Fire Chiefs To Investigate Status Of Training Funds

New Civil Defense Concept Arrived With Emergence Of H-Bomb, Firemen Told

A new concept of Civil Defense has arrived with the emergence of the hydrogen bomb, and both the Douglas County and state CD directors see an important role for the rural counties in the event of an attack on Portland.

Gen. J. T. Pierce, county director, and Col. Arthur Sheets, state director, outlined problems this morning for the benefit of fire chiefs and fire district directors meeting in Roseburg. Firemen hold a key spot in Civil Defense in fire-fighting, mobile transportation and first aid.

Gen. Pierce, retired Army officer, told the group that the major problem here is one of caring for, feeding and sheltering refugees from a blast area. Of less importance is the probability that an actual attack will be made in the county.

To be prepared, the county must find means of providing food and fuel for any influx of people in the event that a nearby metropolitan area is struck by an enemy. Druggists have increased medicine stocks beyond normal.

However, a shortage of doctors may occur here in case of disaster, the general said. There is an actual shortage under present conditions, but the load on doctors would come in two ways:

1. Many refugees coming here would be injured or burned.

New President Damon To Name Committee

The Oregon Fire Chiefs Assn. will have a committee, to be appointed by the new president, Hugh Damon of Baker, to investigate status of some \$17,000 legislative appropriation for fire training.

The move came this morning in a business session in Elks Lodge, and it followed considerable discussion of a statewide fire training program.

The funds apparently are lying unused in Salem. Some members feared that a breakdown in the training program might occur if action isn't taken quickly.

A resolution is to be drawn to that effect. The action highlighted the morning sessions of the joint convention of the fire chiefs and the Oregon Rural Fire Protection Districts Assn. here.

Both organizations elected new officers during the morning. A Roseburg man was elected to office in each of the groups. W. E. (Dutch) Mills, Roseburg, are chief, became first vice president of the state fire chiefs and Leslie Pfaff, a director of the Roseburg Rural Fire District, is new second vice president of the state fire districts. Other officers are:

Fire chiefs: Damon, president; Mills, vice president; Bob Ballard, Taft, second vice president; Ivan Pearson, McMinnville, treasurer; and E. L. Smith, Salem, secretary.

The body of 4-year-old Irene Louise Clapp, the object of a long search by the sheriff's office since May 22, today was found lodged in some driftwood in the North Umpqua River about three miles west of Glendale.

The body was found about 10:30 a.m. today by Mrs. Hal Boyd as she was crossing the river. She found the body in some driftwood around some pilings that once supported a bridge.

The girl's body was brought to Roseburg to the Long & Orr Mortuary.

Tuesday two deputy sheriffs, Douglas County coroner Jim Powers and other citizens were at the scene to help remove the body.

Actual location was near the Darby Oliver Ranch. Boyd lives right across the river from that spot.

Irene was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Allen Clapp.

The little girl apparently fell in Little River while on a picnic with her parents.

Showing Of Registered Saddle Horses Invited

The interest and competition shown by riding clubs of the county has played an important part in increasing the quality and quantity of saddle horses throughout the area, he said.

Because of this interest in better horses, it is expected that this year's showing of registered saddle horses will be the largest ever held in Douglas County.

The main purpose of the show is to acquaint the public with the various breeds and to allow the owners to show what are believed to be some of the very best horses in the Northwest, Stroe said.

County Negotiates Oil Leases

3 Firms Must Begin Drilling Within 2 Years

Oil leases on about 47,000 acres of county land were taken up Monday by three exploration firms, all of which must begin drilling within two years.

The Douglas County Court transferred mineral rights for the next five years to Oil Developers Inc., Roseburg (about 31,000 acres); Sinclair Oil Corp., (about 13,000); and Coos Bay Oil & Gas Co. (2,800).

The distribution of the oil rights came about after nearly a month of negotiations after rights of Oil Developers to about 68,000 acres expired. The negotiations and the final splitting up of the land were complex.

On May 18, Oil Developers leases expired when the community-supported firm and its affiliate, Community Gas & Oil Co., couldn't raise the money to pay up leases after having drilled a promising exploratory well near Melrose last fall.

The County Court then began a series of talks with attorneys representing the firms. Sinclair Oil received its newly assigned rights by buying up leases formerly held by Oil Developers in the Lower Umpqua area.

Coos Bay Oil & Gas got its acreage in the Camas Valley area south of Highway 42 by promising a 5 per cent royalty to Oil Developers, which retains land in the Coast Range foothills ringing the Douglas-Coos county line.

A hitch in the negotiations came about 10 days ago when it was discovered that the county might not have retained mineral rights to some land sold on timber contracts. A check through county records showed that was the case, accounting for the differences in acreages formerly held by Oil Developers and those assigned to the three companies Monday.

Woodrich Named New Circuit Judge For Douglas County

Gov. Paul Patterson called The News-Review today from Salem to announce that Charles S. Woodrich, a young Roseburg attorney, had been appointed circuit judge in District 2.

He will fill the opening on the District 2 circuit bench which was created by the 1955 State Legislature. Two new openings were created in the district because of the heavy load of litigation to be handled.

Woodrich was one of the list of candidates given the governor by the Douglas County Bar Assn.

Woodrich will be one of the youngest, and possibly the youngest, circuit judge in the state. He is 32. He will join veteran Judge Carl E. Winberry on the Douglas County bench.

He received his doctor of law degree from the University of Chicago in 1949.

The second appointment for the district was also made. He will take the bench in Eugene. He is William S. Forde, Eugene, Gov. Patterson said. This position was also created this year.

Gov. Patterson also noted the appointment of a replacement for Circuit Judge William East of Eugene, who will vacate the position to take a federal judgeship. He is T. R. Goodwin of Eugene.

Two other appointments were made, according to the Associated Press. They are for circuit court positions in Multnomah County, Carl A. Dahl, 49, and Paul R. Harris, 53, both of Portland were named to those positions. Both Dahl and Harris are former presidents of the Multnomah Bar Assn.

The group is led by Leleoka, quarter-blood Cherokee, and an honorary chief of the Nez Perce. The rest of the family includes the mother, Gray Dove, Leleoka's sister, Fawn, 14, and brothers, Thunder Eagle, Tee Wee, 14, and Lodge Wrecker, 5.

Thunder Eagle, only 13 years old, is the star of the show with his intricate and precise hoop dance. The youngster, whose "white man's name" means Dick Smith, won the southwestern hoop dance title in inter-tribal competition in 1953.

More recently he garnered the Northwest hoop dancing championship and walked off with the world's title, designated by the

Roseburg To Host Oregon State Newspaper Publishers At Weekend Convention

Roseburg's second major state convention within the week is slated here Friday and Saturday. The 68th annual meeting of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Assn. is expected to attract publishers from throughout the state.

The convention will be headquartered in the Hotel Umpqua and all meetings and discussions will be held there.

Panel and group discussions will take most of the time of newspapermen while here, but they will hear three speakers and make a tour of the Hanna nickel operation at Riddle.

Ray L. Spangler, publisher of the Redwood City, Calif., Tribune and a director of The Associated Press, will address ONPA members Friday night at the organization's annual banquet. His topic will be "Key to Profits — Long-Term Product Acceptance." In the talk, he is expected to establish that the foundation of a profitable newspaper is in its integrity and responsibility, particularly in the news and editorial columns.

At a Friday noon luncheon, the speaker will be Harlan L. Wendell, Pacific District manager of public relations for E. I. DuPont de Nemours & Co. His topic will be "Progress Must Be Created." Wendell spent September 1953 to September 1954 as public relations advisor to Mr. Oveta Culp Hobby, secretary of health, education and welfare in the President's cabinet.

Earl S. Mollard, general manager of Hanna Nickel Smelting Co., is scheduled for an address at a Saturday noon luncheon. Later, he will lead publishers on a tour.

Myrtle Creek Sets Vote On Two Bond Issues For July 11

Two proposed school bond issues will go before Myrtle Creek voters July 11 as the result of a District 19 school board meeting Monday night.

One will be a \$55,000 bond issue to cover construction of a new industrial arts building and alterations to the present shop library, science and office rooms, reports correspondent Ruth M. Evans.

The new shop building would be a 5,000 square foot addition to the high school plant.

The other issue will be for \$40,000 for a new multi-purpose room at the Tri-City High School.

The school board will make a further study of the proposed issues June 30.

Most of the remainder of the meeting was taken up with study of teacher applications.

The present elementary school principal, George Schroeder, recommended Glen Schroeder and Mrs. Alvin Helgeson as head teachers at the upper elementary and primary buildings. Schroeder's salary would be boosted \$400, and Mrs. Helgeson's, \$300. Childress said their work would be primarily clerical and would not be of a supervisory capacity.

The board offered three teacher contracts, to Robert Winterle, George Falkenstein and his wife, Lenore. The two men will be in primary elementary teachers, and Mrs. Falkenstein will teach in the primary.

High School principal Myrl Barkhurst recommended that Rishel Whitman be hired as a teaching vice principal. At present he is superintendent of a small Galeson, Colo., school.

With these matters cleared, Supt. Al Neet reported nine teacher vacancies still exist.

Norris Named Acting Assistant Superintendent

Cliff Norris, Central Junior High School principal, has been named acting assistant superintendent of School District 4, according to Supt. M. C. Deller.

He will serve until the school administration has opportunity to make a thorough job analysis of the position and interview likely qualified candidates, the superintendent said. The vacancy was created last week when Dr. Marvin Smith resigned to accept a position as assistant elementary superintendent at Castro Valley, Calif.

Government Accuses Pair Of Disorders

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — By decree, the government Tuesday stripped two Roman Catholic bishops of their official positions in the Buenos Aires Diocese. This is a right the government claims under the agreement making Catholicism the official religion in this country.

The government accused the Rt. Rev. Manuel Tato and the Rt. Rev. Ramon Novoa of instigating disorders last weekend. Msgr. Tato has been auxiliary bishop of the Buenos Aires Archdiocese, and acting head of the church in Argentina because of the illness of Santiago Luis Cardinal Copello. Msgr. Novoa has been provicar of the archdiocese.

Monday the semi-official newspaper Democracia demanded that both bishops be expelled from Argentina.

The government charged that Msgr. Tato appeared at the front door of the Metropolitan Cathedral Saturday as a Corpus Christi procession—banned by the government—streamed by. It said he also appeared on a balcony to encourage the singing of hymns. Msgr. Tato was with more than 500 Catholics who took refuge in the Cardinal's Palace, adjoining the cathedral. Sunday night after rioting erupted outside the cathedral.

The move against the bishops caused a Peronist labor following massed for a nine-hour strike to demonstrate their loyalty to him in the church controversy.

False Complaint Filing Draws Year In County Jail

Judge Woodruff lectured the man on the seriousness of such a violation, then imposed the sentence.
