Campanella Edges Up Toward NL Bat Lead

NEW YORK (AP)—Brooklyn's Roy Campanella was only a scant 13 points behind Richie Ashburn, the National League's batting leader, Tuesday but he had the sacrifice fly rule to thank for the closeness of the race.

Campanella, making a strong comeback following a disappointing 1954 season in 1954, is batting .347 to Ashburn's .355. Campanella, however, has produced five sacrifice flies and if they were counted as times at bat as they were before last season, he would be at .333.

Ashburn, the Phillies' star center-fielder, has hit no sacrifice flies.

In the American League, Al Kaline of Detroit regained the batting lead from teammate Harvey Kuenn, Kaline moved up five points to .372 while Kuenn fell to .366. Vic Power of Kansas City is third with .335. Then come Mickey Vernon of Washington and 314 and Mickey Mantle of New York and Sherm Lollar of Chicago with .305 apiece.

Elk Transplanted In Douglas County

Three Roosevelt elk recently began life in new surroundings as a result of the Oregon Game Commission's big game transplanting program.

According to R. U. Mace, chief of big game, the elk were captured in the Vaughn Mountain elk trap in Douglas County and released at the head of Seare Creek in the Vincent Creek burn to supplement the nucleus herd that was started in that area in 1953.

The animals were last year's calves and consisted of one male and two females.

Vaughn Mountain has had a large elk population for several years. The trapping operations were instituted in the hopes that a few of these animals could be moved to new areas which were devoid of elk but which stood a good chance of providing new elk herds for Oregon hunters in the future.

Mace stated that Roosevelt elk tend to live in a limited locality, failing to range over a wide area as do their cousins the Rocky Mountain elk of eastern Oregon.

Because of this characteristic, Roosevelt elk do not voluntarily spread into new territory. Trapping and transplanting, wherever feasible, is part of the Game Commission's program to start elk herds in all suitable habitat throughout the coast range.

Pointing out the difficulties encountered in trapping elk game animals even in heavily populated areas, Mace stated that this was only the second successful trapping of elk from Vaughn Mountain since the trap was installed in 1953. During that year, nine elk were captured and released at the head of Vincent Creek as the start of a new herd in that area.
