Violence Threat Cries Into Britain's Strikes

LONDON (AP)—A threat of violence erupted in Britain's crippling seven-day-old rail strike Saturday. With thousands already jobless, settlement efforts bogged down and a seamen's wildcat strike tied up the New York-bound Mauretania at Southampton.

A few more trains operated in the 24 hours ending Saturday morning in response to peace appeals by government and trade union leaders.

But at Stockport, members of the non-striking National Union of Railwaymen (NUR) complained that striking union men had come to their homes and threatened them if they continued to man the trains.

In childhood, malnutrition and lowered vitality are often the result of physical defects which may very well be righted. Work with malnourished children and adults has demonstrated the frequent occurrence of remediable defects that may be located and treated, since they may not only lead to more serious conditions, but their influence upon the body as a whole makes it impossible for the individual to attain his optimum condition of health.

The way the body is used may be as important as the structure of the body itself. By this is meant the more habitual postures in which it is held or carried. The body should be carried so that the center of gravity is well balanced, an erect posture is maintained without undue effort, and muscles are not kept under stress or strain. In action, the posture should be one that allows efficient performance of muscular work and minimum of fatigue.

Although authorities now allow more leeway in what is considered good postural position, they agree that, for any given individual, the ideal posture should be one that makes for at least moderately good appearance, freedom of action, lack of strain on muscles, ligaments and joints, and proper functioning of the internal organs.

Bad posture may put certain parts of the body under strain or cramp them in such a way that

Reuther Proposes Wage Guarantee Arbitration

UAW president Walter P. Reuther to company president Henry Ford II.

Meantime full details of General Motors' original offer to the union, bettering in two instances the reported Ford offer, were disclosed in a union statement.

GM declined to comment on the UAW report.

The GM offer, like that of Ford, included a plan which would have given employees stock purchase bargains.

But GM offered more than Ford on pensions and on the annual improvement factor.

The corporation's counter-offer to the union demands was made May 17. The text was telegraphed to 200 local union leaders throughout the country May 26 by John Livingston, UAW vice president and head of the union's GM department.

In its original offer, GM said it would pay \$2.25 a month toward employee pensions for each year of service. Ford has offered \$2. The union demanded \$2.50. Both Ford and GM now pay \$1.75.

GM also offered an annual improvement factor of six cents an hour or 2 1/2 per cent, whichever was greater. It now has five cents. Ford has offered five to eight cents.

Meantime, the UAW-CIO worked to combine the best gains won from both Ford and GM.

Dr. Robert Roth Takes Over Glendale Practice

Dr. Robert Roth has taken over the Glendale osteopathic practice of Dr. Howard M. Ferguson, reports correspondent Mrs. G. B. Fox.

Ferguson sold the practice to Dr. Roth, who has been an associate. Ferguson announced he was married June 5 to Patricia McDowell, head nurse at St. Helena Sanitarium and Hospital at St. Helena, Calif. The wedding took place there. The two will take a trip to Ireland and to Lintz, Austria, where Dr. Ferguson will do postgraduate work in internal medicine and pediatrics.

It was reported that Ferguson will start a new practice at Shady Cove, Ore., Aug. 15. He is having a new office building constructed. He reports he will take surgery patients both to Canyonville and to Medford.

Portland Faces Murder Charge For Wife's Death

PORTLAND (AP)—Henry E. Beck Jr., 47, was booked on a murder complaint Friday night shortly after his former wife died of bullet wounds.

Police said Beck suffered a gunshot wound in his head which was self-inflicted. His condition was not serious.

Witnesses said Beck accosted the woman on the street and began firing a gun at her, police reported. He then turned the gun on himself, they said.

A 13-year-old son survives Mrs. Beck.

Geddes On Committee On Local Government

State Sen. Paul Geddes, Roseburg, has been named to the Legislature's interim committee on local government by Senate President Elmo Smith.

The committee was authorized by the 1955 Legislative session. It will study problems peculiar to local government, the president said.

Included in the study will be problems of sanitation, drainage, and irrigation confronting cities. The 9-man group will also investigate parking and traffic congestion.

Sen. Geddes was selected, the Senate president added, because "his home county of Douglas is one of the most rapidly growing communities in the state and has all the problems related to such rapid growth."

Also named to the committee is Sen. Stewart Hardie of Gilliam County. Other members have not been announced. They will include three representatives and four persons appointed by Governor Patterson.

Road To Airport To Be Improved

A resolution by the Douglas County Court, signed Friday, will pave the way for improvement of the route to the Roseburg Municipal Airport.

The resolution formally accepts certain dedicated streets and properties in the area north of Roseburg between Garden Valley Road and the airport.

Streets accepted by the county include Mulholland Drive, First Street North, Second Street North, Allen Street and Broad Street. The improved route along the streets will be known as New Airport Road, No. 217.

The proposed improvement is in line with an agreement between the State Highway Commission and the County Court, signed last Oct. 5, wherein the state and county improvement responsibilities are outlined.

Senator Jackson Urges Speed Up For Jet Fighters

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) Saturday urged a speed up in U.S. production of supersonic jet fighters and the radar aircraft detection network around this hemisphere.

"If we are going to remain ahead of the alarming progress of Russian air power, we must act now," Jackson, a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, said in an interview.

Jackson is one of several Democratic senators who demanded a jump in U.S. production of B52 heavy jet bombers prior to a Pentagon decision to increase this by 35 per cent.

"It is a fact that Soviet Russia now has more jet fighters than this country," Jackson said. "I'm not saying what kind of jets they are, but it also is known some of ours are not very effective in the high altitudes used by intercontinental jet bombers."

Secretary of the Air Force Harold G. Goldhamer told a Custer, S.D., audience Friday that other forces may from time to time surpass the United States Air Force in some few elements of our equipment," but he added:

"There is no air force more modern in total than ours... we are certain that the overwhelming majority of the hundreds of thousands of pieces of equipment that we use are better than their counterparts in the air forces of other nations today."

Talbot reported also that this country has more planes "capable of taking off with atomic weapons" than all the rest of the world.

Austrian Doctor Returns Home From Labor Camp

VIENNA (AP)—An Austrian doctor who returned home Saturday from long imprisonment in the Soviet Union said he knows the names of several Americans and Britons held in Russian slave labor camps. But he didn't want to give his name, or those of the Americans, until he talks to American and British authorities in one of Austria's western zones.

The doctor returned in a group of 250 Austrian war prisoners. They were the first to be released by the Soviets since the conclusion of the Austrian state treaty last month. The Soviets have promised to release all Austrians still held in the Soviet Union within the next few months.

Youth, 15, Admits Slaying Girl, Age 8

PORTLAND, Maine (AP)—Fifteen-year-old Gerald Paul Troiano entered a plea of innocence Saturday to a charge of murdering Margaret Gormely, 8, in the cellar of the house their families share.

The boy was held without bail by Municipal Court Judge Louis Bernstein for the September term of Superior court.

Bernstein said the boy's lawyer, Gerald Agger, plans to ask that Gerald be committed to a state mental hospital for observation.

Margaret was fatally beaten Friday shortly after attending mass and receiving holy communion at St. Dominic's Roman Catholic Church.

Police said the youth, who told them he was addicted to reading "horror, crime and war" stories, orally admitted he struck her repeatedly with part of a dismantled washing machine when she resisted his advance.

Settlement Made In Suit For Post Office Injury

PORTLAND (AP)—A 1950 mishap in the post office at Roseburg led Friday to the government's agreement to pay \$1,800 to Edwin L. Clow.

Mrs. Clow, on Dec. 12, 1950, tripped over a mail sack in the postoffice, fracturing her leg. She sued, but later she died and her widow then asked \$15,000, alleging the injury led to her death. He also asked \$3,323 in medical and funeral expenses.

In federal court Friday Judge Gus J. Solomon approved a compromise settlement of \$1,800.

Filipino Sisters Held For Attempted Smuggling

HONOLULU (AP)—A customs inspector testified Friday that two Filipino sisters tried to smuggle \$10,000 worth of jewelry in their brassieres and taped to their legs.

The sisters, Modesto and Catalina Cordero, were detained at Honolulu airport Wednesday on arrival from Tokyo en route to San Francisco and Houston, Tex. They said their home was near Manila.

The case will go to a federal grand jury June 13. The sisters are free on \$2,500 bail.

Mrs. Blanche K. Thompson, customs inspector, testified at a preliminary hearing that she found nine strings of pearls in Catalina's bra and a zipper bag with assorted jewelry taped to Modesto's leg above the knee.

The sisters said they were in the jewelry business.

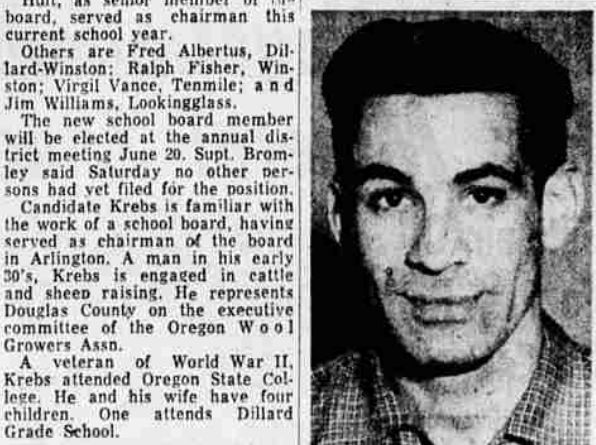

Loon Lake Road Is Due For Heavy Summer Use

The Loon Lake Road, wide enough for one-way traffic only in some sections, is due to be one of the busier rural roads in the county this summer.

Dep. Sheriff Lee Shipley said Firchau Bros. Logging Co. of Elkton and Lebanon is moving into a stand of timber near the lake this summer and is planning on moving out 100 truckloads of logs a day.

Sure to make traffic on the road a complex problem, Shipley said, is the popularity of the resort area at the lake. On a recent weekend, an estimated 1,000 fishermen and other recreationists used the road.

The road, a crooked route, is marked along the way by 200-foot drop-offs, posing added danger to motorists.

company, out of that money, is to pay up due rentals.

About 2,700 acres will be assigned to Coos Bay Oil & Gas for a 5 per cent production royalty in the event petroleum in some form is struck in commercial quantities.

Oil Developers will retain some 45,000 acres.

For the past week, negotiations among representatives of the three firms and the County Court have been under way.

Last Saturday, Oil Developers' leases were to expire, but the County Court gave oral approval to an extension when members were told of the imminent deals among the three firms.

Since then, though, information of how negotiations were progressing was virtually nil.

As things stand now, Oil Developers will have large tracts roughly in the foothills of the Coast Range in an arc approximately paralleling the Douglas-Coos county line from the Lower Umpqua area to Lookingglass Valley.

Most of the Sinclair land is located in the Lower Umpqua area, extending from south of Reedsport up Smith River, with a small part south of Elkton. Coos Bay Oil & Gas will have lease on land in the Camas Valley area south of Highway 42.

Land to be turned over to Oil Developers and Sinclair Oil intermingling in western Douglas County. Sinclair also has private holdings in the Smith River area.

Coos Bay Oil & Gas has local backing, with William Adair of Roseburg being affiliated with the firm.
