

Committee Okays Military Public Works Measure

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Armed Services Committee here has approved a bill to authorize military public works estimated to cost \$2,368,698,000.

The amount is \$14,345,700 more than originally sought by the Defense Department.

The measure does not appropriate funds for construction of the various Army, Navy, Air Force and Central Intelligence Agency projects contained in the bill. A separate appropriation bill is required to do that. The money, if appropriated, will be available for use in the year beginning July 1.

The Army, which requested a total of \$543,365,000, was authorized to spend \$551,105,000. This included a last-minute addition of about eight million dollars for construction of a 500-bed Army hospital at Ft. Jackson, S. C.

The Navy's original request of \$581,197,300 was boosted to \$596,140,000. Contributing largely to the hike was another late action by the committee in approving \$11,465,000 for expansion of the Naval Academy's grounds by filling the Dewey-Santee basin of the Severn River. The fill is expected to add about 32 acres.

Argentine Paper Lists Cardinal As Infamous

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — The semi-official newspaper Democracia this week listed Santiago Luis Cardinal Copello, Roman Catholic primate of Argentina and three other members of the hierarchy in a "who's who in infamy."

Under the cardinal's photograph was the word "moneyslender."

The accompanying biographical notes asserted that he had imported luxury automobiles for resale on the black market and continued:

"Of him it may be said that he descends in a direct line from that other moneyslender that history knows under the name of Judas, raised to the category of a universal symbol of delirium for gold."

Also listed were the Rt. Rev. Miguel de Andrea, 78, titular bishop of Temnos and originator of the workers' homes project later superseded by the work of the Eva Peron Foundation; the Rt. Rev. Daniel Figueroa, head of the Argentine Catholic Action societies; and the Rt. Rev. Emilio Antonio di Pasquo, bishop of San Luis, who was called "general of the shock troops" of the Catholic Church in Argentina.

Democracia also published an editorial calling the Catholic Church "the Trojan Horse of all democracies."
