The Roseburg Chiefs, with a pair of interleague matches scheduled this weekend here, will have a slightly different look in all probability, according to Manager Hal Zurcher.

Zurcher, always with an eye peeled for new players, has come up with a top-flight infielder and one pitcher, possibly two.

Lou Scrivens, an off-and-on infielder with the Salem Senators the past two years, has been signed for the weekend series with Crescent City. Scrivens, from Portland, had college baseball experience at Willamette University and has played for Drain and Coos Bay-North Bend in the Southern Oregon League.

Two Hurlers Contacted

The Chiefs strengthened their weak mound staff with the addition of Corvallis' Dave Gambee, who twirled for the Oregon State College Hooks this past spring. And a friend of Gambee's, Ed Burns, has indicated he's interested in turning out here. Currently, Burns is hurling in eastern Oregon, but Gambee told Zurcher his pal can't hack the climate — he likes western Oregon.

That brings the mound staff up to a possible four, for reliable Don White and the new man who appeared for last weekend's

Grants Pass series. Don Whittaker, are expected to be in uniform. Otherwise, the lineup will be much the same as seen here in four Southern Oregon League contests during the past three weekends. A couple of players may not appear because the Crescent City doubleheader wasn't scheduled until midweek.

Sunday Game Early

A Saturday night encounter is billed for Finlay Field at 8 o'clock, and a Sunday game will follow at 1 p.m. The latter was scheduled early to allow the Crescent City nine time to get home at a reasonable hour.

Elsewhere in the loop, Roy Helsner's Drain Black Sox, which took a double nosedive to Coquille last weekend, will entertain Medford. The league-leading Coquille Loggers travels down the coast to Bandon, and Grants Pass goes over the mountains to Bend.

Zurcher said he's been satisfied with his team's hitting so far this year. The Chiefs, in a multiple tie for second place in the circuit, have been rapping the ball consistently. It's been a weak mound corps that has given the manager insomnia.

Outfielder Jerry Waldrup, who first played against Grants Pass last weekend, collected five bingles in 11 trips, including a homer, for a nifty .455 plate average. Outfielder-catcher Dan Luby, with 11 for 25, follows with .440.
