It was a sweet victory for the locals after having been tacked in an 8-6 upset by this same Riddle team last weekend.

Sunday, the Eagles fell behind 5-0 in the fourth inning, but broke ahead after scoring three runs in the fourth and five more in the fifth.

In the fifth, Keith Weaver opened by taking base after being hit by the pitcher. The scoring came when Phil Teleford singled, Jerry Hennebeck took base on an error, Jim Hennebeck singled, Denny Brundage walked and Reiman tripled home three runs.

Arnie Sowell Snaps Record

BOULDER, Colo. — It appears that Mal Whitfield's reign as Olympic 800-meter champion is over.

King Mal, who won the Olympic race in 1948 and 1952, sat on the sidelines here Saturday as three runners broke the recognized world mark he held jointly with Gunnar Nielsen of Denmark in the 880-yard dash.

Arnie Sowell of the University of Pittsburgh sped home first in the event at the National AAU Track and Field championships here in 1:47, a full second under the world standard.

Tom Courtney of Fordham was runnerup in 1:48 and Billy Tidwell of the Emporia (Kan.) State Teachers third in 1:48.1.

The fourth — pace runner, Lang Stanley of the Army, equalled the record in 1:48.6.

Other record-breaking performances in the 2-day meet included a javelin throw of 290 feet 3 inches by Franklin (Bud) Held of the San Francisco Athletic Club. The toss topped Held's 1954 mark of 249' 8 1/2".

Rod Richard of the Army bettered the old mark of 21.1 seconds in the 220-yard dash around a curve as he negotiated the distance in 21 seconds flat. Art Bragg of Morgan State set the standard last year.

Bob Backus of the New York AC threw the 56-pound weight 43 feet 5 inches, shattering the record he set in 1954 by nearly three feet.

Catholic Priest Fails In Straits

VICTORIA, B. C. — A Roman Catholic priest from Toronto failed Monday in his bid to swim the cold, uncharted, 18-mile Strait of Juan de Fuca. He was the third challenger of the weekend beaten by the Strait.

The Rev. John Donelon of St. Peter's Church was pulled from the water, stiff with cold, at 6:10 a.m. just 2 hours and 27 minutes after starting out from Macaulay Point in suburban Esquimalt.

Father Donelon, a slim, 5-10, 137-pounder, had covered only two miles on the course to Port Angeles, Wash., when he was forced to give up.

He started off at a fast clip, swimming with an overhand crawl at 62 strokes to the minute. His pilot boat picked him up after the frigid water proved too much for him.

Another challenger, 18-year-old Janice White of Toronto, is scheduled to set out for Port Angeles at 4:35 p.m. Monday.

The two swimmers who failed earlier in the weekend to make the crossing were Bert Thomas of Tacoma beaten for the fourth time, and Bill Muir, 36, a Saanich, B. C., surveyor.

Thomas was in the water five hours Sunday and had covered six miles before he had to give up.

Muir was hauled out of the water shortly after midnight Sunday night with leg and hip cramps after making remarkable progress. He had gone nearly 15 miles in three hours.

Virden was the whole show yesterday as the Cardinals swept both ends of a double-header for the first time this year, walloping the New York Giants 9-2 and 7-2. The bespectacled center fielder batted in six runs with a single, two doubles, a triple and home run to boost his average to .324.

Arroyo Wins

Saturday night, Arroyo whipped the Giants for his ninth victory against two losses (both by one-run margins). The Puerto Rican southpaw leads all National League hurlers with a brilliant 2.01 earned run average.

A couple of American League

rookies — New York's Elston Howard and Cleveland's Herb Score — boosted their stock as the Yankees increased their first-place lead to three games with a split against the Indians. Howard singled and scored the insurance run as the Yankees shut out the Indians 2-0 behind Whitey Ford's four-hitter in the nightcap. Early Wynn furnished the Indians with their only victory in the four-game set with a nifty three-hit 6-0 performance in the opener.

Score worked five relief innings in the nightcap and pitched brilliantly. He permitted only one hit, walked two and struck out nine in five innings to boost his strikeout lead to 120.

Extend Lead

The Yankees picked up a full game on the runner-up Chicago White Sox, who saw their five-game winning streak go up in smoke after losing two games to Boston 5-2 and 8-2.

Kansas City handed Baltimore its sixth and seventh straight defeats with 1-0 and 5-2 triumphs. Washington snapped its nine-game losing streak with a smashing 12-4 victory over Detroit after the Tigers had come from behind to win the opener 6-4 in 10 innings.

The Brooklyn Dodgers' huge first-place lead in the National League was cut slightly when Milwaukee shut them out 4-0 behind

Bob Buhl's five-hitter. The runner-

up Chicago Cubs advanced to within 1 1/2 games of the Brooks, splitting their double-header with the Philadelphia Phillies twice 16-5 and 5-0. The Reds made short work of Robin Roberts with three-run rallies in the first and second innings.
