Credit for many striking black-and-white pictures can be given to transparent colored discs known as filters.

Used over the lens, their purpose is to alter the shades of gray that various colors produce on film. Colors similar in hue to that of the filter are really passed, and, therefore, appear lighter in the picture. Conversely, complementary colors are held back, and reproduced darker.

A set of three filters is sufficient for most work: medium yellow, green, and red. Clouds and a blue sky registers in dramatic black and white contrast with a red filter, while flesh tones take on a whitish appearance. Flesh tones are best rendered by the green filter. With it, grass and foliage assume a light, sparkling quality, and clouds show up well against a gray sky.

The yellow filter is actually a mixture of spectral red and green, and it lightens these colors as well as yellow. This filter is also useful for showing clouds. It lightens flesh tones slightly.

In these examples, use of a panchromatic film is assumed. Only yellow filters should be used with ortho films.

All filters require an increase in exposure. For adjustable cameras, this can be determined from instructions given by the film manufacturer. With box-type cameras, a yellow filter will work successfully if a fast pan film is used to make up its slight exposure loss.
