A bubbling stream winding its way through a green field, a peak rising majestically into the clouds; these are representative subjects of a rewarding world of photography — landscapes.

One of its general rules is not to include too much in the scene.

If one dominant object or mass is featured, with others subordinated, the photograph will be more effective in holding interest.

Landscape photography foreground material are frequently unimpressive. If an object, such as a person, tree branch, or fence is included, a comparison is made that shows the far objects in their real proportions. A feeling of depth is also imparted.

The tree branch can also serve as a "frame" to hold attention on the important part of the picture and a person is helpful further in overcoming a feeling of loneliness evident in some scenes. However, the subject should be in a natural pose, and not too near the camera.

Maximum detail and sharpness are usually desired in landscapes. A tripod or firm support for the camera will help to this end. On adjustable cameras, the diaphragm should be closed down for wide depth of field.

With color films, a haze filter will aid in cutting through the haze that shows in many distant scenes. A yellow filter will do the same for black-and-white films, as well as clearly showing clouds and sky.

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
