Now that June the matrimonial month is upon us, photographic interest is focused on pictures of friends' and relatives' weddings. Wedding photography differs from other types in the frequency with which picture opportunities are presented. The following suggestions will help in preparing for them.
Before the wedding, there's the shot of the bride having her veil put on; a group picture of the attendants; one of the mother adjusting dad's tie; a view of the bride leaving the house on her father's arm. At the church, a picture can also be taken of the two ascending the steps, and of the groom and best man waiting (and perhaps worrying) in the vestry.

During the service, even if photography is permitted, the camera should be given a rest. After the ceremony, guests can be shown extending congratulations; and, when the newlyweds are leaving the church, they can be caught emerging into daylight — and a new life. The final shot here can show them in the car.
An important picture at the reception is the cutting of the cake. Others include views of the receiving line, admiring gifts, dancing, tossing of the bouquet and group pictures of the principals, relatives, and friends.
To complete the series, a full-length view can show the pair after they have changed; and, finally, a shot can be made of them in their car as they depart on the honeymoon.
