Lookout Point Dam Dedication Slated Saturday Afternoon

EUGENE (U) — Lookout Point Dam, one of the big units in the Willamette Valley project, will be dedicated Saturday. Some 10,000 persons are expected.

Sailboat races, water skiing and other sports will be held at the dam as well as the dedication ceremony.

George Roderick, assistant secretary of the Army, will give the principal dedication speech. There will be addresses, too, by Reps. Harris Ellsworth and Walter Norblad of Oregon and Walt Horan of Washington, and by Brig. Gen. E. C. Fischer, assistant chief of the U. S. Army Engineers.

The dedication ceremony will be from 2 to 3 p. m. The dam, about 18 miles southeast of here on the middle fork of the Willamette, was started six years ago. It is a smaller regulating dam downstream, cost some \$9 million dollars, and in addition to its primary function of flood control, will add some 115,000 kilowatts of electricity to the Northwest power pool.

Surgery which RESTORES THE POWER OF GROWTH to legs paralyzed by polio was described today by Dr. Joseph M. James of the Mayo clinic at Rochester, Minnesota.

Posse And Mounted Rift Appears Nearly Closed

Group To Unite Under Combined Organization

A rift which split the Douglas County Sheriff's Posse and led to formation of the Douglas County Mounted is now nearly closed.

At a meeting of both factions Thursday night, it was agreed the members of each will go back together and form an organization to be known as the Douglas County Mounted Sheriff's Posse.

Sheriff Ira C. Byrd said an organizational meeting will be held next week, at which time officers will be elected and a constitution drawn up.

The meeting will be held Thursday at the fairgrounds at 7:30 p. m. Also at that time, active members will be commissioned. Members taken into each organization since a split-up last October will also become members of the new organization.

Commissioned members will be able to take part in the annual "shooting" of the Oregon Assn. of Mounted Posse, to be held here in September.

Something new on the horizon is a junior posse organization, Sheriff Byrd said. Plans are under way to set up a junior posse, to be composed primarily of young people in the families of senior members.

A portion of the Mounted Sheriff's Posse will be trained in law enforcement work, Byrd said, on a voluntary basis. The unit will be used in emergencies, such as searches.

The Douglas County Sheriff's Posse was split last fall when a controversy led to the filing of a suit against 13 members by former Sheriff Calvin H. Blair.

Some of the 13 formed the nucleus of the Douglas County Mounted, and the same unit, along with others, met and elected its own sheriff's posse officers.

After Blair quit as sheriff, there have been several exploratory sessions to see what could be done to bring the men back together. They met last night, led by Sheriff Byrd, Mounted President Bill Tipton and others.

The suit which brought the split in the open is now presumed dead, since Blair is no longer the head of the posse.

Several factors are still to be resolved, but Thursday night's meeting indicates the whole problem will soon be resolved.

Air Force Man Slashes Wrist; Condition Good

A young Air Force man from Sutherlin, James D. Wilkinson Jr., is reported in good condition after allegedly slashing his wrist Wednesday evening.

Sutherlin and county officers said Wilkinson was treated by a Sutherlin physician, then rushed to the VA Hospital at Roseburg after the incident, on a Sutherlin street. Wilkinson, who arrived in Sutherlin Wednesday on a furlough, told officers he was having family troubles.

The wound is not serious.

SHOWERS PREDICTED

The five day weather forecast predicts showers about Monday with precipitation one-fourth to one-half inch. It will be warmer Saturday and Sunday, cooling Monday. Temperatures will be near normal with a maximum of 70 to 80 degrees and a minimum of 45 to 55 degrees.

Judge Hill Gives Report On Status Of Activities At Planning Group Meet

County Judge Carl C. Hill reported on the status of various planning activities Thursday night when the Douglas County Planning Commission met in the planning offices in the courthouse annex.

Hill said the County Court has under consideration an ordinance to adopt a building code and set up an inspector's office. The district attorney, he said, is drawing up an ordinance for adoption of county-wide subdivision regulations.

The judge and members of the commission also brought up the matter of long-range road planning in the county which members of the County Court have been discussing. Planning an ordinance, with emphasis on timber access, and setting up a financial means to bring about orderly development several years in advance is of prime importance to this area, the judge said.

J. Haskett Bell of Portland, consultant to the commission, was on hand to show some of the work being done in Wasco County, so that members could see how planning is developed.

A major thoroughfare plan for the Douglas area was shown, along with systematic neighborhood (suburban) development based on population necessary to support area elementary schools. Also shown were illustrations of park planning, including scenic drives along major thoroughfares.

Technicians Jim Coleman and Frank Johnson showed one of several maps now being compiled for Douglas County. The one shown deals with land use. It was explained by Bell, who pointed out the county areas of timber, cultivation or burned, grazing and agricultural land.

The meeting was presided over by Chairman John Felt. All but one of the members were present. The next session will be held on the fourth Thursday in July, the 28th.

The new structure is being used for storage and recapping facilities, and the office has been enlarged. The company is now a dealer in Firestone home and auto supplies, Clune said. It will cater to service of cars and trucks, with gasoline and diesel fuel pumps also part of the facilities.

Lasting Peace U.S. Goal, Says Eisenhower

With Eisenhower in New Hampshire (U) — President Eisenhower said Friday that if America remains strong "we will be able to lead the world toward that promised goal of lasting peace."

Speaking at Franconia Notch, at ceremonies marking the 150th anniversary of "Old Man of the Mountains"—a great stone face etched by nature—the President told an audience of about 2,500 persons.

"We would like to be at peace. We do not like to send our boys off into the armed services. We do not want to have the terrible things happen that could happen in a new war."

Eisenhower urged all Americans to try to achieve a better understanding of the people of other nations, and in this way "to bring about the great dream of mankind and reach a peaceful world."

Speaking against the backdrop of the famed mountain, Eisenhower said: "If we have sufficient devotion to the cause of peace we will be strong."

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Sutherlin Now Has Population Numbering 2,737

Sutherlin's population is now 2,737, an unofficial census count completed Thursday shows.

The count, an increase of 507 from the 1950 census, must now be certified at the secretary of state's office in Salem, according to City Manager McKimley.

The 1950 census showed a population of 2,230. The new figure indicates a 23 per cent increase in five years. The additional population means Sutherlin will receive about \$7.40 for each person, or about \$3,500 more, next year, in the distribution of gas and liquor monies by the state. The next distribution will be figured on June 30.

The census taking, started June 25, was handled by members of the Sutherlin Junior Chamber of Commerce. The club will be paid 5 cents per head for the job, with funds to go toward construction of a civic tennis court.

County PTA Presidents Will Meet In Roseburg

New presidents of the county's 30 local Parent-Teacher Assn. units will converge on Roseburg Saturday to report to the Douglas County Council executive committee on work accomplished on the local level during the past year.

The regular meeting starts at 11 a. m. It will be conducted by Mrs. Orville Smith of Sutherlin. Lunch will be served at noon, and the meeting will resume at 1 p. m.

The meeting will be held in Central Junior High School.

Two Young Drivers Get Jail Sentences, Fines

Two young drivers received jail sentences and fines in district court Friday after they pleaded guilty to drunken driving.

Priest Says President Peron Secretly Married

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (U) — The newspaper O Globo quotes a refugee Roman Catholic priest as saying that Argentine President Juan D. Peron is secretly married to a 19-year-old girl named Laura del Solar.

The newspaper attributed the report last night to the Rev. Jose Fernandez, who told newsmen he escaped from Buenos Aires to Assuncion, Paraguay, after the unsuccessful June 16 revolt in Argentina. He arrived here Wednesday.

Executives of four major Roseburg grocery stores contacted by the News-Review reported fair supplies of poultry and eggs on hand. At least two of them are supplied by local farmers.

The picture Friday indicated local markets would continue to supply poultry and eggs as needed. A spread of the strike to other unionized companies could hamper markets if it became impossible to receive poultry and egg shipments from outside this area.

There were no adverse effects to the local Oregon Egg Producers Co. Thursday and Manager Leeland Bloom anticipated no trouble. He said three of the plant's egg candlers were members of AFL Local 231 which has two members at the Northwest Poultry and Dairy Products Co.

Wheat Farmers Will Vote Saturday On Referendum For Continuing Of Quotas

Wheat farmers in Douglas County will vote Saturday in a referendum on whether they want marketing quotas on their 1956 crop.

Approval by two-thirds of those voting is necessary to put the quotas in effect. Voting in this county will be simple, according to Evan Green, county Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation office manager, since there are few wheat growers.

Those voting may do so at the ASC office, Pacific Building, Roseburg, between the hours of 9 a. m. and 8 p. m.

This is the third consecutive year marketing quotas, as well as acreage allotments, have been declared by the secretary of agriculture because of surplus supplies of wheat. The law requires the secretary to do so when the available supply is 20 per cent above "normal supply" level.

Available supply for the 1955-56 marketing year is estimated to be 66 per cent above normal, according to the Oregon State College Extension service. Last year Oregon farmers voted approved quotas.

If quotas are approved, producers staying within the acreage allotment for their farms will be eligible for the full level of price support. It is at least 76 per cent of parity or a national average of \$1.81 a bushel, according to a recent announcement from Secretary Benson. Wheat growers not complying with allotments are not eligible for price support and are subject to marketing penalties on their excess wheat if they have more than 15 acres for harvest.

Should growers not approve quotas, assistant extension director Ralph Brink says the law provides for a wheat price support level at 50 per cent of parity or \$1.19 a bushel average, for those who stay within their acreage allotments. In case of no quota farmers can exceed allotments with being subject to penalties.

Stop Using Force, Reds Are Advised

Secretary Says Seven Steps Not Necessary For Ending Cold War

SAN FRANCISCO (U) — Secretary of State John Foster Dulles told Russia in blunt language today that the way to end the cold war is to stop using force against other countries and to stop supporting subversion.

In a stinging attack on communism, Dulles declared: "To bring the cold war to an end, seven points are not needed; this one is sufficient."

The secretary spoke at the U.N.'s 10th anniversary meeting, which Wednesday heard Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov propose a seven-point program to liquidate the cold war.

Dulles spoke with President Eisenhower's "full confidence and concurrence." The President himself said so on Monday when he addressed the opening session. He told the delegates the secretary would speak today "for appropriate element in the foreign policy of this nation."

Dulles pulled no punches as he reviewed the role of communism in recent history. He agreed with Molotov that some problems had been settled recently, but he said they would have been settled years earlier except for the Communists.

"We do not forget," he said, "we dare not forget, that some of those who now hail the recent developments are precisely those who for years sought to stop them."

Dulles strongly defended the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and other regional organizations which Molotov blamed for the cold war.

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Portland Man Pleads Guilty To Mail Fraud

PORTLAND (U) — Morton L. Vines, former president of the Vines-Credit Jewelers here, Thursday pleaded guilty in federal court to four counts of mail fraud.

Vines, 37, recently was removed from his post in the firm where he was associated with his father and brother. The latter two were not involved in the case. Asst. U. S. Atty. James W. Morrell said.

Morrell said Vines wrote \$300,000 worth of fraudulent contracts which he sold to finance companies and a bank.

To do this he rented a number of postoffice boxes in Portland and nearby communities under the names of store front companies. Most of the customers had good credit ratings and the contracts were assigned without difficulty to the other agencies for collection.

Vines was released pending a pre-sentence investigation by the probation office.

Public Health Service Endorses Salk Vaccine

WASHINGTON (U) — The Public Health Service, agreeing with the opinion of a panel of medical experts, says "we continue to endorse the manufacture and use" of Salk polio vaccine.

The health service statement, reaffirming its earlier stand, was issued as the House Commerce Committee completed two days of unusual hearings in which researchers expressed opinions which added up to an 8-2 vote of confidence in the vaccine.

There still was no word, however, on how soon additional supplies of the vaccine might be available. A special vaccine clearance committee, which advises the health service met late yesterday, but took no action on supplies available clearance.

Molotov Changes Time Of Diplomatic Dinner

SAN FRANCISCO (U) — V. M. Molotov passed out word today that he has changed the time of a diplomatic dinner tonight so his guests can hear former President Harry S. Truman and then dine with him.

A diplomatic tempest raged Thursday at the 10th anniversary celebration of the U.N. over reports that Molotov deliberately arranged the dinner at the Russians' leased mansion to boycott Truman's speech.

BIKE LICENSES ON SALE

Bicycle licenses for 1955-56 now are on sale at the Roseburg Police Dept., according to Police Chief Stan Olson.

The licenses will be good for the coming fiscal year and cost 30 cents apiece. Olson said licensing is required in order to trace bicycles that are stolen or become lost.
