District Judge Elmer Adams said he was unable to justify sentencing the giggling, gurgling widow to death in the electric chair.

Contract Let To Build Timber Access Road

P. W. Hamer and Associates has been awarded a contract to build the Ragged Ridge timber sale access road for the Martin Bros. Box Co. of Oakland. The 8½-mile construction will start at Steamboat-Singh Creek bridge and extend to Ragged Ridge. The cost will be approximately \$300,000, according to District Forest Ranger George Williams of the Steamboat district.

Ranger Williams also stated the sale of timber in the area to Martin Bros. Co. amounted roughly to one million dollars. The timber is located in the divide between Steamboat Creek and the North Umpqua River, reports Mrs. Arthur Selby, correspondent.

Before Hamer can start the access road, he must complete construction of 7 miles of the Steamboat Creek road above Johnson cabin and three bridges on that road. So far, the company has completed the clearing only, according to Ranger Williams.

Formula For Improved Egg Production Discussed

he continued, makes 'the yolk darker. Eggs, like a human being, absorb odors. The shells are very porous.

Loving care of the fragile products includes gathering three times daily from nests, advised twice-weekly marketing. Even this may not get the product to the consumer before a month as passed, Bension said.

Stored eggs however, can retain original high quality. The speakers stressed refrigeration at temperatures of 50-60 degrees with a humidity of some 85 per cent. Low humidity will push the egg grade down, they said.

Eggs, Bension said, can be cared for in a manner similar to meat. They'll keep well in a refrigerator; best in a humidifier.

Poultrymen present questioned the experts about the merits and flaws of washing eggs prior to sale. Neither men favored it. Both said contamination from bacteria could result. Fisher termed it "dynamic from my own standpoint." Best way to wash, they added, was using water directly from the tap "ensuring a continuous fresh source."

Colored and black and white slides illustrating various grades of candling and good and bad marketing displays rounded out the evening's fare. The poultry specialists were introduced by Wayne Mosher, assistant county extension agent.

Judge Studies Flagrant Overload Log Truck Case

One of the most flagrant overload cases in recent months was under study by Justice of the Peace Ward Watson at Sutherlin today.

Richard G. Brown, Sutherlin, was cited Wednesday by state weighmasters Jack May and Dolph Boyer.

Brown's load of logs totalled 100,700 pounds, with the permissible maximum being 76,000. Under the law, a maximum fine of 5 cents per pound is possible on the amount beyond the limit. Judge Watson took the case under advisement.

Announcement of the opening of the 3,000-acre public guest ranch was made April 1 by the late Andrew Weber. Completion date then had been set around June 1. His untimely death May 5, after he had accidentally shot himself, halted work on the ranch.

Mrs. Weber said Wednesday she did not know if work on the ranch would be completed.

Original plans had included a nine-hole public golf course, outdoor swimming pool, tennis courts, lodge to house 50 guests, rifle range, archery range and many other features.
