An order was filed in the county clerk's office Friday authorizing settlement of a claim for damages in connection with the death of Arthur Mahoney, 82.

Mahoney, pioneer resident of the Oakland area, died June 16 in a Roseburg hospital. It was alleged he died as the result of injuries received June 14 when struck by a Stearns & Little Mortuary vehicle driven by Vernon E. Little.

The accident occurred on Locust Street in Oakland, according to the petition filed by the estate administrator, H. E. Mahoney, brother and heir of the deceased.

The funeral for the deceased was held Monday with Stearns & Little Mortuary in charge of arrangements. Burial was at the Masonic Cemetery, Oakland.

Mother Confesses Placing Tiny Babe In Clothing Trunk

TACOMA (AP) — A 5-month-old girl, the object of a two-state search, was found Friday at the bottom of a clothing filled trunk in a rear bedroom of her home.

The infant, Nora Jean Saltzman, was reported in fair condition at Pierce County Hospital.

Mrs. Bonnie Lou Saltzman, 23, the child's mother, was being held here on an open charge.

Tacoma police disclosed Mrs. Saltzman admitted under questioning she put her baby in the trunk because "her crying made me nervous."

Friday afternoon police launched a search for the child in Oregon and Washington when Mrs. Saltzman told them she feared a relative had abducted her daughter.

Police estimated the child was jammed in a cardboard box at the bottom of the trunk for at least three hours.

4-Year Search For Heirs To Timber Parcel Ends

A four-year search for heirs to a 160-acre parcel of timber, originally allotted to an Indian woman 69 years ago, ended this week.

Harry Rapp, administrator of the estate of Quaima Pelland, and T. Leland Brown, attorney for the estate, have secured a patent on the land, located near the Bonanza mine eight miles east of Sutherlin. Soon it will be appraised and put up for bids.

The land originally was allotted to Caroline McKiah in 1885. When she died, her husband, David Voinin, inherited the land and he in turn bequeathed it to his sister, who after married a man named Pelland.

Finally, it came into the hands of Pelland's son, Onizimo, who was the father of Ada Parazo and Albert Pelland, both of Sutherlin. It was these two persons, plus long lost relatives, who had an interest in the property.

Power Line Extension Contract Is Awarded

PORTLAND (AP) — The Witzig Construction Co., Corvallis, Friday won a \$76,402 power line construction job by the Bonneville Power Administration.

The project calls for 6.3 miles of 230,000-volt lines to be built in the Reston-McKinley stretch of the Alvey-Reston line in Southwest Oregon.

A substitution, to augment service to Pacific Power and Light Co., the Coos-Curry Electric Cooperative, the Douglas Electric Cooperative, the city of Bandon and the Central Lincoln PUD, is to be built near McKinley.

ate tack, Bridges said his reports indicate "it probably was a local incident" and he expressed hope Russia would soon make a full explanation.

Sen. Monroney (D-Okla.) called it "a cowardly attack" by trigger happy Russians," and Sen. Capehart (R-Ind.) commented "this is an incredible way to start a peace conference."

The U. S. announcement was held up for hurried conferences among officials. Eisenhower talked by phone with State and Defense Department officials here.

Secretary of State Dulles, in San Francisco for a U. N. anniversary celebration, was directed to take up the matter there with Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov. Molotov was quoted that he knew nothing of the incident but would investigate and report back.

He and Dulles met in a private room of the hall where both are attending the 10th anniversary celebration of the U. N.

The first announcement of the incident, and of those steps already taken, came from Eisenhower's press secretary, James C. Hagerly, at Whitefield, N.H., during the President's New England tour. Hagerly called the attack "inexplicable and unwarranted."

The Navy Department, amplifying Hagerly's original announcement, said the Navy plane was attacked by two Soviet MIG-type airplanes "which made one firing round" and set one engine ablaze.

The Navy said patrol flights like the one the Neptune was making have been made regularly for the last year.

The armed forces commander in Alaska, Lt. Gen. Joseph H. Atkinson, said the flights will continue. He called the attack "entirely unwarranted and without provocation of any kind."

Russian Attack On Plane Came Without Warning

KODIAK, Alaska (AP)—The Russian bullets which wounded three U. S. Navy fliers Wednesday noon and forced their patrol bomber to land in flames on a Bering Sea island came without warning.

Four of the 11 men aboard — all of whom escaped with varying but minor burns and wounds — returned here Friday and Lt. Richard H. Fisch of Pittsburgh, Pa., reported there was no opportunity to avoid or return the gunfire.

He said the bullets ripped through the left wing and fuselage, "injuring three men" just as the gunner, Aviation Ordnance Man Donald E. Sonnek of Minnesota Lake, Minn., reported sighting an airplane.

The bullets ripped holes in the wing and set it afire, others tore chunks out of the fuselage and struck three men or whizzed past the heads of the others.

"No one panicked," Fisch said in an interview, and the plane veered sharply east into a cloud, beginning an immediate descent from its 8,000-foot level.

The Russian MIG, so identified by Sonnek, made only one pass and disappeared.

The left engine stopped and a feathered the prop, starting the long pull toward St. Lawrence Island, 40 miles to the northeast. Fisch said, and Aviation Ordnance Man Martin E. Berg, who had been struck by bullets on the left side of his back, kept reporting on its condition despite his wound.

First aid was given Berg and the other two men who had been hit. They were Enns, David G. Ascard of Terryville, Conn., hit on the left hand, and Aviation Technician Edward Benko, Chicago, hit on the left arm.

Meanwhile, the plane's position and condition were radioed to the home base at Kodiak and the plane was brought in for a landing on Tundra at St. Lawrence Island.

"Our bomb bay tank exploded half way through our landing," Fisch said.

"The flames were high and the men were burned on their faces and hands as they escaped through emergency exits. One man broke an ankle diving out of the plane. He thought it was going to explode."
