mountains, crashed and burned Monday in La Luz Canyon, killing the seven men aboard.

The plane had taken off from Holloman Air Force Base 15 minutes earlier after refueling and picking up freight on the last leg of its journey home to Clovis Air Force Base, N.M. It was on a return trip from Burbank, Calif.

The crash scene was 15 to 20 miles north of here.

Air Force spokesmen at Holloman said the plane sent no distress signals. The victims were Maj. Edward A. Miller, Clovis; Lt. Don L. Forbes, listed as pilot, Portland, Ore.; Lt. Robert D. Haugan, Chicago; Lt. Clyde B. Johnson, Benson, N.C.; T. Sgt. Leamon Lawson, Clovis; A.2.C. Lester M. Barnes, Maywood, Calif.; and A. 2. C. Charles A. Deaton, Commiskey, Ind.

Young Glide Girl Injures Shoulder

A young glide girl is recuperating at home today after a fall Friday which resulted in a fractured left shoulder.

She is Kathleen Barclay, 5-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Barclay. She has been released from Douglas Community Hospital complete with a cast which covers her arm and reaches to her waist.

Correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby reports the girl's parents have been told she must wear the cast for three weeks before another cast will replace it allowing her to drop the arm to her side.

According to Mrs. Selby, the young girl was with her parents with a group of neighbors picnicking at Baker Park on the North Umpqua. It was reported she was sitting on a log when she lost her balance. She tumbled over backwards and fell down a bank, striking a rock.

Neuberger Critical Of Report On Dam

WASHINGTON — Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said Monday a chamber of commerce report on Hells Canyon dam was a bit more than 100 million dollars too high in its estimate of the cost of the federal project.

Neuberger said the report is "riddled with deliberate distortions."

It was issued Sunday by the Council of State Chambers of Commerce, a research group representing 31 state and regional chambers. It labeled the proposed federal dam at Hells Canyon an "unnecessary burden on taxpayers."

The council said the dam would cost more than 465 million dollars, or more than \$9 for each taxpayer in the nation. Neuberger said the Federal Bureau of Reclamation's engineers have estimated the cost at 345 million.

Neuberger is one of 30 senators cosponsoring Hells Canyon legislation. Authorization bills are before House and Senate Committees.

Sidekick Of Al Capone Dies Of Heart Attack

MIAMI, Fla. — Louis (Little New York) Campagna, a sidekick of the late Al Capone, died Monday of a heart attack.

He was stricken while battling to land a large fish. He was removed from the boat by Coast Guard helicopter but died shortly after reaching a hospital.

Campagna, 57, was one of the notorious Capone gang during the 1930s. In 1943 he drew 19 years in prison on conviction of conspiracy to extort a million dollars from movie executives. He served one third of the sentence in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta and was paroled.

He was found Monday afternoon, walking toward his parent's cabin six miles from here. The youth had been missing about 20 hours.

CLOVERDALE, Calif. — A 38-year-old divorcee and her 8-year-old twins were shot from an automobile Monday while picking cherries at her summer cabin.

Sheriff's deputies sought her former husband, Grady C. Hayes, 60, a San Francisco real estate man who was reported seen fleeing from the area.

The woman, Mrs. Ernestine McLorin, 38, was reported in serious condition at Healdsburg Hospital with bullet wounds in her thigh and abdomen.

Her children, Wilhelmina and Daniel, were less seriously wounded. A bullet hit the girl in the neck and dug into her shoulder, and the boy had a 7 inch crease across his back.

Sheriff's deputies said a friend heard a volley of rifle shots and saw Hayes flee to a car. They said the shots were from a .40-06 rifle with a telescope sight.

Man Accused Of Beating Wife To Death With Rock

VALE — Rodney C. Sheran, accused of bludgeoning his wife to death on a mountainside near San Rafael, Calif., was to be returned home by California authorities Tuesday.

Sheran, 35, a construction contractor, was arrested by Oregon state police at nearby Juntra Saturday night, three days after the body of his wife, Esme Sheran, was found. She apparently had been beaten to death with a stone.

Officers said Sheran told them he could not remember events of the past few days.

Decision On Indictment Of Mrs. Smith Expected

PORTLAND — A decision is expected Tuesday or Wednesday on a motion that a first degree murder indictment against Mrs. Kermik Smith be dropped.

Smith and Victor Laurence Wolf are accused of first degree murder in the bomb slaying of Mrs. Smith's husband.

Wolf has pleaded guilty to the charge. He said Mrs. Smith thought up the bomb plot and he wired Smith's car so it would explode when Smith turned on the ignition.

Mrs. Smith has denied this and her attorneys last Saturday asked Circuit Judge James W. Crawford to set aside the indictment against their client.

'Pass The Ammunition' Preacher Has Retired

PLUCKEMIN, N.J. — The Rev. Howell M. Forgy, whose phrase "Pass the Lord and pass the ammunition" became a famous World War II battle slogan, plans to resume a writing career now that he has resigned as an active preacher.

Memorial Day marked the formal end of the preaching career of the Presbyterian minister who coined the inspiring words during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941.

Monday night Sischo showed up. He explained that during the race he ran out of gas in an isolated section and was picked up by two uranium prospectors who were just starting out for the weekend.

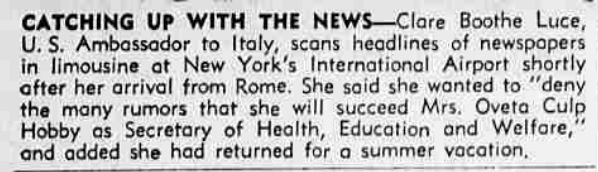
He had to either go along with the prospectors or hike a many miles back to civilization. He prospect.

Unprecedented Snowfall Stalls Hood Motorists

GOVERNMENT CAMP — Some 2,000 cars were stalled in a mammoth traffic jam on the snow covered Warm Springs Highway east of here Monday.

Five and one half inches of snow fell in the area, on the southwest shoulder of Mt. Hood, coming down at the rate of 1 to 2 inches an hour.

Motorists, many of them fishermen returning from Memorial Day weekend trips, skidded in the soft snow blocking the road and causing other cars to stall.

Tow cars worked until midnight pulling cars back onto the road. Some motorists were delayed five to six hours.

The Portland Weather Bureau said such a snowfall was unusual in this area at this time of year—the last one on Memorial Day being in 1948.

Spectacular Fire Burns Foam Latex Co. Plant

PORTLAND — A spectacular fire in the northwest Portland business district did an estimated \$40,000 damage.

The four-story Western Foam Latex Co. plant was burned to a shell. A supply of foam rubber inside, valued at \$7,500, was destroyed.

For a time fire threatened adjoining buildings in the block. Cause of the fire, discovered at about 3 p. m., was not immediately determined.

HONOULULU — Film actress Debbie Reynolds says there is no truth to reports her romance with Eddie Fisher is ended. She blamed Hollywood columnist Sheila Graham for what she termed "this rumor."

"She must have to make news," said the actress, who arrived today after a tour of military bases in the Far East.

"It's such a awfully unkind. I am very hurt."

"Eddie and I are very much in love," she said in a telephone interview.

"It's tough enough to live a normal life. I'm so upset. It isn't true. I don't know why Sheila did it."

Asked if she and Fisher had set a date for the wedding, she replied: "We don't have a date planned. We had figured on June 17, but Eddie has a show that will run into July, and when I get back, I will start shooting a new picture. But that (the wedding date) is no problem."

Russian Claims Soviets Haven't Exploded A-Bomb

TOKYO — A Russian radiology specialist implied Tuesday the Soviet Union had never exploded an atom bomb.

Prof. Anna V. Kozlova of the Moscow Radiology Institute said in an interview: "Russian atomic tests have been conducted within laboratories so no one will get hurt."

Asked for clarification she would only say "the Russian atomic tests are not necessarily nuclear explosions."

She remained silent when questioned about Moscow announcements on Russia's nuclear weapons progress.

These have included: Aug. 19, 1953—Pravda announced explosion of a hydrogen bomb.

Sept. 17, 1953—Russia announced it had successfully tested "new type" atomic bombs.

Sept. 16, 1954—Russia announced it had exploded another atomic weapon "to study its battle effects."

Feb. 8, 1955—Foreign Minister Molotov told the Supreme Soviet Parliament that the Soviet Union has developed hydrogen bombs "with such success that the United States could appear backward."

Prof. Kozlova is attending the 10-nation radiation conference that opened here Monday. No U.S. specialists are attending, although invited.

The Russian scientist professed ignorance of the cause of radioactive rains that have fallen on Japan both after United States and apparent Russian atomic explosions.

Fire Destroys Alaska's Communications Barracks

FAIRBANKS, Alaska — Fire blamed on a defective electrical circuit destroyed the Alaska Communications System barracks at Big Delta Monday and took the lives of four of the seven soldiers who were in it.

The others were burned as they fought their way to safety. Names of the dead and injured were withheld pending notification of next of kin.

The fire broke out about 6 a. m. while the men were sleeping. It was controlled after a four-hour battle. Damage was estimated at \$75,000.
