

Worker Faces Charge Of Wounding Brother

The brother, Pete, 31, was shot three times. He was taken to a Walla Walla hospital where his condition was described as serious.

Roybal turned himself in to Toppenish, Wash., police Monday. He said he had heard a radio report that he was wanted.

Police Chief Earl Phillips said Roybal told him that he didn't remember much about the fight. It was "just one big drunken brawl and something happened, so I came home," Phillips quoted Roybal as saying.

Blackfoots Take Kin Of Ex-Foe Into Tribe

CUT BANK, Mont. — All is forgiven and the Blackfoot Indians, who had a little shooting scrape with Capt. Meriwether Lewis about 150 years back, have even taken one of his kin into the tribe.

Meriwether Lewis, a 17-year-old Parkland, Wash. high school student and a nephew — seven generations removed — of the great Northwest explorer, was adopted by the tribe in a weekend ceremonial here.

Time, it seems, is a great healer but Dr. Bert Hansen, history professor at Montana State College, said Capt. Lewis' bout with the Blackfoots amounted to only "one small battle" near Cut Bank, anyway.

Young Lewis has been touring Montana in connection with the Lewis and Clark sesquicentennial observance of the expedition. He will take part in the June 11 and 12 flight over the pioneer route from Missoula, Mont. to Astoria, Ore.

Wholesale Food Prices Dips To New Low Point

NEW YORK — Data & Bradstreet's index of wholesale food prices dipped this week to the lowest point in more than two years.

The index registered 32.33 compared with 36.34 a week ago and 37.38 a year ago. This week's figure was the lowest since April 7, 1933, when it was 32.32.

The index represents the total cost at wholesale of one pound each of 31 foods in general use. Foods going up in price this week included rye, bellies, lard, peanuts, eggs, rice, and hogs. Lower were flour, wheat, corn, oats, barley, beef, butter, coffee, and steers.

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
