

Explorer Scouts Slate Annual Boat Trip On Umpqua

Explorer Scouts taking part in the annual trip down the Umpqua River will assemble at the Roseburg Rod & Gun Club grounds, Winchester, Sunday, June 19. Eight youths from the Douglas Fir District Explorer Posts 133 and 7 have signed up for the trip, according to Walt Smith, district field executive. About 40 boys from the entire Oregon Trail Council will be involved. Will Larson of Eugene, council field executive, will direct the trip, which will end at Sawyers Rapids near Scottsburg on June 24. The boys, carrying all gear in rubber rafts, will leave Monday morning, after camping out on the Rod & Gun Club grounds the night before. They plan a noon stop at Singleton Park, where the north and south forks of the Umpqua meet. Monday night, they will camp at Umpqua. Tuesday night, they will be at Millwood, Wednesday night at Camp Tyee or Hutchinson Way. Thursday night at the "big bend" of the river, and Friday night at Sawyers Rapids. Rafts are being furnished by the Air Force, Portland International Airport, through an Explorer project officer.

would not be resumed before Monday. Fenton said terms of the agreement will be announced after the locals vote.

The Teamsters' long-haul, for-hire drivers received \$214 hourly or 7 1/4 cents a mile under the old master contract. They previously turned down an offer of 4 cents an hour more for each of the next three years throughout most of the West.

The union originally demanded 10 cents more this year and 8 cents an hour more for each of the next two years, plus pension and other benefits.

Wages generally are lower in the Pacific Northwest and somewhat higher in Southern California. The Pacific Northwest drivers voted Thursday on a proposal for 8 cents the following year, 8 next year, and 7 the following year, plus a 5-cent hourly pension plan and fringe benefits.

It was reported that the Southern California locals would be offered 9 cents now and 9 cents the next two years, plus pension benefits.
