Meany Says Guaranteed Wage Demand To Spread

NEW YORK (AP) — George Meany, American Federation of Labor president, said Tuesday the guaranteed annual wage proposal is "going to hit every bargaining table in the next couple of years." However, he said, "it's up to each industry to handle the principle in a way suitable to it." Meany said the new Ford-CIO United Auto Workers Union contract, representing "for the first time in history, an employer at the bargaining table conceding he bears a share of responsibility for unemployment, over and above state unemployment benefits." Meany returned on the liner United States from Europe, where he attended the fourth biennial conference of the International Confederation of Free Trade Unions in Vienna. He plans to go to Washington Thursday.

Northwest Power Demand Expected To Double Soon

WASHINGTON (AP) — Power demands in Washington, Oregon and Northern Idaho are expected to double within the next 10 years, a witness told the Senate Appropriations Committee Monday. C. E. Erdahl, chairman of the Pacific Northwest Utilities Conference, testified that the area will need between 2 and 3 billion dollars for power facilities during that period. Urging the Senate committee to go along with the House in voting funds for projects already under way or planned, Erdahl said the anticipated power demand "means that work on multi-purpose projects, at The Dalles, McNary and Chief Joseph must go forward on schedule, or a power shortage will be imminent." He asked the committee to vote 63 1/2 million dollars for The Dalles, 18 million for Chief Joseph, 11 million for McNary, and \$500,000 planning fund for the John Day Dam. The House recently okayed these amounts in its public works appropriations bill. Others testifying and supporting the request for funds included A. H. Wegner of the Washington Water Power Co.; Bob Jones, chairman of the Seattle City Utilities Committee; Ralph H. Millsap, vice president of the Portland General Electric Co.; George Rogers, attorney for the Pacific Power & Light Co.; Alex Radin, general manager of the American Public Power Assn., and Ken Billington, executive secretary of the Washington Public Utility District Assn. Billington asked the committee to approve funds for a second Bonneville Power Administration transmission line of 115,000-volt capacity from Olympia to Aberdeen Wash.

Small Reclamation Job Authorizations Passed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Interior Committee Tuesday approved legislation to authorize a program for construction of small reclamation projects. The committee approved a House-passed bill's general provisions, then appointed a subcommittee to work out minor amendments. The bill would authorize appropriation of 100 million dollars for federal participation in non-federal projects costing up to 5 million—projects too small for the Reclamation Bureau.

Communist Navies Challenge Allies

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Growing Communist navies are challenging Allied supremacy in Pacific waters, Adm. Robert B. Carney, chief of naval operations, declared Tuesday.

The Soviet fleet shaping up in the Western Pacific and the Barents Sea is "venturing forth ever farther and farther from its own shores," said Adm. Carney. And he pointed out that an embryo Navy is forming under the flag of Red China. "We must be alert to the fact that Allied supremacy is again being challenged in the Pacific," Adm. Carney told the Los Angeles Advertising Club in a luncheon speech. "And the fact that it is threatened also signals a threat to the Pacific alliances of free peoples."

Democrats Show 12,071 Margin In Multnomah

PORTLAND (AP) — Names of 5,000 voters were taken from Multnomah County rolls Tuesday because they had not voted in the last two elections. This is required. James W. Gleason, elections registrar, said the party lineup in the county now is: Democrats 113,964, Republicans 101,893, margin for Democrats 12,071. Democrats suffered most heavily. Before the rolls were checked that party had a lead of 18,269.

Air Force Will Press Rocket Explosion Probe

PORTLAND (AP) — The Air Force pressed an investigation Tuesday into Monday's two-million-dollar rocket discharge at Portland Air Base, but gave little hint when an answer might be expected.

At least six safety precautions are intended to prevent accidental ground firing of rockets, but somehow a dozen from a parked F39 jet cut loose Monday. They destroyed two other jets, damaged a parked C46 transport plane and put a hole in the roof of a house a mile away. No one was hurt.

Norblad Question Why Danish Butter Bought

WASHINGTON (AP) — How come, Rep Norblad (R-Ore) asked the Army in effect Tuesday, Army post exchanges on Okinawa are selling Danish butter to American troops and personnel? Norblad put his question to Secretary of Army Stevens in a letter calling attention to more than 200 million pounds of surplus butter available in this country. Norblad said he became aware of the Danish butter sales when a friend brought him a wrapper from butter purchased on Okinawa.
