more heavily than at some other schools. Woodrich came to Oregon soon after his graduation, staying in Eugene until he had passed his bar examination. Reason for his choice of Oregon he said, was because he enjoys horseback riding, hunting and fishing. Oregon seems to be the place where he'd like to live.

His parents, incidentally, moved west at about the same time. Mr. and Mrs. George W. Woodrich live in Eugene, while a brother, George, lives in Roseburg and soon will take his bar examination. For the past few months, Woodrich has been associated with another attorney, Elmer G. Baldwin, in offices in the U.S. National Bank building. He has specialized in business law.

The appointee has no fraternal or service club affiliations, other than he is secretary of the county bar. Interested in music, he also plays a trumpet in the Roseburg Symphony Orchestra. He was married to the former Marilyn Trestler in Winona, Minn., in 1948 and they have a daughter, 3, and a son, 1. They live at 71 Royal Oaks Dr., Ridgewood.

Before he graduated from law school, Woodrich spent three years in the Army Air Corps as a communications officer during World War II. He attained the rank of first lieutenant and spent his service time at various air bases in the United States. He still is a standby member of the Air Force Reserve.

Before he's sworn in, probably by Judge Wimberly, on July 1, Woodrich will clear his desk of business matters. As one of seven circuit judges now in the Second Judicial District, Woodrich will stand election every six years. The first time his name will appear on the ballot will be in 1958.

Local Cherry Growers Advised To Spray Now

A warning to Douglas County residents to spray their cherry trees against the cherry fruit fly has been made by personnel at the station.

An entomologist at the station said the cherry fruit fly made its first emergence June 11. Sprays or dusts for control should be made before 10 days have elapsed from the fly's emergence, the entomologist said.

Teen-Age Boy Slain In Gang Warfare Battle

NEW YORK (AP) — Smoldering enmity between two juvenile gangs in Brooklyn has cost the life of a second teen-age boy.

Three gang members with a sawed-off .22 caliber rifle fired from a rooftop at two rival gang members walking along a sidewalk Thursday night.

"Go on and shoot again," defiantly shouted Fred Warren, 16, one of the two strollers, following the first shot or two.

The gun roared again and Warren fell dead with a bullet in the back of his head, as he scurried for a sheltering doorway.

His companion, Charles Faison, 16, managed to reach safety.

A few hours later police rounded up the trio which allegedly did the shooting—identified as Joseph Knowles, 16, and Alvin Edmonds and Ivy Foggy, both 15. All were charged with homicide.

Police said all involved in the case are Negroes. Officers said the shooting stemmed from an earlier killing in which 15-year-old Jesse Lipscomb was slain by Raymond Holley, 16, in a quarrel over a girl last October.

Rewards Being Offered For Judge And Wife

WEST PALM BEACH, Cal. (AP) — Rewards totaling \$11,500 were offered today for the return of missing Circuit Judge C. E. Chillingworth and his wife.

The family designated the Rev. Harry H. Waller, pastor of the First Methodist Church, as intermediary, indicating a belief the wealthy and highly respected couple may have been kidnaped.

Sheriff John F. Kirk, weary from two days of intensive search for clues, had no comment on the kidnaping theory.

The family, speaking through the sheriff, asked that "only persons who are positive concerning the Chillingworths' whereabouts contact Rev. Waller."

Fate Of Draft Measure Now Hangs In House

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower's request to the Senate Armed Services Committee for separate action on the administration's reserve program ran into rebuff Friday.

Chairman Russell (D-Ga) after an hour's closed-door session, said his committee had decided against action at this time because the Senate did not want to be in a position of trying to force or pressure the House.

The reserve program was shelved in the House after approval of a provision to bar segregation in reserve and national guard units. Sen. Jackson (D-Wash) said the bill seemed "hopelessly stalled in the House."

Sen. Saltonstall (R-Mass), ranking minority member, said Republicans on the Senate committee also agreed that "no action should be taken at this time."

U. S.-Bound Passengers Get Passage By Planes

LONDON (AP) — Cunard line officials chartered a fleet of planes Friday to carry more than 1,100 America-bound passengers stranded in Britain by a wildcat seamen's strike. The travelers will save at least \$14 on the deal—plus the tips they won't have to pay.

The 1,500 strikers, who have tied up eight transatlantic liners, were warned they face a draft into the army. Merchant seamen are exempt from the draft while at sea but can be called up if they go 14 days or more without a ship.

Maritime Union Votes For Strike Settlement

NEW YORK (AP) — By a voice vote, 5,140 CIO National Maritime Union members Friday shouted their approval of a new contract the end of a coastwide work stoppage.

The terms provide an unemployment benefit system for seamen. A meeting of the union sailors here, largest segment of the Galveston-to-Maine union, voted unanimous approval.

Partial basis for a settlement between the NMU and Atlantic and Gulf Coast shippers had been reached earlier, but details had not yet been ready for submission to the striking workers.

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Oakland Pioneer Dies Thursday

Arthur Mahoney, pioneer resident of the Oakland area, died Thursday at a Roseburg hospital after a short illness. He was 82.

Mahoney was born at Oakland at what now is known as "old town" Nov. 2, 1872. His education was received at Oakland. He taught in rural schools during early years.

He was married to Grace Carroll at Roseburg in 1902. She preceded him in death in 1904.

In 1902, he owned and operated the Roseburg Soda Works, located on North Main Street. From 1937 to 1943, he resided in Portland, but returned to Roseburg where he was custodian of the U. S. National Bank Building.

He is survived by two brothers, Harry and Paul, both of Oakland, and many nieces and nephews. Funeral services are scheduled Monday at 2 p.m. at the Presbyterian Community Church in Oakland. Dr. Homer Noble will officiate. Interment will follow at the Masonic Cemetery at Oakland. Stearns & Little Mortuary is in charge of arrangements.

Quarry Wall Collapse Kills One, Buries Second

EUGENE (AP) — A quarry wall collapsed on two men Thursday, killing one and burying the other for a half-hour before he could be rescued.

The fall of rocks killed Earl Allison, 45, outright. Wilston Endicott, 34, Springfield, was pinned in a large rock hauler he had been operating. He was freed in 30 minutes and hospitalized with bruises and back injuries.

Allison was operating a power shovel at the quarry, 12 miles west of Eugene.

Another man, Marshall Alexander, Dexter, operating an earth mover, narrowly escaped the falling rock. He called help to dig out Endicott and the body of Allison.

Trouble Shooting Team To Blast Burning Well

RENOVO, Pa. (AP) — An expert trouble-shooting team prepared to move 400 pounds of powerful explosives to the center of an intense natural gas well fire Friday in an effort to snuff out the inferno.

The crew, headed by famed Paul "Red" Adair arrived here from Houston, Tex., Friday morning and Adair reported after an exploratory trip to the center of the blaze that it would probably be a week before the well could be recapped.

The cover, or capping valve, of the well blew off Thursday morning and several hours later the huge rush of gas exploded into flames that have burned untold millions of cubic feet of natural gas.

Ten men were injured in the blast, one seriously.

Special Sutherlin Census Being Taken This Week

A special census in Sutherlin, which had a 1950 population of 2,230, is being taken this week after the City Council petitioned the Oregon secretary of state.

Six Junior Chamber of Commerce members were sworn in this week as special enumerators. It's anticipated that the count will be complete by next Wednesday.

The census was asked by the city in order to obtain more funds from the state in the form of gasoline and liquor tax refunds. If the city contains a population of 3,000, as believed by city officials, annual refunds will amount to about \$5,000.

Highway Commissioners Visit Susan Creek Park

Members of the State Highway Commission and various state highway development groups passed through Roseburg Thursday, pausing long enough to give the site of the new Susan Creek State Park a once-over.

They were met in Roseburg by Chamber of Commerce and city officials, the Douglas County Court and other officials, the entire entourage then drove up the North Umpqua River for lunch at Steamboat.

Inspection of the park site, dedicated to the state by the County Court this spring, was made in the early afternoon before the state officials continued on to Eugene.

The commission was in the last stages of a swing through western Oregon to inspect new highway construction and proposed park sites. It's expected that a new policy on acceptance and development of state parks will be established as the result of the trip.

Police Investigate Death Of American Newsmen

SINGAPORE (AP) — Police investigating the fatal beating of American news correspondent Gene D. Symonds tailed a Chinese truck driver today on charges of being a member of the mob believed responsible for the attack.

The driver, Og Ah Too, was ordered to stand trial July 24.

Symonds, a native of Dayton, Ohio, was beaten to death May 12 during riots that accompanied a bus workers' strike here.

The current wave of strikes in Singapore, meanwhile, seems to be waning. Nearly 300 of the 6,000 striking busmen returned to their jobs and elsewhere large groups of workers indicated a desire to go back to work.
