**Compromise Legislation On Sugar Announced**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The government has announced here a compromise policy on sugar legislation to provide some increase in marketing quotas for domestic producers, but not as great a cut in Cuba's sugar sales in this country as U.S. producers have asked.

The government's plan proposed "special relief" for domestic producers in 1955 by giving them an increase of 100,000 tons in their marketing quotas, plus 55 percent of U. S. sugar consumption above 8,350,000 tons. This would cut Cuba's sugar sales to the United States approximately 175,000 tons in 1955. Bills now pending in Congress have proposed a 240,000 ton cut.
