The tour will begin Sept. 8 and will continue for 32 days of leisurely travel through Holland, Germany, Switzerland, France, Italy and England. An optional extension to Spain and Portugal will be given. The group will return Oct. 9.

Mayo, successful conductor of Mr. Jelski's spring tour. Miss Mayo, a native Oregonian, studied in Europe prior to the war and has also traveled there widely since. Much interest will be added to the trip by the personal interpretations and suggestions Miss Mayo will be able to offer.

The tour group will leave Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 8 for Amsterdam, Holland, where four days will be spent before going to Cologne, Heidelberg, Lucerne, Venice, Florence, Naples, Sorrento, by boat to Isle of Capri, the Blue Grotto, the Funicular and Anacapri, after which the group will go to Rome for several days and then to Nice on the French Riviera, where they will take the "Blue Train," Europe's most famous luxury express train, for Paris for a three-day stay. Five days in London will complete the stay abroad, unless members of the party decide to take the week in Spain and Portugal.
