

Patterson Says Oregon Shouldn't Ask For Aid

SALEM (AP)—Gov. Paul Patterson said Wednesday that Oregon shouldn't accept federal funds to aid in construction of the \$100,000

outpatient clinic at the Oregon State Hospital.

The governor, presiding at the Board of Control meeting, said, "Oregon ought to build its own buildings."

He also said that state acceptance of federal funds might make it impossible for some cities to get federal hospital money, if the amounts are allocated by states.

Secretary of State Earl I. Newbrey said he'd like to get federal money for the clinic if it wouldn't hurt chances of any city to get aid.

NEW WOOLEN MILL

SALEM (AP)—Plans for construction of a \$150,000 woolen mill at Jefferson were announced Wednesday. It will employ 60 persons.

The plant, replacing a burned mill at Brownsville, will be financed by Salem and Jefferson interests.

Chicken Or Roast Beef Specialties For This Weekend

Fix up a chicken dinner for dad on Father's Day. Or tempt his palate with a roast of beef.

That's the advice food specialists are offering this week to budget-minded housewives. Chickens for broiling or frying (on the kitchen stove or the backyard barbecue) are probably the best buy you'll find in most U. S. food stores this week-end.

Turkeys are being offered at reduced prices in some cities, and one big food chain is featuring roast ducklings in its midwest stores. And there's a nationwide promotion this week in behalf of Cape Cod cranberry sauce, at marked-down prices.

Beef specialties include rib roast and top and bottom round. Sirloin steaks, however, are higher in price in most major cities.

Pork prices are still climbing—in some cities as much as 10 cents a pound. Prices of pork on the hoof are the highest since last September, and market analysts say they won't come down before July. Supplies—almost always on the short side in May and June—are tighter than usual this year.

Much of the pork that would normally be available this month was sent to market during the fall and winter.

Garden-fresh vegetables are in abundant supply in most areas of the country. Outstanding buys include cabbage, and the ingredients of a crisp, hot-weather salad: Lettuce, beets, cucumbers, radishes and green onions. Also plentiful and attractively priced are stringless beans, peppers, peas and corn.

300 Stalled Passengers Resume Eastward Trip

WINNEMUCCA, Nev. (AP)—Three hundred passengers stalled 24 hours by the derailment of the California Zephyr resumed their eastward journey Tuesday night aboard another train.

Ten of the streamliner's 12 cars left the track Monday night after a cloudburst had softened the roadbed across an alkali flat. No one was injured.

While waiting for the relief train from Salt Lake City, 400 miles to the east, passengers clustered around bonfires built of ripped up rail ties.

The Western Pacific maintained its Zephyr service between Chicago and San Francisco by routing the trains over Southern Pacific tracks between Sacramento and Elko, Nev.
