

Fish Count Record Set At Winchester

An all-time daily fish count record at the Winchester Dam counting station was set on Sunday, May 29, when 472 adult and 84 jack chinook salmon were counted passing over the station's counting board, it was revealed by figures released by the Oregon State Game Commission this week.

This last-minute break of salmon movement completely changed what had been a rather gloomy picture concerning adult spring chinook salmon. Higher water temperatures were said to be responsible for the record movement.

American Legion Baseball Action Starts Here Friday

A reinforced Roseburg American Legion baseball team begins summer activity Friday night with a non-league game against Cottage Grove at 8 p.m. on Finlay Field.

Nashua, Arcaro Aim At Belmont

NEW YORK (AP)—Eddie Arcaro, who has ridden more Kentucky Derby and Preakness winners than any other jockey, will take dead aim on his sixth Belmont stakes Saturday with Nashua.

The 39-year-old Cincinnati booter needs another victory to tie him with Jimmy McLoughlin, the old-timer who won six Belmonts in a period from 1922 to 1938.

Arcaro is tied with Earl Sande among modern day riders of Belmont winners, and the Belair Stud Nashua is expected to be a heavy odds-on favorite in the 87th running of the great 3-year-old classic.

The Belmont Park management is having a time trying to determine just how many colts will face the starter in the televised mile and one half race.

At the latest count, it seemed as if three or four might contest with Nashua, who was upset by Swaps in the Kentucky Derby, then broke the Pimlico track record in winning the Preakness May 28.
