Dr. John P. Peters Ousted Wrongfully Under Loyalty Program, High Court Rules

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court held 7-2 Monday that Dr. John P. Peters was wrongfully fired under the government's now-discarded loyalty program.

But the tribunal refused to pass on whether his constitutional rights were violated when Peters was denied the right to face his accusers.

An affirmative answer to this question could have dealt a sharp blow to the present security program instituted by the Eisenhower administration.

Peters, senior professor of medicine at Yale University, was ousted as a special consultant to the U.S. Public Health Service in May, 1953.

The action came three months after the Eisenhower administration took office but before the old loyalty program was supplanted by one in which security—rather than loyalty—was the dominant factor.

Under neither program, however, are accused employees permitted to face their accusers.

Chief Justice Warren delivered the high tribunal's opinion, holding that the procedure under which Peters was ousted was invalid.

Board Exceeded Rights
Warren said the Civil Service Commission's Loyalty Review Board, which made the finding against Peters, had no right to reopen his case on its own motion.

Two lower loyalty boards earlier had cleared Dr. Peters but the top review board ordered the case reopened on its own motion and found that there was "a reasonable doubt" to Peters' loyalty to the government.

During the various hearings, Peters swore he had never been a member of the Communist Party and declared his loyalty to the United States.

While Warren and four of his colleagues said they did not feel the constitutional issue needed to be resolved at this time, Justices Douglas and Black disagreed, although they voted with the majority.

"Faceless Informers"
Douglas said Peters was "condemned by faceless informers, some of whom were not known even to the board that condemned him. Some of these informers were not even under oath; none of them had to submit to cross examination. None had to face Dr. Peters," Douglas added.

"So far as we or the board know they may be psychopaths or venal

people... who revel in being informers. They may bear old grudges. Under cross-examination their stories might disappear like bubbles. Their whispered confidences might turn out to be yarns conceived by twisted minds or by people who, though sincere, have poor faculties of observation and memory."

Liberty "Deprived"
Douglas said confrontation and cross-examination under oath are essential, "if the American ideal of due process is to remain a vital force in our public life." He added:

"We deal here with the reputation of men and their right to work—things more precious than property itself. We have here a system where government with all its power and authority condemns a man to a suspect class and the outer darkness, without the rudiments of a fair trial."

"It is an un-American practice which we should condemn. It deprives men of 'liberty' within the meaning of the Fifth Amendment."

PORTLAND (AP)—A wage increase offered by the Bakery Employers Council was unanimously accepted by AFL Bakery workers here, union officials reported Saturday.

The agreement calls for eight cents an hour more now and six cents additional beginning Nov. 1. The old scale was \$2.40 an hour.

'Ornerly' People Needed By World, Stevenson Says

NORTHAMPTON, Mass. (AP)—Adlai Stevenson said Monday that what we need in this decisive century are unpredictable "ornerly" characters rather than "well-adjusted" personalities.

He told 471 graduates at Smith College's 77th commencement we need more "idiosyncratic" people—(that rugged frontier word "ornerly" occurs to me) those "who take open eyes and open minds out with them into the society which they will share and help to transform."

The 1952 Democratic presidential candidate—who gave no hint of his future political plans—said that since Western rationalism and

Eastern spiritualism met in Athens, collectivism in various forms has collided with individualism time and again. And he added: "This 20th Century collision, this 'crisis' we are forever talking about, will be won at last, not on the battlefield but in the head and heart."

Modern Dictators Busy

Stevenson said modern dictators are reviving a very "ancient and entrenched way of life. Hitler discovered it. The fascists knew it. The Communists are busy brainwashing all over Asia. And what they are washing out is precisely independence of judgment and the

moral courage with which to back such judgments.

"And there are, alas, some leaders in our country who certainly have a brainwashing ghat in their eyes when they meet with an unfamiliar idea."
