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Youth Activities At MC Can Use Unit Of Manor

Myrtle Creek's Youth Activities group has the City Council's official word that the group can use one Myrtle Manor unit for its program.

The council this week told sponsors of the group that they may have six months in which to complete remodeling of the building. Then the structure may be used for the youth program as long as needed or until a better building replaces it.

The stand of the council stymied fears of some persons who understood the building was to be torn down, according to the Myrtle Creek Mail.

City Supt. Al Mortenson was authorized by the council to assign all work of city employees, and he may employ or discharge workers, with the exception of the recorder, treasurer and office workers.

The council also turned over maintenance of city street lights to California Oregon Power Co. at a charge of 15 per cent of the power cost. It was figured that Copco could care for the lights at a cheaper cost than the city.

Ellsworth Hails Funds Earmarked For Talent Job

WASHINGTON — Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore) Friday hailed the earmarking of planning funds for the Talent Division Reclamation Project in Oregon.

The congressman said action by the House Appropriations Committee "definitely marks the beginning of 'actually work on the project.'"

"Active administration cooperation with us in our efforts to secure an appropriation for the Talent Project clearly refutes politically inspired assertions earlier that the authorization of the project last year was a campaign gesture and that the administration had no intention of urging appropriations of funds for it."

The committee approved \$150,000 for planning and \$350,000 to be spent on rehabilitation of the Medford and Rogue River Irrigation districts, Ellsworth said.

He added that money for the project was not included in the President's budget because of "unfortunate errors" in project data given the Budget Bureau.

Bad Weather Scatters 50 Women Pilots

KEY WEST, Fla. — More than 50 women pilots participating in the Washington-Havana "Powder Puff Derby" headed for Key West today after bad weather scattered them for 800 miles along the South Atlantic Coast.

Only three of the 33 planes which left Washington early yesterday reached Key West by nightfall. Others were strung out as far north as Florence, S. C., victims of turbulent weather that delayed the start 24 hours.

One made a forced landing on a highway, another was temporarily lost and only one spent the night at New Smyrna Beach, where the contesting were supposed to stop as part of the annual seaside fiesta.

"Part to reach Key West were Mrs. Lucile Wright of Jamestown, N. Y., winner of the race two years ago, and Mrs. Edna Gardner Whyte of Flushing, Mich., her co-pilot.

Neuberger, Coon Express Opinions On Appropriation

WASHINGTON — Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore) said Friday that failure of the House Appropriations Committee to recommend action for planning John Day Dam was "a stunning blow to the Northwest."

Rep. Coon (R-Ore) who has introduced a "partnership" bill for construction of the Columbia River project, said the committee action "emphasizes the need" for joint local-federal construction of the dam.

Neuberger said he had been assured Army Engineers would urge the Senate committee to restore the funds, "because John Day as a federal project could do much to help assure future industrial payrolls and adequate power."

Disappointed at the lack of funds for deepening the Columbia River channel, "In general, the House recommendations are not particularly encouraging to public power. They show that constant nagging and carping at the federal hydroelectric program has had an adverse impact from which the Pacific Northwest may suffer for many years," he declared.
