

# Yakima High Schooler Hits 9.8 In AAU 100-Yard Dash

PORTLAND (AP)—Clarence Goosby of Yakima, Wash., and Julius Strong of Portland's Roosevelt High, were the stars of the high school field championships here Saturday.

school field championships here Saturday. Goosby, the Washington State sprint champion, equalled the 100-yard dash record with a time of 9.8 seconds. Strong ran the 220 in

the record time of 21.9 seconds. Goosby, holder of the Washington 220 championship, was only a little behind Strong.

Five other records were established: Eldon Francis Medford, Ore., threw the javelin a record 194 feet, 1/2 inch.

Chuck Cronis, Vancouver, Wash., set a 440-mark with a time of 59.7 seconds. Frederick Schepman, Redmond, Ore., broadjumped to a new record of 22 feet, 1/4 inch.

Roosevelt High's relay team, the Oregon champion, established a record with a time of 1 minute, 32.2 seconds. And Steve Frve, Yakima, set a shotput mark with a toss of 59 feet, 4 1/4 inches.

There were two double winners in the prep competition. Frye, besides winning the shotput, placed first in the discus. Mike McCluskey of Chehalis, Wash., won both the high and low hurdles, 20.1, tied a four-year-old record.

In the opener at San Francisco veteran lefthander Gene Bearden took his first loss after winning eight straight as Seattle's Elmer Singleton pitched a 4-hitter. Seal Bob DiPietro, whose string of hitting safely in 26 straight games was broken Saturday, belted a homer and a single in the opener.

The Rainiers scored three runs in the third frame of the nightcap to clinch the series, 5-3.

San Francisco sold shortstop Leo Righetti to Seattle and released Ewell (The Whip) Blackwell, one-time pitching great for Cincinnati in the National League. Seattle also signed Blackwell.

At the Brookings set-to, Moose Lodge copped second and Fairhaven Cleaners third in team event; Don Nye and Ed Davis had third in doubles; and Jack Hayman 16th in singles and 7th in all-events. Only tournament left in which local men will vie is the final weekend at Albany. At that time Roseburg Alleys, Sun Studs and the Hardtoppers will compete, along with such other nationally known teams as Sandy's Keglers, Timber Structures and Stroh Beer from Detroit.

Local yokels have now drifted into the usual summer schedule, with mixed doubles Tuesday nights and mens' doubles Thursday nights. Several "feeds" for winning teams have been greatly relished, and there may be more. But the social event of most importance at the moment is the "Sponsor's Banquet" tonight at Coos Bay, in which Industrial league teams will entertain their sponsors. A very nice gesture, we call it, and one which we would like to see other leagues emulate next year.

Now for some figures which we promised would surprise you. At the State tournament at Coos Bay, Roseburg led in cash prizes with 77 places, totaling \$2,027.39. Portland was second with more prizes, (88), but less cash, \$1,895.19. Coos Bay should have been in either first or second, but had to settle for third, with a total of 39 places aggregating only \$884.60. Portland's 88 places to Roseburg's 77 is accounted for by the fact that the Rose City had a number of places in Class "A", in which we had no prizes. If we had the figures available and the time to break them down, we could show just as great surprises in the other tournaments. At least, we know Poseyville knocked off the bulk of the lot at Medford.

We have the "howler of the year" nationally, and also at the state level. Now, we are going to nominate Roseburg's "howler" of the year. None other than Jack Hayman, that is to say, among the boys. Jack started bowling a year ago, and finished the season with a 122 average, and ended this season with a mighty credible 170, a 48-in jump. He has ended "in the money" in every tournament, and is plenty high in most of them.

Lady Bowler of the year for Roseburg could be none other than Nita Nichols, who carries an average above 80 per cent of the men, and has kept the name of our fair village in the headlines in all the tournaments she has graced.

And now we are going to end this piece with some quotes from an article by Sam Levine, in "300" Magazine, entitled "Pity the Poor Secretary."

DES MOINES (AP)—Bob Slater, 29-year-old national dirt track champion, was killed yesterday on the same track where he began big car racing four years ago.

Slater of Kansas City, was the fourth driver killed on the Iowa Fairgrounds dirt track since September 1951.

The 50-mile feature race was 2 minutes 54 seconds old when Slater's blue Offenhauser reared into the fatal curve and slammed into a retaining wall. He died of multiple fractures.

Slater's wife Mary Lou was among the 12,000 persons who witnessed the accident.
