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Three Roseburg Girls To Attend Conference

Charlene Boyles, Carmen Ford and Joleen Lyda, who are featured on today's society feature page, will represent the local YMCA at the Centennial Conference of the World's Alliance of YMCAs, being held in Paris, France, this August.

The Pacific Northwest Area delegation of 30 high school youth are a part of the United States delegation of 450 who will meet in a conference of 2,000 youths from 78 nations celebrating the 100th anniversary of the first International YMCA Convention held in Paris, France, in 1855.

Trained and experienced adult leadership for the group is being provided by the Pacific Northwest Area Council of YMCAs, whose headquarters is in Seattle. These leaders will be assisted throughout Europe by YMCA executives of the several nations to be visited.

Theme of the World Conference will be "Living Together in Community, Nation and World." Three languages, English, French and German, will be official at the conference and copies of all speeches will be provided to the delegates in the language of their choice.

Delegates will be housed together in "language groups" at the Cite Universitaire de Paris, each "language group" including delegates from several nations. These groups will discuss the problems of the youth of all nations and ways in which they can cooperate in building a more friendly and peaceful world.

The Pacific Northwest delegation will sail from Vancouver, B.C. on the RMS Orsoya of the Orient Lines June 21 and be joined in Long Beach, Calif., by the Pacific Southwest delegation. Cruising through the Panama Canal to Trinidad and then to Southampton,

England, they will spend 29 days before the opening of the conference in a tour of seven European nations, where they will have opportunity to meet the youth of Europe in their homes and camps as well as to see the historic and interesting sights which universally attract world travelers.

Following the conference in Paris the group will fly back to New York, where they will stop two days to see points of interest and then will go by train to Washington D.C., for a day's stop and then continue the transatlantic trip by railroad arriving in Portland Sept. 1.

All three of the Roseburg delegates are being entirely financed by their respective families.

To advertise Roseburg as the timber capital of the nation, the girls are taking plywood patches with seals bearing information regarding the timber capital. The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce assisted with this project.
