Jim Marshall of Oakland nipped reliever John Carmichael with a sacrifice fly scoring the tying marker. Then Bob DeGregorio of Hollywood slapped a 2-run single to win it and Don Eggert of Portland tripled.

Oak manager Lefty O'Doul used all but two of the 22 All-Stars on the roster. Gene Bearden, the lead of four star pitchers, got credit for the win.

San Diego got two runs in the sixth with three hits and a walk, then put up two more in the eighth to go ahead 4-3.

It was only their fantastic get-away at the start of the season

that kept Brooklyn comfortable on the last tour of the West. The Dodgers dropped five of nine against the four Western clubs, yet never were in danger of losing their lead.

And what little was trimmed off their first-place margin, the Dodgers got back at home. They won 13 of 16 in the last Ebbets Field stand.

Brooklyn is at Cincinnati tonight, opening a 12-game road trip with a mere 10 1/2-game edge over the runner-up Chicago Cubs. The Bruins are 3 1/2 ahead of the New York Giants, who have a three-game stay in Chicago.

Milwaukee, falling back to 500 in a 6-4 defeat at Cincinnati in the only major league game scheduled last night, are home to Philadelphia, with Pittsburgh at St. Louis.

Home runs marked the game at Cincinnati. Three were swatted by the Redlegs, including Ted Kluszewski's 18th and a three-run blast by Ray Jablonski in the fifth that put the Braves behind to stay. Ed Mathews got his 13th homer for Milwaukee, but Jackie Collum, who relieved Gerry Staley in the fourth, kept the Braves scoreless as the Redlegs replaced St. Louis in sixth place.

Back Home

In the American league, the Eastern teams are back home again and the picture isn't much changed from when they took off for the West two weeks ago. The New York Yankees still lead by 2 1/2, but the Bombers now know for sure the Cleveland Indians aren't dead. Not after the Tribe belted the Yanks for three straight after losing seven of eight.

Detroit opens a three-game set at Yankee Stadium, Cleveland, back to within a game of the second-place Chicago White Sox, have a two-night double date at Washington tonight.

Kansas City is at Boston for a day game today, with Chicago at Baltimore tonight.

Kaline Boosts Lead With .383 Bat Mark

NEW YORK — Young Al Kaline of the Detroit Tigers has opened up a commanding lead over teammate Harvey Kuenn in the American League batting race.

Only six points ahead of Kuenn a week ago, the surging Kaline bolted to a .383 average as Kuenn slumped to .341. The 20-year-old outfielder went 9-for-18 during the week to gain 11 points. Kuenn meanwhile, collected only four hits in 24 trips and lost 25 points.

Detroit's Olympic Games Chance Slim As Europe Makes 1960 Offer

PARIS (AP)—Four Americans were learning today what it is like to fight a continent.

They're fighting all Europe to get the 1960 games for Detroit. The International Olympic Committee, meeting here today, will award the game Thursday and Detroit's chances appear slim.

The big reason is that Europeans want the games for Europe.

What About Rome?

"We keep hearing that Rome is the front-running city for the 1960 games," said Fred Matthei, chief of the Detroit delegation, which also includes Jack Thompson, Doug Roby and Dick Ross.

"We also understand these people over here think Lausanne (Switzerland) is a strong contender," Matthei continued. "But we have not given up by any means. We have been trying to get the games since 1939 and we'll keep trying for a century if necessary."

Getting the Olympics must be tougher than getting the Big Four to visit your town. We don't want the people in the United States to get a defeatist complex merely because the games have not been held there since 1932.

Detroit Sued

"Detroit is wonderfully suited and outfitted to hold the Olympics and the United States certainly deserves the games more than it gets them."

But there's an unwritten rule of thumb in the IOC that one summer games should be held in Europe at least two thirds of the time. The 1956 games are to be held in Australia and that, said several influential members of the IOC, should take care of staging

Olympic Committee Okays Australian Prep Report

PARIS (AP)—The International Olympic Committee Tuesday voted approval of Australia's report on preparations for the 1956 summer games.

The Australian delegation was told not to let affairs lag again, and to try to reduce the per day cost of maintaining an athlete during the games from \$8.40 to about \$7.00.

Acceptance of the progress report is believed to be the last major intra-Olympic hurdle the Australians had to clear before the games begin Nov. 22, 1956. Delays in Australian preparations have caused some IOC members to threaten to hold the games elsewhere.

Low Bid Offered For Fish Ladder At Umpqua Falls

Teller Construction Co. of Portland has entered the apparent low bid for construction of a fish ladder around the South Umpqua falls, according to the engineering department of the Oregon State Game Commission.

The Teller bid was \$35,470. Three other bids were opened. They were: R. K. Sheldon Construction Co., Roseburg, \$37,782; Scharder Construction Co., Portland, \$41,000, and S. Ferche, Roseburg, \$41,600.

The commission will meet June 27 to consider bids.

The ladder will open up a new spawning ground above the falls. At present fish can negotiate the falls only at extremely high water. Location is approximately 21 miles east of Tiller.

Specifications call for a ladder approximately 160 feet long with a rise of slightly more than 17 feet. It will be concrete throughout, with a small gate and grillwork at one end. Boxes in the ladder will number 20 and will measure 20 feet long.
