

Coquille Stops Roseburg Chiefs Twice; Drain Sox Capture Two Non-Counters

Both members of Roseburg's starting pitching duo of Don White and Jerry Droscher found the going tough as Coquille's Loggers swept the two-game series from the Roseburg Chiefs in Southern Oregon League weekend play.

The visitors won Saturday night's home-opener before over 300 excited fans at Finlay Field by an 11-9 margin and then moved over to Coquille to take the "second game on Sunday" by a score of 7-3.

Get 14 hits

Coquille whacked out 14 hits on Saturday night to support player-manager Dave Douglass who pitched the win in a fine relief effort. Douglass left-handed three-hit ball at the Chiefs after coming on in the third frame.

Sunday, outfielder Mike Moore rapped out four hits in five trips including a one-run homer to lead the winners.

Youthful Dan Luby continued his hitting assault in the Saturday game for Roseburg, driving in four runs on a home run and a triple.

Luby's three-bagger helped the Chiefs get off to a 5-4 first-inning lead. The game had the makings of a rout when the locals added another four markers in the second frame for a 9-4 margin. But Coquille came back with four third-inning runs to close in again.

Relief enters

Douglass came on in relief in the third inning with two men on base and promptly set the third man down to end the frame. Douglass had complete control thereafter.

Coquille tied it at 9-9 in the fourth, went in front 10-9 in the fifth and cinched things with another marker in the ninth.

In spite of a losing performance, White struck out 11 or Roseburg.

Roseburg tallied three times in the fifth inning of Sunday's game but that was the extent of Chief runmaking in a 7-3 setback. It gave the locals a 3-1 lead but the Loggers came back with one run in the fifth, four in the sixth and another in the seventh.

Chief runmaking came on Harvey Whitten's walk, a single by Droscher, a walk to George Sanders which loaded the bases, Bob Jacobson's single and Manager Hal Zuercher's misplayed infield hit.

Continuing to impress, Drain's Black Sox went out of Southern Oregon League circles Saturday and Sunday to win a pair of non-league baseball games.

The Sox, leading the SOL with two wins and no losses, turned back a McMinnville semi-pro team Saturday night 3-2 and the routed Smith-Crosley of Portland 16-0 Sunday afternoon. Both games were at Drain.

Dick Weaver hurled Saturday's win on six hits. The Black Sox tallied in three different innings to win. Sunday, the winning Sox outlasted 15 hits off three visiting moundsmen.

In the Saturday game, the Sox earned their second and eighth inning runs. An unearned marker crossed in the first when Bobby Buob walked, Ted Wilson doubled, Glen Stetter walked and an infielder bobbed Bill Beard's hit ball.

In the second inning, Don Porter singled, Weaver sacrificed, the McMinnville hurler pitched wild, and Buob singled. The winning run scored in the eighth on four successive walks.

The Maes scored twice in the third on a pair of walks, a sacrifice and White's two-base hit. Pat Wohlers hit the game's only extra base hit when he doubled in the fourth inning of the Sunday game. But the Black Sox made effective use of 14 singles, 11 walks and 7 S.C. errors to win easily.

Drain relief pitcher Jerry Cade, meanwhile, pitched hitless ball for the final four innings of the game and struck out 10 batters, including eight in a row. The 21-year-old Cade gave up a pro career this spring to return to his home town.

Standings Hold As ABC Ends

FORT WAYNE, Ind. (AP) Marks set in April or earlier stood up for individual leaders in the American Bowling Congress Tournament and won an unprecedented third championship for the Pfeiffer's Beer team of Detroit.

The 72-day met closed Sunday after 5,800 teams from 46 states took turns shooting for prize money.

Besides Pfeiffer's, which posted a 3,136 series on April 19, the winners were: Singles—Eddie Gerzine of Milwaukee; 738; all-events—Fred Bujaek of the Pfeiffer team, 1,983, and doubles—George Pappas and Harry Zoeller of Wilkes-Barre Pa., 1,365.

Pfeiffer's won in 1952 under the E and B Beer banner, and again last year under their present name. Team members are Thern Gibson, Bill Lillard, George Young, Lou Siefaff and Bujaek.

The latter added second place in singles, with a 735, to his all-events victory and share of team laurels.

By cashing nearly \$6,000 as a team, Pfeiffer's broke their own money-winning record of \$5,743.76 set in 1953. Bujaek, without his doubles money which hasn't been figured because he finished far down the list, set an individual earning record with \$1,989.

Steve Nagy's 1,965 in 1952 was the previous high.

Detroit Paces Golf Day Scores

NEW YORK (AP) — The reports were still coming in Monday but it looks as if Mike Schiff of Detroit's Tam O'Shanter Club turned in the lowest net score of the some 190,000 golfers who paid one dollar each for the privilege of trying to beat National Open champion Ed Furgol and Patty Berg on National Golf Day.

Furgol shot a 2-over par 72 and Miss Berg a 77 Saturday at San Francisco's Olympic Club where the open will be held June 16-18.

Schiff posted a gross score of 86, which with his 33 handicap gave him a net of 53, second, according to reports received at National Golf Day headquarters, was Dave Rundle, who had an 81-26-55 at the Airways Golf Course, Fresno, Calif.

Lowest woman's score recorded so far was a 72-10-62 by Betty Jane Bohel, playing at the Gloucester, Mass., Country Club. Life Magazine, which with the PGA, sponsored the competition, estimated close to 35,000 golfers beat Furgol and Miss Berg. The money, paid in fees, goes to the Red Cross and to golfing causes through the National Golf Fund.

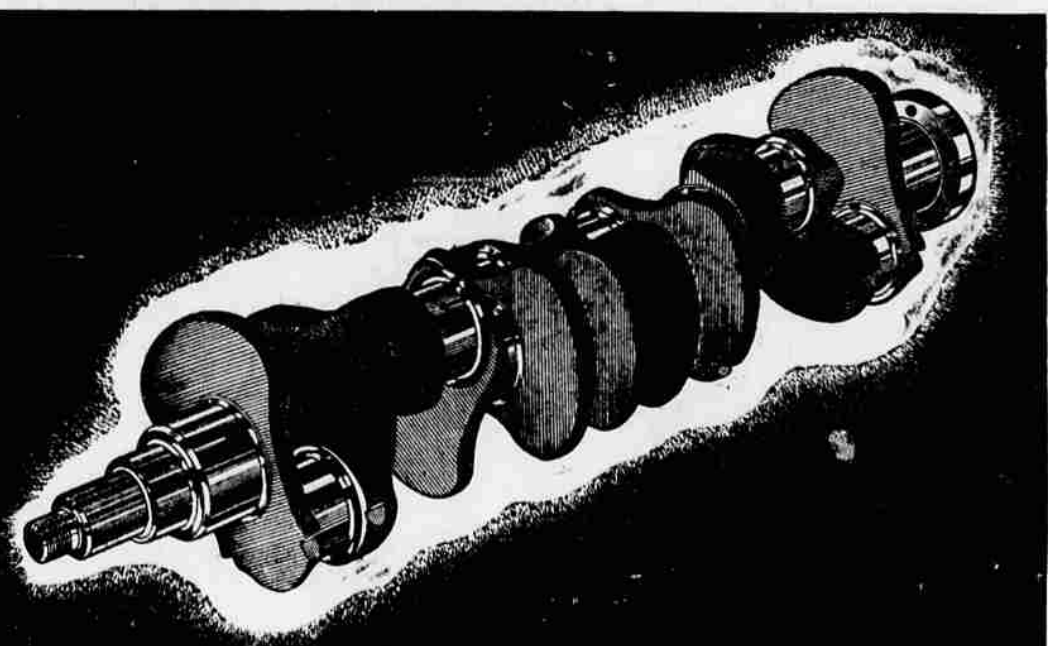
