

Ford Declines Invite To Contract Talks

DETROIT (AP) — Henry Ford II here has declined Walter Reuther's invitation to join the strike-threatening contract talks between the Ford Motor Co. and Reuther's CIO United Auto Workers.

At the same time Ford, company president, said it would be an "unforgivable error" if the

140,000 Ford employees were not given an opportunity to learn all details of what he called the "prosperity partnership package" offer.

The offer included an opportunity for Ford workers to buy company stock at half price, interest-free loans during layoff periods, some wage boosts and other benefits. The UAW called the offer "phony" and rejected it shortly after it was placed on the bargaining table Thursday.

House Approves Federal Funds For Irrigation

WASHINGTON (AP) — A 100-million-dollar program of federal financing for small irrigation projects in all states was approved by the House here.

The legislation now goes to the Senate where a similar plan, applicable to only the 17 Western reclamation states, was snatched in a legislative jam last year.

The House-passed bill would authorize interest-free federal loans to states and local public agencies to build water supply projects costing up to 10 million dollars. Federal loans, however, would be limited to 5 million dollars for any one project.

In extending the program to all states and the territories of Hawaii and Alaska, the House voted to give jurisdiction of the program in 32 states to the Agriculture Department. The authority to make loans for approved projects in the remaining 16 Western states covered by reclamation was assigned to the Interior Department.

The heads of the two departments would be authorized to advance funds for qualified projects determined to have engineering feasibility and financial capacity to repay the federal loan in 30 years or less.

No interest would be charged on funds devoted to the development of irrigation water supplies, but interest would be assessed against money spent for municipal water or power.

Paroled Convict Kills Officer, Takes Own Life

ALTURAS, Calif. (AP) — Herbert Petty, a paroled Oregon convict, killed himself by firing a pistol bullet into his head shortly after he had shot and killed a California highway patrolman Friday.

The patrolman, James E. Maroney, 33, was killed by a rifle bullet in the heart. The bullet had pierced a power pole behind which Maroney had taken cover in a gun fight with Petty.

Officers said Petty was paroled last June from the Oregon State Prison where he was sent in 1948 from Yamhill County on conviction of a rape charge brought by Mrs. Dick Waite.

Petty appeared at the Waite home Friday morning armed with a pistol and a rifle. Mrs. Waite managed to get away and fled to the ranch of Masten Ramsey, 14 miles south of Alturas, from where she telephoned police.

Officers went to the Waite home where they found Petty. He fled into the sagebrush and in an exchange of shots Maroney was killed. Later Petty was found dead from the pistol bullet which he had fired into his head.

Injecting Partisan Politics Marred Recent Legislature, Chapman Tells Portlanders

PORTLAND (AP) — C. C. Chapman, veteran editor of the Oregon Voter, maintains that Oregon's legislators marred the recent session by injecting partisan politics, but still did well in view of archaic methods.

The Legislature uses "horse and buggy methods in an atomic age," Chapman said in presenting his biennial report to the Portland City Club. He said he saw hope, though, in the Emergency Board giving the state something approaching a commission form of government.

"Something like this must come," he said.

With just a little more power, the Emergency Board could act effectively and the Legislature would serve, in effect, as a board of review, he said.

The Emergency Board should be non-partisan, he added. From that he spoke critically of partisan displays in the recent session. The Democrats misbehaved by being partisan, he said, and the Republicans were even worse.

He spoke critically, too, of the practice of the Ways and Means Committee sending memorandums to state agencies, directing them to do certain things. This he said, is virtual law to the agencies and

the Legislature never has a chance to speak on the matter.

One such memorandum, he said, was "disgraceful." This directed the State Board of Higher Education to cut in half the number of scholarships given non-resident students. He said Sen. Gene Brown of Grants Pass defended this as giving proper preference to taxpayers. But, said Chapman, this view is "very narrow, provincial."

Chapman said the income tax law was probably the best possible under the circumstances, but he said it is "only a matter of time" until there is a state sales tax.

He lauded Sen. Phil Lowry, Medford Republican, as the best first-term senator in recent years and predicted he would be Senate president in 1960.

Senate Passes Measure To Acquire Access Roads

WASHINGTON (AP) — Legislation authorizing the federal government to acquire timber access roads adjacent to the Oregon and California Railroad and Coos Bay Wagon Road grant lands in Oregon was passed by the Senate Thursday.

The bill, which now goes to the House, also extends the authority of the Interior Department to acquire such roads from the present yearly basis to five years.

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
