Robin Roberts may be the only pitcher in baseball who figures to be around for the second inning after getting clobbered for three home runs and blowing a 3-0 lead in the first.

That's the Robin's way. He gets hit the hardest, yet wins the most.

Even so, the ace of the Philadelphia Phils' staff must give Manager Mayo Smith fits.

Last night at St. Louis, he trailed 4-3 after the Cards whacked him for three homers, two in succession, in the first frame. Yet he stayed around and wound up with

his 13th complete game and 10th victory of the season, 9-6.

That put the Phils back in fifth place, a percentage point ahead of Cincinnati in the National League. The Redlegs lost 4-3 to the New York Giants, who ended a six-game losing streak. First-place Brooklyn edged Chicago 3-2, leaving the Cubs just half a game ahead of the third-place Milwaukee Braves, who whipped Pittsburgh 6-0.

Yanks 6, Athletics 1

In the American, the New York Yankees held their two-game lead by beating Kansas City 6-1. Runner-up Chicago trimmed Washington 3-0 and third-place Cleveland rapped Baltimore 5-0. Fast-climbing Boston defeated Detroit 12-7, leaving the Red Sox just a game short of the fourth-place Tigers.

Roberts, leading off with a double for the Phils, got a three-run rally going in the seventh that decided the game. The Phils had 14 hits—three by Roberts—off six St. Louis pitchers.

The Dodgers went behind Ed Roebuck's relief work after scoring an unearned run in the eighth on an error by Hal Jeffcoat, who lost in relief.

Home runs by Hank Thompson and Bobby Hofman broke a 2-2 tie for the Giants in the ninth as Sal Maglie beat Gerry Staley for his eighth straight victory. Warren Spahn kept the Braves

rolling, blanking the Bucs on six hits while contributing a one-on-one homer. Batterymate Del Crandall also homered off loser Max Surkont, who left in the seventh.

The White Sox breezed behind Dick Donovan's four-hitter. Wall Dropo knocked in two of the Sox runs. Loser Dean Stone and Bob Ramos stopped Nellie Fox's hitting streak at 17 games.

Early Wynn won his ninth while handing Baltimore its sixth shut-out in the last nine games. Cleveland had 15 hits, four by Al Smith.

Detroit rookie Frank Lary was rocked by the first of Ted Williams' three doubles and Norb Zauchin's three-run homer and left the game as the Red Sox went on to score six runs in the first inning. Winner Tom Brewer and Leo Kiely gave 15 hits, but eased in as Boston made it 13 out of 15.

Win-hungry Wenatchee, struggling to regain first place in the Northwest Baseball League, overpowered Eugene 18-10 Wednesday night and joined the Emeralds and Salem in a virtual three-way tie at the top of the pack.

Sparked by the addition of catcher Joe Rossi, a veteran of the Pacific Coast and major leagues, the Chiefs pounded three Eugene pitchers for 23 hits and climbed to within 17 percentage points of the Emeralds, Salem, idle Wednesday night, in between, nine points back of Eugene.

Wind and rain idled Salem at Spokane and Yakima at Tri-City. Rossi, who caught for Portland in the PCL last season and before that was with Cincinnati in the National League, carried a Wenatchee bat for the first time Wednesday night and rapped out a homer and two doubles as the Chiefs ended a losing streak at four straight.

His home run touched off the eight-run second inning. Herb Anderson also homered in that inning and Chuck Lundgren added a third round-tripper later. Jerry Zuvela blasted a triple, three singles and was walked twice.

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Spring Chinook Salmon Set Record In June's First Half

Spring chinook salmon migration in the North Umpqua River, after a slow start, set a new record for movement during the first two weeks of June.

William E. Pitney, in charge of Umpqua River studies, reports that more than twice as many salmon were tallied at the Winchester counting station from June 1 to 15 than in any corresponding period since records were started in 1946.

Apparently slowed down earlier by unfavorable water temperature, the migration for the first two weeks of June made a sensational gain, totaling 1,492 adult salmon and 474 jacks. Total adults as of June 15 was 4,192, only slightly behind the 5,005 fish tallied by the same date last year.

Inasmuch as the current migration represents offspring from the second smallest parent run on record, it will not be surprising, observers say, if this year's total falls below that of last year. The tally to date, however, is very encouraging. Records indicate that movement up to June 15 represents from 75 to 90 per cent of the total for the year. As migration was slow in starting, it is possible, it is pointed out, that the run up to this time is in the smaller percentage level.

The count of summer steelhead, showing a total of 339 fish for the first two weeks of the month, is slightly above average. Comparative figures are reported as follows:
