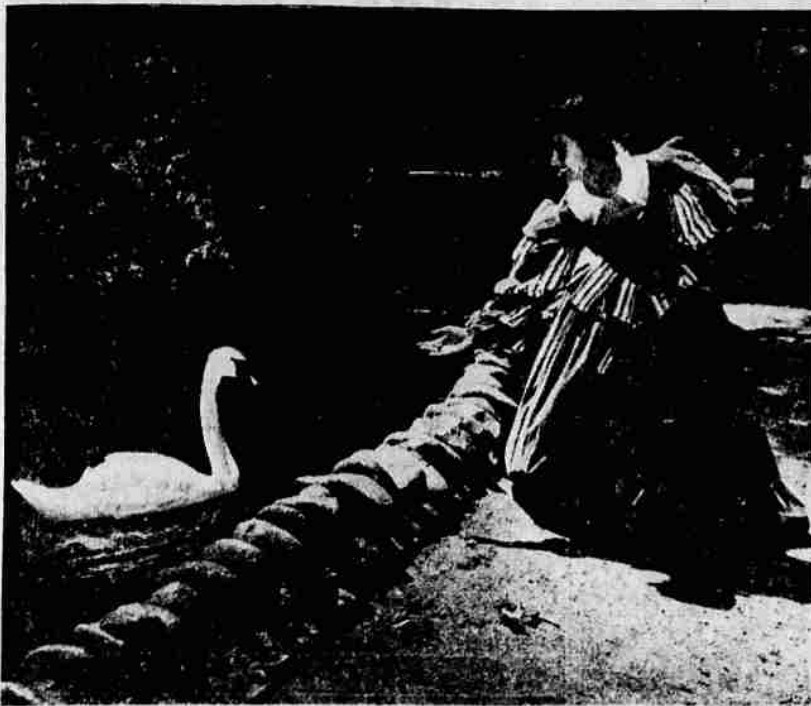

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia — Foreign Minister Koca Popovic told U.S. Ambassador James W. Riddleberger and four other envoys Monday President Tito did not surrender his independence in talks with the Russian leaders last week.

TOKYO — Prime Minister Ichiro Hatoyama reiterated Monday Japan would not pursue friendship with the Soviet Union at the expense of existing ties with the Western democracies. The comment was aimed at questions in the Diet concerning reports Russia would seek to "neutralize" Japan in World War II peace talks now underway in London.

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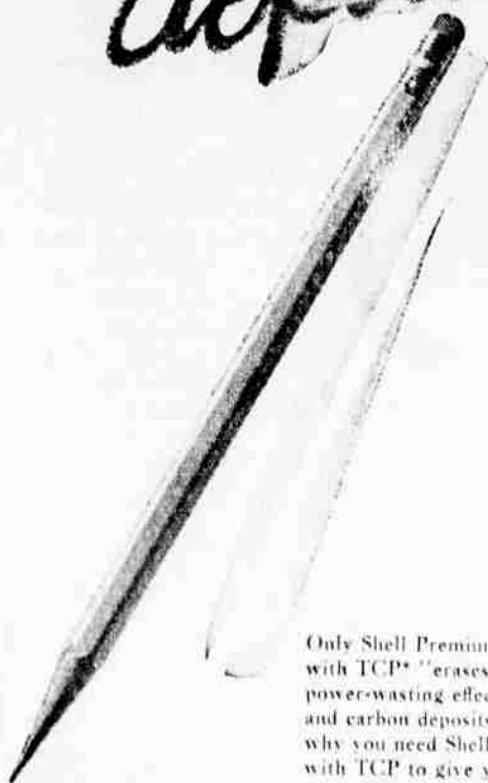
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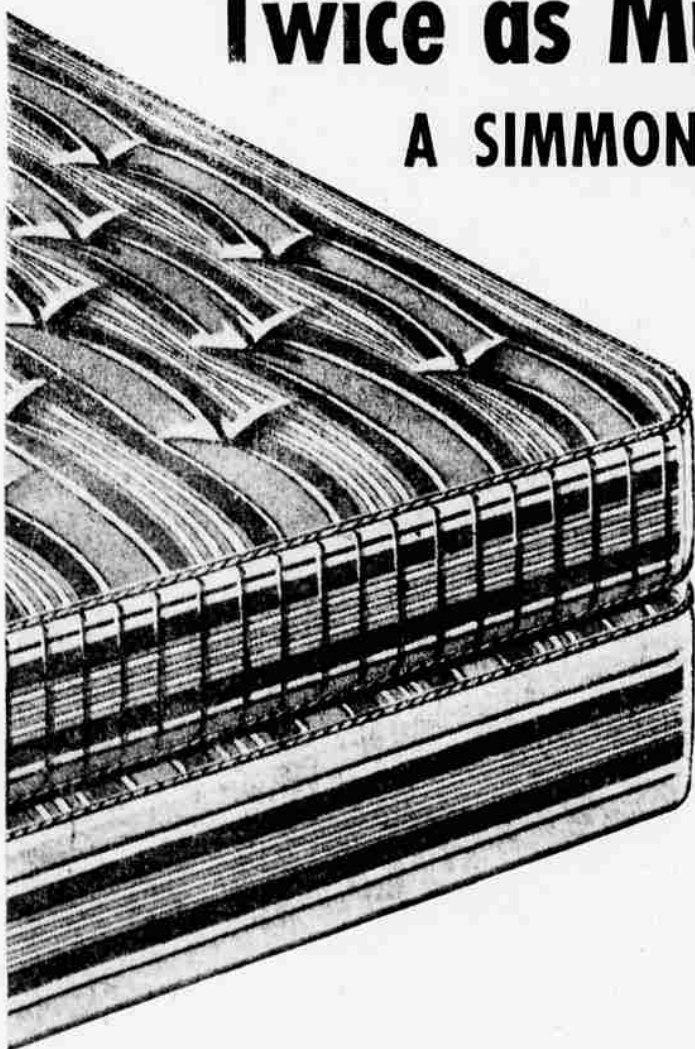
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
