## Secretary Stevens Resigns Post

### W. Brucker Is Nominated As Successor

WASHINGTON (AP) — Robert T. Stevens resigned Wednesday as secretary of the Army, and President Eisenhower nominated William M. Brucker, general counsel of the Defense Department, to succeed him.

Stevens gave "compelling personal considerations" as his reason for quitting. He was a principal in last year's row between Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) and top Pentagon officials, but neither he nor Eisenhower, who accepted the resignation, made any reference to that spectacular event.

Brucker, a former governor of Michigan, has been general counsel at the Pentagon since April, 1954. He will be 61 Thursday. His home is in Detroit.

The White House announced Stevens' resignation and made public a letter in which the President accepted it "with deep regret" just before Eisenhower left on a six-day tour of New England.

Stevens, 55, will leave the Pentagon about the end of July. He told Eisenhower he would work out the precise date with Secretary of Defense Wilson. He took over the post on Feb. 2, 1953.

Stevens' resignation came a year after his spectacular clash with McCarthy over the question of subversion in the Army and of alleged favored treatment for a one-time McCarthy aide, Pvt. G. David Schine.

Previously the Army's general counsel, John G. Adams, quit his post in the aftermath of the hearings and so did McCarthy's top aide, Roy M. Cohn. Both Cohn and Adams were principals in the 1954 dispute.

Brucker was governor of Michigan from January, 1951, to the end of December, 1952. Previously he was Michigan's attorney general.

A native of Saginaw, Brucker is a Republican. So is Stevens.

### Molotov Asks Dedication To World Peace

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov Wednesday called upon the United Nations to dedicate itself to the task of cementing world peace.

He declared the Soviet Union would do all it could to support the U. N. in this endeavor.

"We are now entering a new decade," Molotov said.

"The responsibility of the United Nations for the future of the nations for peace and the welfare of mankind has never been greater."

"Every act of the United Nations should be imbued with the realization of that high responsibility."

Molotov spoke before the 60 delegations of the U. N. on the third day of their 10th anniversary session. He laid heavy stress on the role of the world organization as a center for harmonizing nations and resolving international problems.

"The United Nations can and should play an outstanding part in the efforts to cement peace," he declared.

"The United Nations should do all it can to put an end to existing international tension and to facilitate the achieving of mutual trust among the nations, an achievement which would meet the desires of the peoples for peace and for a tranquil and peaceful life."

Molotov, apparently seeking to avoid a controversy, did not make a specified demand for a formal peace declaration by the anniversary meeting. He had found Western opposition to any formal action.

Molotov spoke after Gen. Carlos P. Romulo of the Philippines, a former president of the U. N. General Assembly, urged the 60 nations to approve a peace pledge to be known as "the San Francisco declaration."

"I have been impressed," Romulo said, "with the growing feeling that this anniversary meeting should, in some way, produce the words that would enable people everywhere to be convinced that we are not only all for peace, that we speak for people who yearn for peace, but that we pledge our governments to the achievement."

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### Polio Expert Recommends Vaccine Halt

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dr. Albert R. Sabin, a leading polio expert, recommended Wednesday that inoculations be suspended and the manufacture of Salk vaccine discontinued until, as he put it, a less dangerous preparation can be perfected.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dr. Jonas E. Salk said Wednesday that children who already have received Salk immunity injections "is so highly improbable as hardly to merit consideration."

The question of "association cases" arose as Dr. Salk, developer of the vaccine, appeared in company with 14 other of the nation's foremost polio authorities before a House commerce subcommittee.

"It is clear that children who receive properly prepared vaccine do not transmit disease to adults, because they do not have the disease," Salk told the congressmen.

Then under further questioning by Rep. Hayworth (D-Mich.) who said authorities of one New Jersey community ordered vaccinated children to keep away from school.

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### Conferees Vote Federal Workers 7 1/2 Cent Pay Raise

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate House conferees agreed Wednesday on a bill raising salaries of 1,073,262 federal employees 7 1/2 per cent retroactive to March 1.

The Senate conferees obtained only a few minor increases in the raises voted by the House. The Senate originally had passed a 10 per cent pay increase measure; the House on Monday voted for 7 1/2 per cent.

Some of the conferees said they had been advised President Eisenhower would accept no more than 7 1/2 per cent.

The increases, which will total about \$28 million annually, apply to 983,057 classified civil service employees and about 90,205 related workers.

Sen. Olin D. Johnston (D-S.C.) had said earlier the Senate conferees would fight to give the rank-and-file federal employees an 8 per cent pay raise.

The half million postal workers already have been given a raise averaging 8 per cent.

### Argentina Sets All Political Prisoners Free

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — Political prisoners arrested in connection with last week's revolt against the government of President Juan D. Peron are being released, the government announced Wednesday.

The order frees political opponents of the government such as Crisologo Larraide, leader of the Radical Party, who were jailed during and after the trouble.

The rebels themselves—mostly navy fliers and marine corps personnel—are to be tried by the Supreme Council of the Armed Forces.

The government announcement said it had been decided to release political prisoners "in the interests of restoring complete tranquility throughout the nation."

A communique earlier from Maj. Gen. Franklin Lucero, army minister and commander in chief of the "forces of repression," reported all of Argentina absolutely calm. Troops guarding public buildings and churches in the capital since the uprising last Thursday were sent back to their barracks Wednesday.

Police in Rosario, capital of Santa Fe Province and Argentina's second largest city, announced that 21 Communists had been arrested for distributing subversive leaflets and violating the state security decree.

### McCarthy Rebuked In Try To Steer Big Four Session

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee Wednesday unanimously expressed "complete confidence" that President Eisenhower will express the views of the American people and negotiate successfully at the coming Big Four meeting.

In a report to the Senate the committee urged it to reject a resolution by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) aimed at forcing the Big Four to discuss the question of Soviet satellites. It said McCarthy's resolution "would be meaningless if not actually harmful."

Confronted with this committee stand, McCarthy told reporters as the Senate began debate that he would change his resolution and ask that the Senate simply go on record as favoring the "humanitarian objectives" of freeing the peoples of the Communist satellite nations.

He added that he believes the result will be a resolution "pretty hard for anyone to vote against."

The report added:

"... It (the resolution) would have the effect of expressing a lack of confidence in the President at a critical juncture in world history when American unity in foreign affairs is particularly important."

All but one of the 15 committee members signed the report. The 15th, Sen. Langer (D-Ind.), was not on hand for Tuesday's 14-0 vote recommending that the resolution be rejected by the Senate.

Leaders aimed for a Senate vote by nightfall. All signs pointed to a thumping rejection of the resolution, which would amount in effect to a rebuke to McCarthy for what Sen. Barkley (D-Ky.) termed the attempt to "bargain in on" the President.

### Mario Scelba Resigns Italy Premier Post

ROME (AP) — Premier Mario Scelba Wednesday turned in the resignation of the coalition government with which for 15 months he has battled Italian communism and backed the West.

Even as Scelba was closeted with President Giovanni Gronchi in the Quirinale Palace, a communique from Wednesday morning's heated cabinet session said:

"The Council of Ministers agreed unanimously on the presentation to the President of the resignations of the entire cabinet."

Scelba remained in the presidential palace an hour. The tough little Sicilian premier came out visibly moved.

"I have handed it in," he told a reporter. "I have done my duty. I leave with perfect serenity."

He expressed the hope that "the crisis may now be soon resolved."

Scelba's government came to a crisis Tuesday night when his own big Christian Democratic party walked out on his coalition and one of his rebellious minor party allies refused to return to the fold.

A Quirinale communique announced that, as is customary, the President reserves decision on the resignation pending conferences with senior statesmen and party leaders on the formation of a new government.

### Competition, Parade Open To Public

Color Will Keynote Much Of Convention In Three-Day Session

Delegates from the Oregon Eagles Aerie and its auxiliary, 1,500 strong, are expected to start arriving in Roseburg tonight to remain here in the aerie's 40th annual convention until Saturday evening.

Color will keynote as much of the convention as the public sees. Most sessions will be off the public record, but townspeople will be able to see spectators at two main items on the three-day convention program.

Friday at 7 p.m., drill teams and drum corps from throughout the state, will engage in competitive drills at Finlay Field, where the high school plays football. Saturday at 1 p.m., the drill teams and other marching units will parade through downtown streets.

Selection of Roseburg as this year's convention site coincides with the 30th anniversary of institution of the local aerie. The local lodge has grown until now it owns its own hall on South Stephens Street and leases business space in the building.

Convention-goers will utilize a number of meeting places: Finlay Field, Eagles Hall, Elks Lodge, Central Junior High School, Odd Fellows Hall and Knights of Pythias Hall.

The big gathering actually is a joint convention, with the state aerie and the auxiliary holding separate sessions.

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### Timber Access Road Being Built

A crew from the Watts Construction Co. this week started work on a two-mile timber access road on the south side of Singe Creek bridge, according to Mrs. Arthur Selby, Glade correspondent.

The road was started last year for the Bureau of Public Roads but only 30 per cent has been completed, Watts' Supt. Fred Smith told the correspondent.

Completion of the road will open access to 26 million board feet of Douglas fir and sugar pine on Ragged Ridge. The timber was sold in May by the Forest Service to Martin Bros. Box Co. for nearly a million dollars.

The construction company has leased cabins and the lodge at the Circle-H Ranch above Rock Creek. The lease includes an 80-acre area on which trailers can be parked.

### Winston Approves City Budget In Second Try

The city of Winston has an approved budget.

Voters Tuesday approved a special tax levy of \$12,385.79 outside the 6 per cent limitation by a ballot of 100 to 72, reports News-Review Correspondent Mrs. Ted Peterson. The total budget for the city is \$60,908.40.

The winning budget was identical to that turned down by Winston residents June 1. At that time only 100 persons voted and the budget went down 53-45.

Council and budget members agreed to resubmit the proposal "as is" rather than deplete city services. Voting was held in the city office from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

### Roberts Creek Boundary Change Hearing June 30

A public hearing on requested changes in the boundary of the Roberts Creek School District will be held June 30 at the Douglas County Court House.

The hearing will start at 10:30 a.m. in the county court offices, according to County School Supt. Kenneth F. Barneburg.

If granted the requested changes would leave a district with only six or seven school age children, a schoolhouse and about one half the current valuation, Barneburg said.

Four residents of School District 37 (a non-high district) requested the boundary change June 2. They ask the county's boundary board (county court members and Barneburg) to put a small portion of the district in the Glade School District and place the "Clark's Branch" area in the Myrtle Creek School District.

Supt. Barneburg said representatives from the school districts involved would be present.

### School Addition Bid Openings Set At Riddle

Bids will be opened July 15 at 8 p.m. for construction of the new addition to the Riddle Elementary School.

The new addition will be more than twice as large as the existing "starter" unit, which was built in 1949 and expanded in 1952. It contains eight classrooms, a small office and a boiler room.

The new addition will consist of 12 classrooms, a library, a gymnasium with stage, shower and locker rooms for boys and girls and toilet rooms. The specifications call for matching architecture with the starter unit.

Target date for completion of the classrooms is January 1956. Plans and specifications are available at the office of McCoy and Bradbury, architects at Vancouver, Wash.

The sealed bids will be opened and read at the high school office July 15 at 8 p.m.

The construction was made possible March 23, when the heaviest turnout of Riddle voters approved a construction bond issue of \$273,000. The issue had been recommended by a 21-member lay advisory committee.

### Governor Names Boxcar Shortage Committeemen

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Paul Patterson appointed a 13-member committee Wednesday to try to solve Oregon's boxcar shortage.

This emergency transportation committee, representing varied interests, will work with Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Heltzel.

Stan E. Sherwood, Coquille, was named chairman.

The committee includes Earl Biele, sales manager of Roseburg Lumber Co., Roseburg, and John F. Buchanan, manager, Douglas Studds, Sutherlin.

### New City Patrolman Employed At Riddle

A new patrolman has been hired at Riddle, reports correspondent Erma Best.

He is Edwin R. Alexander, 42. He comes to Riddle from Crescent City, Calif. He will take over his duties Friday. He has a wife and four children.

His experience includes two years on the force at Crescent City and 10 years in police work in Alaska.

The city had earlier accepted the application of another Crescent City man for the job. He is Herschel Scott, who was to begin work in Riddle Monday. He, however, reported he had taken other employment.

### Innocence Plea To Captive Game Charge Entered

Ruby Rose Alexander, 27, Idlewild, pleaded innocent in district court Wednesday when arraigned on a charge of keeping a game animal in captivity.

Judge Warren A. Woodruff set bail at \$25, and the woman was released after posting that amount. She was cited last week-end by state police.

An officer said the woman allegedly had a 15-year-old fawn in captivity. He said there have been several recent violations reported in regard to people picking up fawns.

He said it is not only against the law, but bad for the deer. One fawn died before it could be returned to the woods. In most cases, fawns will survive if returned to the woods within 48 hours, the officer said. In some cases, people have been very cooperative in notifying police of straying fawns. In one instance, a woman living in Cloverdale Addition found a fawn on her lawn. It was returned to hills soon after she notified police.

### Teenagers' Job Placements Are Being Taken

An office employee of the Roseburg School District has greeted summer vacation days by working with youngsters as usual.

Mrs. Jeanne Bishop, herself the mother of three, has undertaken the task of finding teenagers jobs through the summer months. She's set up an employment agency for "kids" and is offering her service free of charge.

About 80 boys and 60 girls have applied for jobs through the agency in the past month. Now, Mrs. Bishop says all she needs is some jobs for them. She said almost any type of work will be accepted — for example yard work or car washing for the boys and baby sitting or housework for the girls.

Mrs. Bishop asked that persons needing help from the youngsters telephone her at OR 3-7032 or call on her at 1521 Alder St.

The idea came from a man in Bend, whose project was publicized in the Bend Bulletin. The newspaper's story said a juvenile delinquency problem there was being cleared up through the agency.

Mrs. Bishop decided to try the plan here. So far, she has found employment for about 10 teenagers.

The service originally was to run through the summer only, but now she hopes to continue it through the winter.

As Mrs. Bishop says: "A busy kid is a happy kid."

### Police Keep Lookout For Hit-And-Run Auto

Police were still on the lookout today for a car which bumped a pickup near Canyonville Sunday and forced the second car off the highway, according to Sheriff Ira C. Byrd.

A deputy who investigated said a pickup driven by John Vessel, Orange Cove, Calif., turned over several times and ended up in a ditch just north of Canyonville.

Vessel and three other occupants, Martha Vessel, Dorothy Vessel and Mrs. Pantroy Adams were taken to Forest Glen Hospital for emergency treatment. They were not seriously hurt.

Vessel told officers an unidentified car caused his vehicle to leave the road near "dead man's curve" north of Dodge Inn.

### Mrs. Roosevelt Gets Divorce From Jimmy

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Without any mention of her previous charges of misconduct, Mrs. Romelle Roosevelt won a default interlocutory decree of divorce Tuesday from Rep. James Roosevelt (D-Calif.). She alleged extreme cruelty.

Mrs. Roosevelt, former nurse, testified that the eldest son of Franklin D. Roosevelt was in the habit of staying out late at night, would not account for his movements, and finally told her he wanted a divorce.

Superior Judge Kurtz Kauffman approved as "fair and equitable" a property stipulation agreed to last June under which she receives \$1,625 a month for herself and their three young children, whose custody she retains.

### 162 Children Receive Salk Polio Inoculations

A total of 162 children received Salk polio inoculations at the clinic Tuesday, according to Dr. E. J. Wainwright, Douglas County health officer. The last clinic to administer first doses of vaccine will be held June 28 in the health office at the courthouse.

The second series of shots will be given July 6, 12 and 19, Dr. Wainwright said.

The first clinic held in Roseburg 228 children received inoculations. At the clinic held in Reedsport 80 shots were administered. A total of 470 shots have been given in the county.

Volunteers from the Red Cross and PTA units assisted in yesterday's clinic.

### Courthouse Construction Slowed By Lack Of Steel

Courthouse construction is still being slowed by lack of structural steel, according to Commissioner Elmer R. Metzger.

Steel will be shipped from Seattle, where it is being fabricated, on June 27, he said. Delivery will be about a month behind schedule. Actual erection will begin July 3, Metzger said.

Foundations for both new wings are now in, but work is continuing on each end of the present building, where the wings will connect. Walls are being knocked out to create corridors for the wings. Jackhammers and other equipment create much noise and make work in nearby offices difficult at times.

### Roseburg Marine Injured, Second Marine Is Killed

Marine Pfc. Michael D. Evans of Roseburg was slightly injured in a car collision near Santa Ana, Calif., Friday night. Another Marine passenger in the car was killed.

Evans is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Evans, 748 S. Pine St. He was on his way from Camp Pendleton to Los Angeles with four other Marines when the accident occurred, according to Mrs. Evans, who received a telephone call from her son. He was not the driver.

Evans received minor cuts and bruises and was taken to a hospital for observation. He was released the next morning.

The dead Marine was from Arkansas. Extent of injuries to other persons involved was not learned.

### Policeman Takes \$16,000 As TV Quiz Winnings

NEW YORK (AP) — Policeman Redmond O'Hanlon deferred to his responsibilities as a family man and took \$16,000 in TV quiz show winnings rather than risk it trying for \$32,000.

O'Hanlon, 39, a spare-time Shakespeare scholar, had run up his winnings with correct answers to questions on the CBS TV program "The \$64,000 Question."

Last night the New York City police officer was given a chance to double his money by taking a crack at another question. Had he missed, he would have lost the money but would have gotten an expensive automobile as a consolation prize. Had he known the answer, he would have won \$32,000 and chance to try for \$64,000 next week.

### Juvenile Court Action Pending Against Three

Juvenile court action is pending against three Myrtle Creek youths charged with malicious destruction of personal property.

The youths, two 16 years old and one 14, told a deputy sheriff they were involved in an incident June 15 in which an estimated \$1,500 to \$2,000 damage was done at Mt. Belle Lumber Co. operations near Dillard, Sheriff Ira C. Byrd said.

Three tractors were driven around at night at the logging operation, and one was left stranded on a stump. The boys were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Nina Pietzold, Canyonville.

### County Court Accepts Bid For Paving Of Road

The County Court has accepted a bid of \$3,985 by Roseburg Paving Co. for improvement to Sterling Drive north of Roseburg near Newton Creek Road.

The contract also stipulates an additional \$45 for each driveway put in. The work includes grading and rock of 450 feet, and surfacing with Class B asphaltic concrete.
