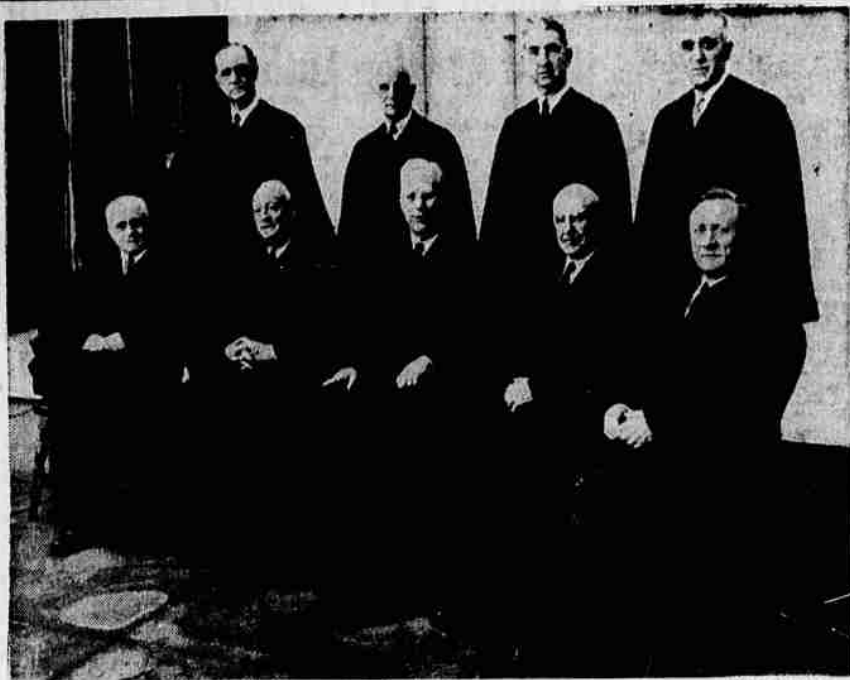

Two-Price Wheat System Draws Farmers' Support

LONGVIEW (U) — A proposal for a two-price system for wheat, to increase its use for feed, drew support at a meeting of representatives of several farmers' organizations here Friday.

The Oregon-Washington meeting was called by the Washington State Feed Assn. to obtain support for a campaign to get surplus wheat sold for feed in the Northwest at a price comparable to corn in the Midwest.

A majority agreed the best way to get the surplus wheat for livestock and poultry feed is through a program which would involve issuance of income certificates. It has been labeled a "domestic parity plan" by the Oregon Wheat Growers' League, which originated it.

The conferees here decided to support the plan actively.

The House Committee on Agriculture is to hold a hearing Wednesday in Washington, D. C., on the proposal.

Groups represented at the meeting included the Oregon Feed and Seed Dealers Assn., the Washington State Turkey Federation, the Washington Cattlemen's Assn., the Washington Poultry Assn., the

Washington Assn. of Wheat Growers, the Oregon Wheat League and the Washington Milk Producers.

Kenneth Fridley, vice president of the Oregon Wheat League, told the meeting the Northwest Wheat grower is in a difficult position because most of his production is limited for sale to millers of special type flours and for feed. He said the Midwest provides most of the bread flour because of a freight rate advantage.

Because of increased prices, the feed market in the Pacific Northwest has been destroyed, said A. L. Steven, international trustee of the American Federation of Grain Millers. He said one result has been the importation of lower priced Canadian wheat siftings for feed. The situation, he said, has led to the closure of six Northwest mills.

Frenchmen Sip Less Wine, Eating More Ice Cream

CHICAGO (U) — A French industrialist says his countrymen are eating more ice cream and sipping less wine.

Frenchmen rejected former Premier Mendes-France's plea to substitute milk for wine. But Robert Lemasson, president of a baking and confectionary company in Rouen, said the ice cream business is booming.

"In cafes today it is not unusual to see young people sit down to a dish of ice cream instead of the traditional wine," Lemasson asserted during a visit to an American ice cream plant.

"Surprisingly, the real ice cream boom has been in southern France in the heart of the wine country. Lemasson came to Chicago for the 50th anniversary convention of Rotary International.

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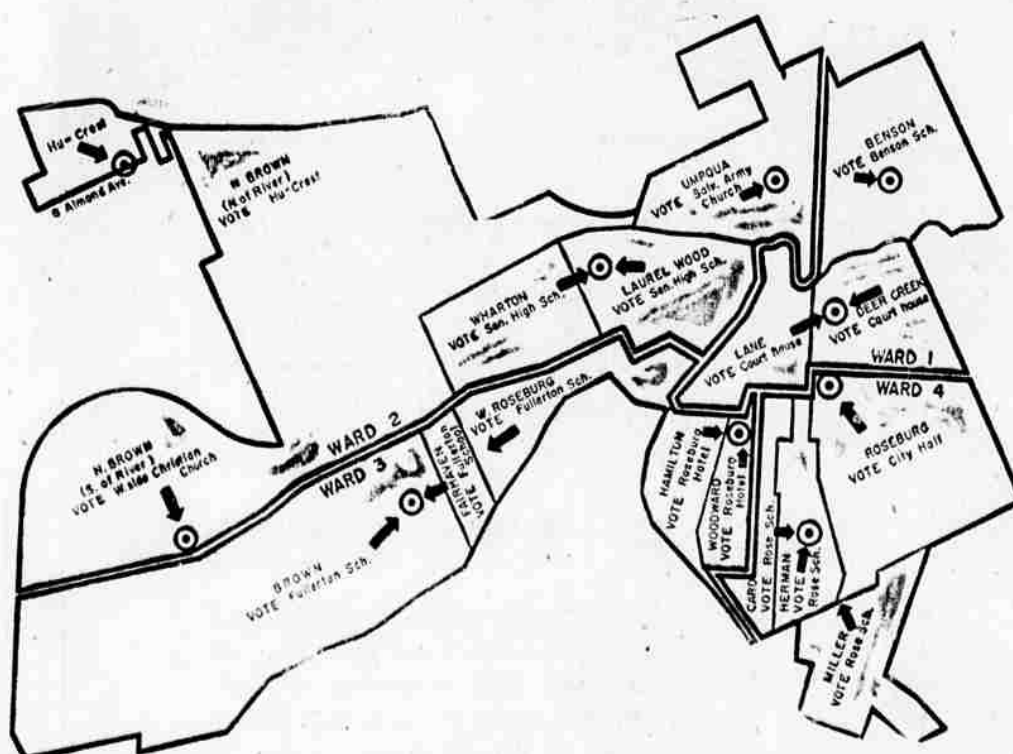
