A series of freak accidents have beset Douglas County.

Richard Paul Phillips, 3-year-old Winston, was reported doing fine at Douglas Community Hospital Thursday after being run over by the family car Wednesday. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Phillips, Grape Street. He suffered a possible skull fracture, possible internal injuries, a ruptured ear drum and cuts and bruises.

According to his mother, young Richard started to enter the heavy family car parked in the Phillips' uphill driveway. He pulled himself up by the emergency brake, releasing it. He was thrown from the car and down under the front left wheel. The car rolled over him and out into the street. Richard received treatment at Winston Emergency Hospital and was later transferred to Community Hospital.

Queen Elizabeth Opens Parliament In Grave Crisis

LONDON (AP)—Queen Elizabeth opened a new session of Parliament today under the shadow of Britain's gravest industrial crisis since the general strike of 1926.

After only a passing reference to the crippling 12-day-old national railroad strike, she pledged the vast resources of the Commonwealth to the cause of peace. She stressed that in all efforts Britain "will continue to work in close accord with the United States."

She said Britain looks "forward in a spirit of confidence and good will to fruitful negotiations with the government of the Soviet Union."

"In consultations with the other governments concerned," she continued, "my government will continue earnestly to seek a peaceful settlement of the situation in the Formosa Strait."

The Queen made her traditional Speech from the Throne in the House of Lords, where the peers and members of the new House of Commons assembled for the first session of Parliament under the new administration of Prime Minister Eden.

Her address was prepared as usual by Eden and members of his Conservative government, and chartered his general policies.

Because of the rail strike, the Queen rode to Westminster in a car instead of the usual slow horse-drawn state coach. There was no colorful escort of troops lining the route from Buckingham Palace to the Parliament Building.

Welfare Personnel From Six Counties Meet Here Friday

Welfare personnel from six Oregon counties will meet in Roseburg Friday with five members of the State Welfare Office to discuss problems in the fiscal year ahead.

The session is one of several regional meetings being held in Oregon this month by the state. On hand will be administrators, supervisors and some caseworkers from Jackson, Josephine, Coos, Curry, Lane and Douglas counties.

Charles Larsen, director of finance for the state, will preside. Assisting him will be four other state workers.

They are: Miss Barbara Settem, child welfare consultant; Miss Marguerite Thomason, field representative; Mrs. Esther K. Watson, staff supervisor for the Aid of Dependent Children program, and William Smythe, director of field services.

The concentrated all-day session will be devoted mainly to information, according to Mrs. Lois Baker, Douglas County administrator. It will be held in the Hotel Umpqua and will start at 9:30 a.m.

Up for discussion are: 1955-56 budget allocation; budgeting procedures; quarterly budget control; how to live with the allocations; policy revision, etc.

In the matter of policy revision, for example, state law now calls for a 60-day waiting period (instead of the former 30) for ADC caseworkers or separation cases which have filed for assistance with local commissions.

The morning will start with a discussion of the recent welfare budget passed by the State Legislature, Mrs. Baker said.

Washington and Oregon truck drivers appeared headed Thursday toward overwhelming acceptance of an employers' regional offer to settle the 22-day strike which has tied up long-haul trucking in the Far West.

Seattle's local, the state's largest, will not conclude voting until 8 p.m. Thursday, but locals in Bellingham, Olympia, Snohomish, Tacoma, Everett, Yakima, Portland, Los Angeles and Walla Walla voted by big margins Wednesday to end the strike.

The proposal presented to the various locals was the same in both states. It provides increases of 8 cents an hour this year, retroactive to May 1; 8 cents an hour more on May 1, 1956, and 7 cents an hour more on May 1, 1957. It also includes a 5 cents an hour payment to the union's pension fund.

In Tacoma, Paul Gomsrud, secretary-treasurer of the Tacoma local, said new hourly scales under the proposal will be \$2.04 1/2 for pick-up and delivery; \$2.09 1/2 for short-line (less than 125 miles) drivers and \$2.22 for long-line drivers. He said the scales are the same throughout Washington, except in Spokane, where drivers receive 4 1/2 cents less.

A heavy schedule of business was cleared away at this week's Chamber of Commerce directors' meeting in Roseburg.

Among other things, the Chamber had to choose a new director to replace Elton Jackson. He is Roseburg's local manager of Miller's Mercantile Co. Jackson resigned because of the necessity of being away from Roseburg frequently on business.

The Chamber also received a report from Percy Croft on the State Highway Commission meeting which he and representatives from Sutherlin, Drain and Reedsport attended. The representatives requested improvement of Highway 225 between Tyee and Elton.

It also approved a membership recruiting program to start not later than Sept. 6.

Other action included: Reaffirmation of an earlier stand for the city of Roseburg to acquire the Lillie Moore property.

Approval of payment of \$25 to defray expense of participation in the Elks parade at Ashland in the interest of securing the 1957 state convention for Roseburg.

Authorization of payment of 50 per cent of cost of the Plant-A-Rose-month project initiated by the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Heard the reading of a letter from the office of the Bureau of Public Roads telling that plans are now being readied for a contract to clear an additional five miles of right-of-way on the North Umpqua Road above Apple Creek.

The same letter also related that a preliminary survey had been made between Copeland Creek and Fish Creek and that the location survey is complete from Fish Creek to the Cascade Lakes Highway. Distance remaining for the completion of the survey is approximately 13 miles.

British Leaders Confer On Strike

LONDON (AP)—Union and government negotiators met for two hours Thursday in their first full talks to end Britain's crippling 12-day-old rail strike and then adjourned until Friday.

Informed sources said the two sides traded views and the adjournment does not mean any breakdown.

Hopes stayed high for a quick end to the strike, which has slowed the nation's industrial boom. Some London newspapers said it might come within 48 hours.
