

Carole Jo Keeps Winning In Junior Golf Test; Perrault, Kabler Triumph

PORTLAND (AP) — Medalist Gar Hval moved into the semi-finals of the Oregon Golf Assn. junior tournament with a 7 and 6 victory over another Portlander, Tom Carter, Wednesday.

Keeping pace with him were Gordon Marlatt of Eugene, who downed Joe Hallmark, Roseburg, 4 and 3; Ron Weber of Prineville, who trimmed John Dunkin, Portland, 7 and 6; and Gary Geertsen of Eugene, who edged John Holmes, Astoria, 1 up.

Other favorites also win in other divisions.

Medalist Carole Jo Kabler, Sutherlin, defeated Rosemary Killen, Portland, 6 and 5, in the girls' division. Shirley Slegmund, Eugene, defeated Gretchen Glass, Pendleton, 2 and 1; and Sue DeVoe, Medford, ousted Elaine Porritt, Eugene, 6 and 5.

The remaining girls' match saw

Susan Small of Corvallis make a hole in one as she defeated Alice Hammer, Coos Bay. The ace came on the 132-yard 11th hole at Riverside Country Club. Miss Small, who used a 6-iron for the shot, had to play on to the 19th hole before winning.

The boys' medalist, Biff Lovett, Portland, also won again, downing George Mack, Portland, 6 and 4. In other boys' matches Bill Aubry, Corvallis, defeated Jerry Perrine, Portland, 3 and 2; Tom Hamlin, Medford, defeated Peter Geertsen, Eugene, 5 and 4; and David Munro, Portland, eliminated Bob Kelly, Portland, 4 and 3.

Other results included: Fifth flight — Larry Hiron, Eugene, defeated Chuck Allen, Eugene, 1 up; Ron Perrault, Roseburg, defeated Steve Jackson, 1 up.

US Open Golf Tournament Launched In San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Golf's blue ribbon tournament, the 55th annual United States Open, was underway Thursday with 161 players in a bid to win the crown worn by Ed Furgol a man who may prove tough to dethrone.

Seventy-two holes of competition were ahead of the field of 130 professionals and 32 amateurs, concluding with the exacting double round of 36 Saturday. Most of the experts predicted the winning score would be over par 280 for the route.

The great, the near great and the hopeful were entered, ranging from 58 year old Bobby Cruickshank of the old timer division, Ben Hogan of the present era to a 17-year-old youngster from Washington, D. C., Beane Deman.

Few of the sideline observers could settle on a single favorite. The list of so-called solid threats included Furgol, the defending champion; Hogan, hoping to become the first golfer to win this event five times; Cary Middlecott; Sam Snead; Byron Nelson, all of the established star ranks. Then there were Gene Littler, Mike Souchak, Bo Wininger and others of the younger men, as well as perhaps the leading amateur in the

lineup, ex-British Amateur champion Harvie Ward Jr. of San Francisco.

The rolling, tree-trimmed lake course of the Olympic Country Club is the scene. It measures a comparatively short 6,700 yards, with par 35-35-70. But the rough has been allowed to get extra rough. And trouble, at least in practice rounds earlier in the week, was not hard to find.

Uncertain weather, no stranger in these parts, was also a factor to be considered during the tournament.

OMAHA (AP) — Western Michigan and Wake Forest go after the NCAA college World Series championship Thursday night in a true little game.

Manager Marty Marion's busier than a one-legged man in a sack race these days what with keeping his Chicago White Sox within range of the New York Yankees and holding off the Cleveland Indians.

He had a workout last night, juggling players and shuffling pitchers while splitting a two-night with Baltimore. The Sox lost 6-5, and won 2-0. That put them two games behind the American League-leading Yanks, who lost to Detroit 8-6, and a length ahead of the Indians, who lost at Washington 7-0.

Trailing 5-4 in the first game, Marion pulled center fielder Minnie Minoso in to play third and moved third baseman George Kell to first in place of young Ron Jackson so he could keep pinch hitter Bob Nieman in the game. Nieman, a long-ball threat, played left field.

Nieman wound up hitless, but Nellie Fox tied it at 5-5 with a homer. And when reliever Millard Howell went 3-0 against Harry Dorish in the seventh, Marion brought on Sandy Consuegra to pitch. Sandy got out of the frame, but was tagged for a run-scoring single by Bobby Young in the eighth that broke a four-game Chicago winning string.

In the nightcap, Mike Fornieles breezed alone for six innings on a 1-0 lead after Fox had swatted his second homer of the night. But when Fornieles issued his first walk to open the seventh, Marion called in Billy Pierce. And when Pierce faltered with a 2-0 lead in the eighth, Consuegra showed up again to pack it away.

Boston made it seven out of eight in the other AL game, beating Kansas City 9-6.

In the National, Brooklyn lost to Cincinnati 5-2, but stayed 11 1/2 games to the good as second-place Chicago lost to New York's Giants 7-2.

St. Louis belted three home runs to beat Pittsburgh 7-3 and Philadelphia blanked the Milwaukee Braves 4-0.

Winchester Bay Angling Is Fair

PORTLAND (AP) — Thanks to cooler weather, the fish are biting better in many Oregon streams and lakes. Conditions in some areas are fair to excellent and the best is yet to come, but there's still quite a bit of angling territory that isn't ready for mid-June exploration.

The weekly fishing outlook prepared by the Oregon State Game Commission reflects improvement over last week with "good" spots scattered all over the state. By areas, this is the fisherman's guide:

Northwest

Water conditions have improved on the McKenzie and Willamette rivers and fishing should get better if the weather continues mild. Trout angling is fair on the Trask, but only poor to fair on the Clackamas and Sandy. Lake Ann has been producing good catches of Eastern brook. Lake Lytle has yielded rainbow bow up to 18 inches. Bass are fair to good in Lytle, Marie and Spring lakes between Watseco and Manhattan.

Detroit Reservoir is still slow, although there have been some fair catches on bait. Lookout Point and Dorena reservoirs are fair, as are Linton, Hidden and Lost lakes. Clear Lake is good. Salmon angling is about finished in Tillamook Bay.

Southwest

Winchester Bay salmon angling rates fair. The pickup in trout angling has been noticeable at Tenmile lakes, all forks of the Coquille River, the Elk, Sixes, Chetco, Winchuck and Pistol rivers. Trout are scarce in the Rogue River because of muddy waters. The Applegate is clear, but angling throughout the upper Umpqua River area is generally slow. Upper South Umpqua and Cow creek are fair, and the same is true in the south fork of the Coos River.
