

Atomic Energy Committee Recommends New Projects

WASHINGTON — The Senate Atomic Energy Committee Tuesday recommended that Congress authorize new atomic projects to cost a total of \$267,709,000.

Details of the recommendations became public when a formal authorization bill was sent to the House.

Among the items is five million dollars for reactors to be furnished to other countries under the program announced by President Eisenhower last Saturday. The committee said it hoped the money would be spent "on the basis of each country matching the contributions of the United States."

The two biggest items in the bill are 25 million each for the development of a reactor to operate a surface ship and for a "power reactor development acceleration project."

Also approved were \$23,140,000 for a "submarine advanced reactor facility," \$17,853,000 for an "art construction project" in the atomic weapons field, and 15 million for "expansion of weapons material fabrication plant" at an unspecified location.

In numerous instances, the committee deleted the site of the project for security reasons. Approved projects for which the site was given included:

Aircraft nuclear propulsion program plant and test area, Arco, Idaho, \$13,000,000.

Modifications and expansions to aircraft nuclear propulsion ground test plant, Idaho, \$1,000,000.

Reactor core test facility, Arco, Idaho, \$600,000.

Reactor facilities modifications, Hanford, Wash., \$11,900,000.

Special reactor facility equipment, Hanford, \$5,600,000.

Child Clings To Life After Five-Story Fall

NEW YORK — Tiny Rose-Marie Marazzo clung to life Wednesday but remained in critical condition from a five-story fall Tuesday at the Long Island City apartment building.

The 3-year-old tot, who despite her age served as the "eyes" for her blind mother and partially blind father, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Marazzo, climbed out on a window ledge after her mother had put her in a nearby bed for a nap.

She fell to a grassy plot in the courtyard below, and suffered a broken leg and head injuries.

New Auditorium Due At Whitworth College
