

Argentine Rebel Leaders Give Cause For Failure

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina—Federal police announced Saturday the arrest of two more Roman Catholic priests, bringing to 85 the total seized in the past seven months.

They were identified as the Fathers Jose Dardi, an Italian, and Juan Grillo, a Yugoslav, taken into custody in Bragado in Buenos Aires province.

Most of the 85 taken into custody have been released after brief periods of detention.

"A Montevideo dispatch said a broadcast heard there reported the Argentine Ministry of Interior had ordered release of all priests now held under arrest. This was not borne out in the dispatch from Buenos Aires."

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay—Some units of the Argentine Army promised to support the Navy in its Thursday revolt but backed down, naval officers in refuge from Argentina declared Saturday.

The 120 officers and men who took refuge in Uruguay Thursday night had been held incommunicado. Saturday the Uruguan government permitted reporters to talk freely with some of them.

They said the Army action, plus fog, was responsible for the rebellion's failure. By their account, some army units had pledged their support in advance, but failed to come out at the crucial deadline.

Navy planes, plus some from the Air Force, landed at the big Buenos Aires airport of Ezeiza and the Moron military field, which Navy forces held for hours. Two hundred Marines dislodged

Peron forces guarding Ezeiza, the commercial airport.

The revolt started later than planned because a Navy plane due to give the starting signal by flying low over Buenos Aires was delayed by mechanical trouble.

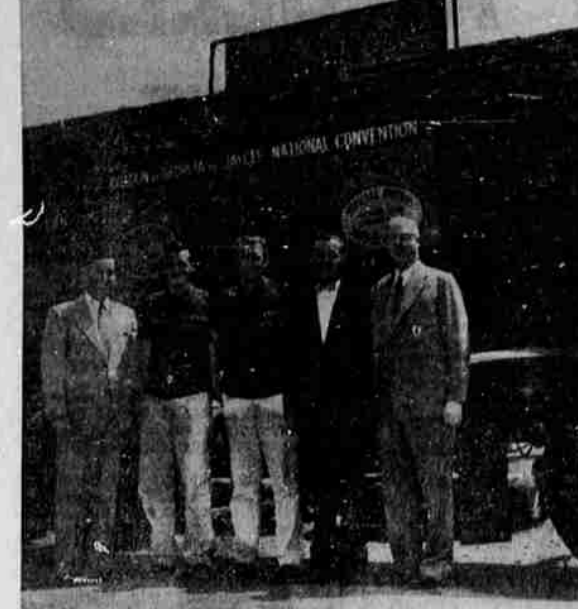
Navy planes made a series of sorties, returning to the Punta Indio Ezeiza and Moron bases for refueling. One plane claimed 14 bomb drops on or around Government House in Buenos Aires. Others sought to bomb the federal police headquarters but were unable to sight it through fog and smoke, and withheld their explosives.

All the pilots denied they deliberately bombed crowds gathered in Plaza de Mayo, the square in downtown Buenos Aires on which Government House and the Metropolitan Cathedral front. They said comparatively few civilians were gathered near Government House when the attack began.

The pilots said the fog not only prevented accurate bombing but also delayed the arrival of warships due to join the attack.

The attack began just before noon Thursday. Army regiments recaptured the airfields in mid-afternoon while a small column was marching toward Government House. It was stopped by Army tanks.

When they were unable to refuel at the Army-occupied fields, commanders ordered the pilots to fly toward Uruguay.
