

Carole Jo Kabler Wins State Golf Title Again

Bantam Ben Hogan Moves Up In National Open Meet

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The shadow of "The Hawk" lay over the National Open Golf Tournament again today.

Ben Hogan, the limping four-time champion, dived "The Hawk" by his touring pro companions, was one stroke off the pace as the field of 58 squared away for the grueling 36-hole final of the 55th annual tournament.

Holding the lead, but looking over their shoulders at the man seeking an unprecedented fifth open title, were amateur Harvie Ward, Jr. of San Francisco and Tommy Bolt each with 144.

Hogan was backed with three others — two of them virtual unknowns on the golf circuit — with 145. Walker Inman Jr., of Augusta, Ga., and Jack Fleck of Davenport, Ia., equalled Hogan's 36-hole total. So did Julius Boros, the 1952 open titlist.

Ward, who flew straight home from Scotland after helping America win the Walker Cup this year, fired a par 70 to reach the halfway mark with a share of the lead.

"I definitely have the edge going into the last round," the former University of North Carolina athlete said.

The purse for the tournament is \$24,000, with winner pocketing \$6,000. Endorsements and personal appearances, however, raise the winner's pot to thousands of dollars more than that.

It took a 155 to qualify for today's windup — and defending champion Ed Furgol just made Sam Snead, from White Sulphur, W. Va., coined a slick 69, 10 strokes better than his horrible first-day score, for a 148, and professed no further fears.

Dr. Cary Middlecoff, the masters' champion, made it, too, with a 154.

Elimination Mat Bout Set Tonight

Georges Dusette, the popular Montreal wrestler on the professional circuit, will be giving away 16 pounds when he tangles with Ivan (Killer) Kameroff tonight in the Armory main event.

Kameroff weighs in at 220, and Dusette hits only 204.

But both have been signed for the elimination match for a shot at the Northwest heavyweight title because of some stellar performances here lately.

Kameroff has clobbered Gino Nicolone and Tommy Martindale on successive weekends, and Dusette last Sunday used his full Nelson to dump Thor Hagen.

The semi-final pits newcomer Gory Guerrero against John Arzon in a 30-minute or two-out-of-three fall match. The opener will introduce another newcomer, Johnie Foti, against Doug Donovan.

Fox Takes Lead In Poll For All-Star AL Berth

CHICAGO (AP)—Nellie Fox, the Chicago White Sox red-hot second baseman, took the American League lead for pivotman Saturday in the all star baseball poll.

Fox, who has lifted his average more than 35 points in the past week to .328, went ahead of Bobby Avila of Cleveland by 1,985 votes.

The latest figures give Fox 37,288 votes to 35,303 for Avila.

Seattle ran its victory chain to six games Friday night by trouncing the Seals 8-1 following a wild fifth inning when a rash of singles produced five runs for the Rainiers. Pitcher John Oldham led the Seals to two hits.

Portland, meanwhile, moved into a tie with Oakland for fourth place by shading Hollywood 3-1 behind the 3-hit pitching of southpaw Royce Lint. Joe Taylor and Carl Powis hit home runs for the Beavers.

A first-inning fist fight highlighted Friday night's game at Sacramento, which the cellar-dwelling Solons lost to Los Angeles, 3-0.

The Chiefs are at home tonight and Sunday afternoon in a two-game series with Crescent City of the Northern California League.

No information is available on strength of the Californians, but the league they play in is usually loaded with kids from northern California colleges.

Manager Hal Zurcher said he'll start Ron Whittaker against Crescent City tonight at 8 o'clock. Whittaker, a University of Oregon frosh baseballer this past spring, has a mean fast ball which should eventually become an effective

pitch when he learns to control it.

A new face will be in the lineup in the two games. Lou Scriven, former Salem Senator and Willamette University Bearcat, is slated to start at shortstop.

On Sunday, a second newcomer may be on the mound in the person of Dave Gambee, Oregon State College freshman last spring and former Corvallis High School athlete great.

The game was scheduled only Wednesday, and Zurcher said his mound staff and infield may be weakened because two men are vacationing. They are hurler Don White and first-baseman Bob Christiansen.

The manager has placed John Ferrell, familiar here of seasons past, on the first sack. Tony Arana, Shrine griddler from Vale, will start at second and Lee Waters, another vet of the Chiefs, will be on third.

In the outfield, Jerry Waldrop, U. of O. frosh, will be in left, Zurcher in center and Bill Harper in right. Dan Luby, just out of South Salem High School and son of Salem Manager Hugh Luby, will start behind the plate. The lineup will remain the same for the Sunday game, scheduled to begin at 1 p.m.

Then George Kell, the third baseman with the back miseries, fouled off Whitey Ford's attempt to give him an intentional pass on a 3-1 count and followed with a single that scored Nellie Fox with the winning run in the ninth.

Fox had gotten the fourth hit off Ford (7-3) to run his consecutive game streak to 13.

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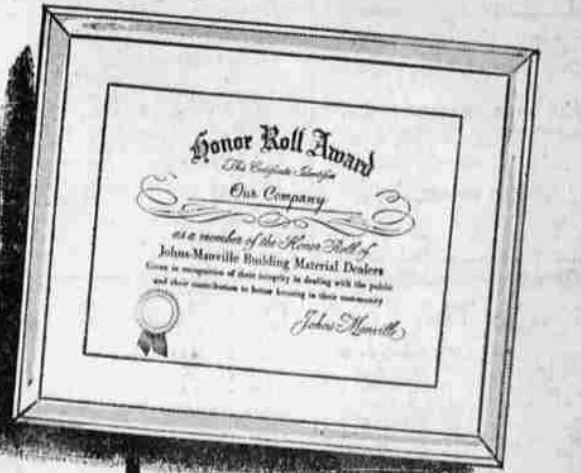
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
