### Shipping Tieup Hits East, Gulf

NEW YORK (AP)—A work stoppage by members of four seamen's unions hit American ships in East Coast and Gulf ports Thursday and threatened the travel plans of thousands of European vacationists.

### Brazilian Plane Crashes, 15 Dead

ASUNCION, Paraguay (AP)—A Brazilian airliner bearing 24 persons crashed in a heavy fog five miles from Asuncion early Thursday and 15 were reported killed or unaccounted for. Officers of the line, Panair do Brasil, said there were no known survivors. John Dowling, chief of Time Magazine's bureau in Buenos Aires, was among the 14 passengers. He was en route back to the Argentine capital from Sao Paulo, Brazil. The company implied Dowling was the son of actor Eddy Dowling—was dead or missing. His name was omitted from a list of the known survivors.

### National Guardsmen Prepare For Big Review

FT. LEWIS, Wash. (AP)—The 8,500 troops of the 41st National Guard Division worked a field problems Thursday and polished drill work as they prepared for Saturday's Governor's Day Review. The review to be given before Washington's Gov. Langdon represents representatives of Oregon's Gov. Paterson, will wind up the first week of training. Most units of the division were inspected in the field Wednesday by Maj. Gen. William F. Dean, Korean War hero and deputy commanding general of the Sixth Army.

Tie-up of half the nation's merchant fleet was threatened if a solution of the contract dispute with shipping lines was not resolved. These were the first swift developments in the shutdown that started at midnight following breakdown of negotiations: In New York, where work halted on 18 cargo ships, a mass meeting of 3,500 members of the CIO National Maritime Union shouted approval of their traditional "no contract, no work" policy. A union spokesman said an official strike vote would be taken "soon." The NMU is the biggest union involved.

### Adenauer Urges U.S. To Press Arms Reduction

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—Chancellor Konrad Adenauer of West Germany asked the United States today to prod Russia again for an agreement on controlled arms reduction. "The fate of this world and of peace" rests in the hands of "the two great world powers, The United States and the Soviet Union," the 79-year-old German leader said in a speech prepared for Harvard University commencement exercises. "Unless these two great powers agree on an important step in the direction of controlled disarmament," he said, "the present state of conflicts short of a major war will continue." President Eisenhower is scheduled to meet at Geneva July 18 with the Premiers of Russia, Britain and France. Adenauer has just concluded talks in Washington with Eisenhower, Secretary of State Dulles and others.

### Banker Ignores Holdup Men; Bandits Scared Off

DEER PARK, Wash. (AP)—The holdup attempt of two masked bandits at the Farmers and Merchants Bank fizzled Wednesday afternoon when the bank president ignored them and the postmaster scared them away. Charles O. Snapp, the bank president, thought it was a joke when one of the men stuck a gun through a window into an empty cashier's cage and announced, "This is a stickup." No one else did anything about it, either, until Howard Wohrle, the local postmaster walked in. He saw the masked men, turned and ran down the street. The bandits lit out in the opposite direction, making their getaway in an automobile which later was found abandoned north of town.

### West Coast Lumbermen's District Meeting Set

A district meeting of the West Coast Lumbermen's Assn. is scheduled in Roseburg tonight. Lumber manufacturers of the area will gather at the Hotel Unquaga. A social hour at 8 p.m. will precede a 7 p.m. no-host dinner. The lumbermen will consider the most significant changes in the 50-year history of west coast lumber grading. The association's executive vice president, H. V. Simpson, will explain proposed grading rule improvements. For the past two years, Simpson said, a regional committee of lumbermen has worked to improve old grading rules. They hope also to improve merchandising of western lumber. He stressed importance of the session.

### Officers Question Youth On Slaying Of 2 School Girls

WASHINGTON (AP)—Police investigating the slaying of two pre-teen schoolgirls in suburban Maryland questioned a former boy friend of one of the victims through most of Wednesday night then brought the 18-year-old back for more questions and a second lie detector test Thursday. Detective Sgt. Richard Pearson of Prince Georges County, Md., said the youth had written the girl a letter with a "threatening" tone after her father had discouraged his attentions. The detective said the boy also had acknowledged being in the recreation area near the University of Maryland where the bodies were found Wednesday, but denied any part in the shooting. The girls apparently were shot as they crossed the wooded area on their way to Northwestern High school Wednesday morning on the last day of school.



### Downpour Floods East Wyoming

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP)—A torrential downpour that flooded parts of Cheyenne and southeastern Wyoming Tuesday dumped 2.4 inches of rain—the most since 1926. The U. S. Weather Bureau reported 2.3 inches fell between 3 p. m. and 8 p. m. Nearly an inch of water fell during the first hour. Preceding the storm, skies west of Cheyenne were darkened by blue-grey billowing clouds, outlined sharply against the usual gray thunderheads. Temperatures dropped nearly 30 degrees as the clouds swept in. Less than an hour after the sky opened up with hail and rain, low-lying sections of Cheyenne were inundated by rushing water. A house in eastern Cheyenne was flooded to first-floor window sills. The Union Pacific tracks east of Cheyenne were washed out. An official said Wednesday all eastbound trains were being routed through Denver, and the tracks would be out all day.

### Speed Of Racing Cars Blamed For 79 Deaths

LE MANS, France (AP)—A British driver says the speed of the racing cars was responsible for the crash that claimed 79 lives during the Le Mans auto race. They were traveling at from 125 to 150 miles an hour. Lance Macklin, whose car was involved in the fatal accident, made the statement yesterday in testimony before a magistrate investigating last Saturday's crash. Macklin's Austin Healey was hit by a Mercedes Benz driven by Pierre Levegh. Levegh's car catapulted into the crowd and exploded.

### Strikers Tieup Sailing Of Hugs Queen Mary Ship

SOUTHAMPTON, England (AP)—Britain's wildest seamen's strike forced the 81,000-ton liner Queen Mary to cancel her New York sailing today and squeezed Britain's hurried passenger lines into a tight corner. The strikers had pinned their hopes on tying up the Mary, a pride of the great Cunard fleet. They were convinced her sailing would doom the walkout which already has tied up the 32,000-ton Mauretania and five other trans-Atlantic liners.

### Fire Inspection Program Planned For Roseburg

A month-long fire inspection program, to be conducted by the Roseburg Fire Dept., will start on Monday, according to Fire Chief W. E. Mills. The chief said the house-to-house campaign will be held only with the cooperation of house owners. Inspections will be voluntary, he said. Although it's hoped the campaign will be finished within a month, Mills said it will carry on until all areas of the city have been covered. Teams of one regularly employed fireman and a volunteer will conduct the inspections. Both men will be in uniform, and all members of the department and most volunteers will participate. Inspections of residences will start at 6 p.m. each week day and last until about 9 p.m. The firemen, with permission of householders, will inspect wiring, heating facilities, chimneys, storage spaces and the like, Mills said. The program is part of a statewide effort to reduce fire losses through proper preventative measures. Mills pointed out that home fires in Oregon occur at 30 a day, and average loss is \$370. Eighty-three per cent of the total fire loss claims occurred in dwellings in 1954. The fire chief emphasized that it is to a home-owner's benefit to cooperate in the prevention campaign.

### Authorities Lean To Kidnap-Murder Theory On Judge

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Authorities leaned toward a kidnap-murder theory today in the mysterious disappearance of Circuit Judge C. E. Chillingworth, prominent Florida jurist and his wife. "I hope this is only a kidnaping," said Sheriff John F. Kirk. "We are still at a loss as to what happened and as to what motive they might have had." The tall, thin, 58-year-old jurist and his wife, Marjorie, 47, were last seen by friends in Palm Beach Tuesday night and were reported missing from their oceanside summer home at nearby Manalapan, yesterday morning. Slender clues baffled state, county and city police investigators. Judge Chillingworth, a native of West Palm Beach, had been county judge for two years and circuit judge for 32.
