Truckers And Industry Resume Negotiations

LOS ANGELES — Union and industry officials resumed negotiations Friday in the hope for a quick settlement to the tieup which has idled most of the West's for-hire truck industry for 15 days.

Federal conciliator John Penton said Thursday that he was "hopeful" that a settlement will be reached by the weekend. He met separately with both sides to lay the groundwork for Friday's session.

Railway freight terminals, harbor docks and auto assembly plants have been glutted with cargoes and completed products because of the strike and industry shutdown.

Portland Area Remains Without Fresh Milk

PORTLAND — The Portland area remained without fresh milk Friday. No settlement of a dispute between milk plant operators and their AFL employees appeared in the office.

AFL drivers struck one plant two days ago in a dispute over work schedules, and the 10 other major plants at once shut down, announcing a strike against one was a strike against all.

The drivers charged a lock-out and voted Thursday night not to go back to work at 10 plants unless they get paid for all lost time.

Winston Budget Defeat Poses Problem To City

The turndown of the proposed Winston city budget Wednesday by the narrow margin of 10 votes cast some large problems before that city's council and budget board.

Voter turnout was small, 35 "no" votes, 45 "yes" ballots. The budget totaled \$99,908.40. Of the sum \$12,323.72 was outside the 6 per cent limitation.

The \$12,000 plus figure was to have been spent for a full-time law enforcement officer (and necessary office equipment) in the city and a full time city recorder.

Mayor Frank True said Thursday he planned to call in council and budget board members before the regular council meeting scheduled for Tuesday at 8 p. m. "We'll go over the budget and cut it down," he said, but the mayor wondered how the city could offer desired services without necessary finances.

Lions Club Hears Report On Budget

Roseburg's proposed new city budget would actually be less than that for the current year, except for a \$7,000 item for purchase of a park area from the Veterans Administration hospital.

This was emphasized by a delegation from the city council speaking at the Roseburg Lions Club Thursday night. Mayor Ernest Barker, City Manager George Farrell and Councilmen George Luoma and Sid Moon each spoke briefly on various phases of the proposed new budget. An election on a special levy of \$125,820.27 outside the 6 per cent limitation is scheduled next Wednesday, June 8.

The panel pointed out that through economical administration added services have been made possible with a reduced budget. Added assessed valuations within the city may keep the millage rate comparable to that for the current year.
