

USC Snares Win In NCAA

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A bunch of record-breaking collegians have shown that the United States next year could have its best Olympic track and field team in history. "From the standpoint of performance, I think it'll be the greatest we've ever had," said Minnesota's Jim Kelly, chairman of this nation's Olympic Track Committee.

He had watched five NCAA records broken and one tied in the meet ending Saturday. This week he goes to Boulder, Colo., to see many of these same college stars and other amateurs compete in the national AAU event.

The University of Southern California won the NCAA but not as easily as expected. It wasn't until two Trojan pole vaulters collected

TWO NW WINNERS
LOS ANGELES (AP) — Pacific Northwest athletes took first in two events in the National Collegiate Track and Field championships here Saturday.

Ken Reiser of Oregon won the two-mile event and Jim Bailey, also of Oregon, won the one-mile.

Bailey finished about three yards ahead of Dellinger. The time was 4:05.6 minutes.

10 points by finishing in a four-way tie for second place in that final event that the meet was decided. USC scored 42 points, UCLA 34; Kansas 30; Oregon 29; Northwestern 20; and Manhattan and Villanova 18 apiece.

The new meet records are:
Pole vault — 15 feet 1 inch by Don Bragg of Villanova who became the fifth collegian ever to clear 15 feet.

Javelin — 246 feet 1 inch by Les Blitner of Kansas, longest throw ever in college competition.

Half-mile — 1:49.5 by Tom Courtney of Fordham who led from start to finish.

High jump — 6 feet 11 1/2 inch by Ernie Shelton of USC who didn't miss until he failed three times trying to set world record at 7 feet.

220-yard dash around a curve — 20.9 seconds by Northwestern's Jim Golliday who was only double winner with victories in 100 and 220.

The 'Jills started off with a bang, but their bats couldn't match the blasting of the visiting Forest Grovers.

Mickey McKern gave the hosts a happy start in the inning by slugging a two run double. Successive singles by Donna Bashford and Claire Carter brought home another.

But the Meadowlarks turned loose a rash of hits in the second to equalize the tie. Five straight hits, including a double and a homer pushed across five runs for the visitors. Jan Rulin culminated the hitting with a bases-cumulated homer. It was the first of three Forest Grove homers in the game.

The Lumberjills went back into the lead in the fourth with a three-run rally. Consecutive singles by Gladys Oyler, Alta Gildersleeve and McKern pushed over the runs.

But the Larks went ahead for good in the top of the fifth. Again it was power batting. Joyce Hoodenpye tripled, and Ruth Adams blasted a homer. The third homer of the game came in the sixth. It was the second for Rulin. Bases were empty.

Hoodenpye collected another double in the seventh as the Larks added four more runs. She had four runs batted in during the game. Rulin had five.

Joe Ginsberg's bases-loaded double and Gene Verble's two-run single were the key Seattle blows in a five-run sixth inning of the Sunday nightcap.

In the opener Seattle handed Seals hurler Gene Bearden his third loss. Seattle pitcher Elmer Singleton and Vic Lombardi held the Seals to three hits in the nightcap.

Portland slugged 15 hits in the opener including Joe Taylor's two-run homer in the first inning. Star hurler Red Munger held a 1-0 lead until the fifth in the second game but the Beavers piled up three runs in the sixth and two more in the seventh on six hits and two errors.
