

Portland Walker Cup Golfer Advances In British Contest

ST. ANNES, England — Dale Morey and Jimmy McHale, a pair of steady oldsters, and young Bruce Cudd and Don Bisplinghoff showed the way into the third round of the British Amateur Golf Championship Tuesday as Walker Cup captain Bill Campbell and a flock of other American were knocked out.

Campbell, runner up to Australia's Doug Bachli for the British title a year ago, was the principal casualty as the first round matches were completed and the second round begun.

The tall American captain from Huntington, W. Va., playing his first match in Britain this year, fell before an unknown English schoolmaster, Reginald Pattinson, 2 and 1. It was one of the late first round matches that saw seven Americans advance.

Morey, oldest member of the 1955 U.S. Walker Cup team, and McHale, a former Walker cupper, were the American "name" players who reached the third round in the upper half of the draw. Second round matches in the lower half won't be played until Wednesday.

Morey barely squeaked past Frank Morrell, a little known Blackpool golfer, one up. The long-hitting McHale routed Dr. J. H.F. Thomas of England, 7 and 6.

Cudd, 21-year-old "baby" of the U.S. Walker Cup team from Portland, Ore., turned back Sir John Hartopp of Scotland, 3 and 1, and the 20-year-old Bisplinghoff of Orlando, Fla., whipped Patrick Campbell of Scotland, 6 and 5.

Advancing with them into the third round were the three little-known Americans, Joe Bullins Jr., of Winston-Salem, N.C., James K. Bernard Jr., of Westboro, Mass., and Harold Ridgley of Havertown, Pa. Bullins and Ridgley are American servicemen stationed in Europe.

Cudd, playing fine golf here under perfect weather conditions, was one down at the turn after Hartopp sank a 20-foot putt for a birdie two on the ninth. But the Oregon youngster bounced back and ended the match at the 17th with a mighty iron shot from the rough.

Ireland's Joe Carr, top favorite in this country, turned back Alan Thirlwell, the English champion, 2 and 1, to go into the third round. He had a first round bye.

Last Year's Baseball Hero Bemoans Slump At Plate

NEW YORK — "I'm just lousy. What else is there to say?" That was Dusty Rhodes, the toast of New York last year, speaking today as he reflected on his paltry .130 batting average.

Pinch hitter extraordinary, clutch hitter superb, the terror of enemy pitchers. That was the role the New York Giants outfielder played last year as he cut a swath through the National League.

This time around he has been a bust as a pinch hitter — 1 for 16 for an .059 average. His over-all mark isn't much better — 7 for 54, including a horsecollar in three tries against Herman Wehmeier. The Giants won the game 2-1 with no help from Rhodes.

"I have no excuses," he said gloomily. "I'm terrible."

But he said there is a slight ray of hope. He's had one comparable batting slump in his career. That was in 1948 with Springfield of the Three-I League. He was sputtering along at a .220 clip in July but finally finished up operations with a .304 mark.

"Down there, I played every day and that helped me work it out," he said. "But then I played every day because they didn't have anyone else."

"I'm trying to do everything the same way I did last year. Johnny Mize (batting coach) said he thought he spotted something the other day. He said I'm striding wrong, picking up the right foot instead of sliding it along the ground into the pitch."

"If I'm doing 900 things wrong now, I was doing 900 things wrong a year ago and I had a pretty good season then."

That he did.

He clouted .356 as a pinch hitter (16 for 45) and climaxed it with a .667 mark, including two home runs — in the four-straight World Series sweep over the Cleveland Indians.

"It's too late to change my swing now," continued Rhodes. "So I'm going to stick with it. Everyone is trying to snap me out of it. Even our batboy has a few theories of his own."

Eugene squeezed past its Oregon neighbor, Salem, into second place in the Northwest Baseball League last Monday night while Wenatchee was adding another half game to its league lead.

The runner-up shuffle came as Eugene scored a 7 to 3 victory over Tri-City while the front-running Wenatchee Chiefs were downing Salem 5 to 2.

Salem, which had been 4 1/2 games behind the leader dropped to 5 1/2 notch. Eugene's victory pulled it to within 3 games of the top.

In the night's other league contest, Lewiston beat Yakima 6-1 on the strength of Ross Rugne's four-hk pitching and a pair of home runs by Gabby Williams, good for four runs. Rugne took the mound shortly after he checked in from Sacramento's Pacific Coast League club and struck out nine in winning in his debut into the class B circuit.

Wenatchee took a one-game edge in its series with Salem by breaking a 2-2 deadlock with three runs in the last two innings. Salem had taken an early 2-0 lead with three hits for a second inning tally and Jack Dunn's triple and a sacrifice fly for another in the third.

Wenatchee tied it on a walk and two singles in the fourth. The decisive run came in the eighth when Dick Watson doubled and later scored on a sacrifice fly. Two bonus runs came in the ninth on a walk and two errors by shortstop Gene Tansell.

Gets 11 Hits
Eugene cashed in on 11 hits and three Tri-City errors for its third straight win over the Braves. The winners broke a 3-3 deadlock with four runs in the last three innings. Tri-City took an early 2-0 lead, but Eugene went ahead 3-2 in the fifth on a hit batter, an error, a walk and two singles.

Outfielder Ted Hesse added an eighth inning run for Eugene with a 365-foot home run. Hal Tosso hit safely in three times up for the winners and outfielder Manuel Romero got three for five.
