

Impressive List Of Services Revealed In Annual Report Of Local Red Cross Chapter

Douglas County residents joined forces in 1954-55 to compile an impressive listing of service rendered by the county's American Red Cross Chapter.

The report presented at the annual meeting held in Roseburg Friday recently was heard by 55 RC workers and friends from throughout the county. It included such major items as 1,434 pints of blood donated by residents during seven bloodmobile visits; instruction to 363 students in the RC water safety program; handling of 1,437 home service department cases, including aid to 1,109

service men; and introduction of a new program to assist the blind. It showed the chapter has supplied 3,800 c.c. of gamma globulin. Of the total nearly 3,200 c.c.'s have been administered by the health department or distributed to local physicians.

Under home service a grant of nearly \$1,000 was made by the national AHC to help cover expenses of a service man and his family who were involved in a serious accident within the chapter jurisdiction. Expenditures of the chapter for home services totaled \$5,229.90.

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Neuberger Sees Threat To Barge, Tug Operations

WASHINGTON (AP)—Making vessels pay for using inland waterways could "throttle" barge and tug operations on the Columbia River, Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said Monday.

Carey H. Brown, chairman of the Hoover Commission's task force on navigation, hinted recently that the task force may recommend such charges in its forthcoming report.

Brown said fees paid by users of the waterways would make federal expenditures on them "investments rather than expenses."

"The charges should be adequate to reimburse the federal government at least for the cost of maintaining and operating existing improvements. It is also advocated that charges sufficient to retire the capital costs of new undertakings in the field of navigation improvement be borne by those directly benefited."

Neuberger, in his weekly report to his constituents, said the government has improved interior waterways "since the era of George Washington."

"Under free access to federal locks, tonnage moving into the upper Columbia River has rocketed from only 85,715 tons in 1933 to 1,343,575 tons by 1953," he said. "This never could have happened under the Hoover theories for two reasons. In the first place, Bonneville Dam would not have been built under Hoover. Secondly, if it had been built, the so-called 'user charges' at the locks would have been prohibitive."

The senator said both consumers and farmers have benefited as the result of the competition which water navigation has given railroad and truck freight along the Columbia.

The pole crashed into the crowd and Hoyer fell about 55 feet. His wife, who assists him, stood helplessly on the ground holding a useless pull rope.

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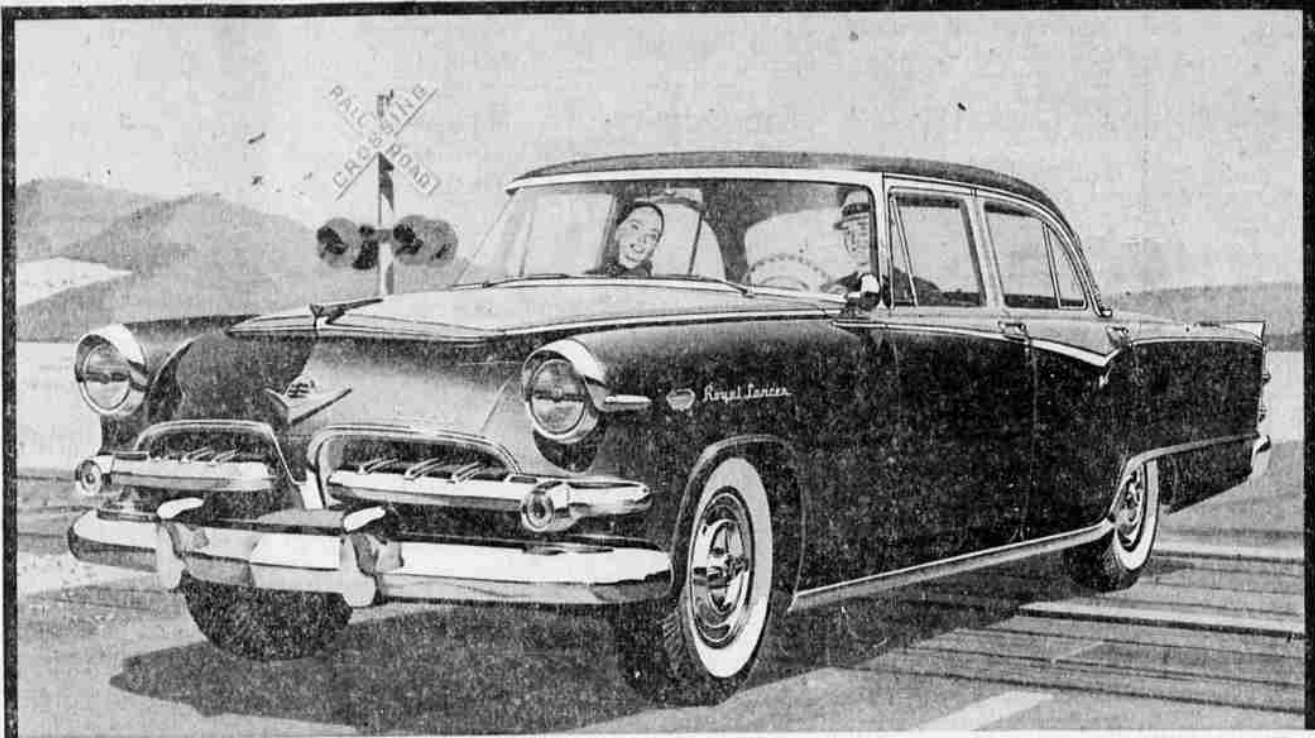
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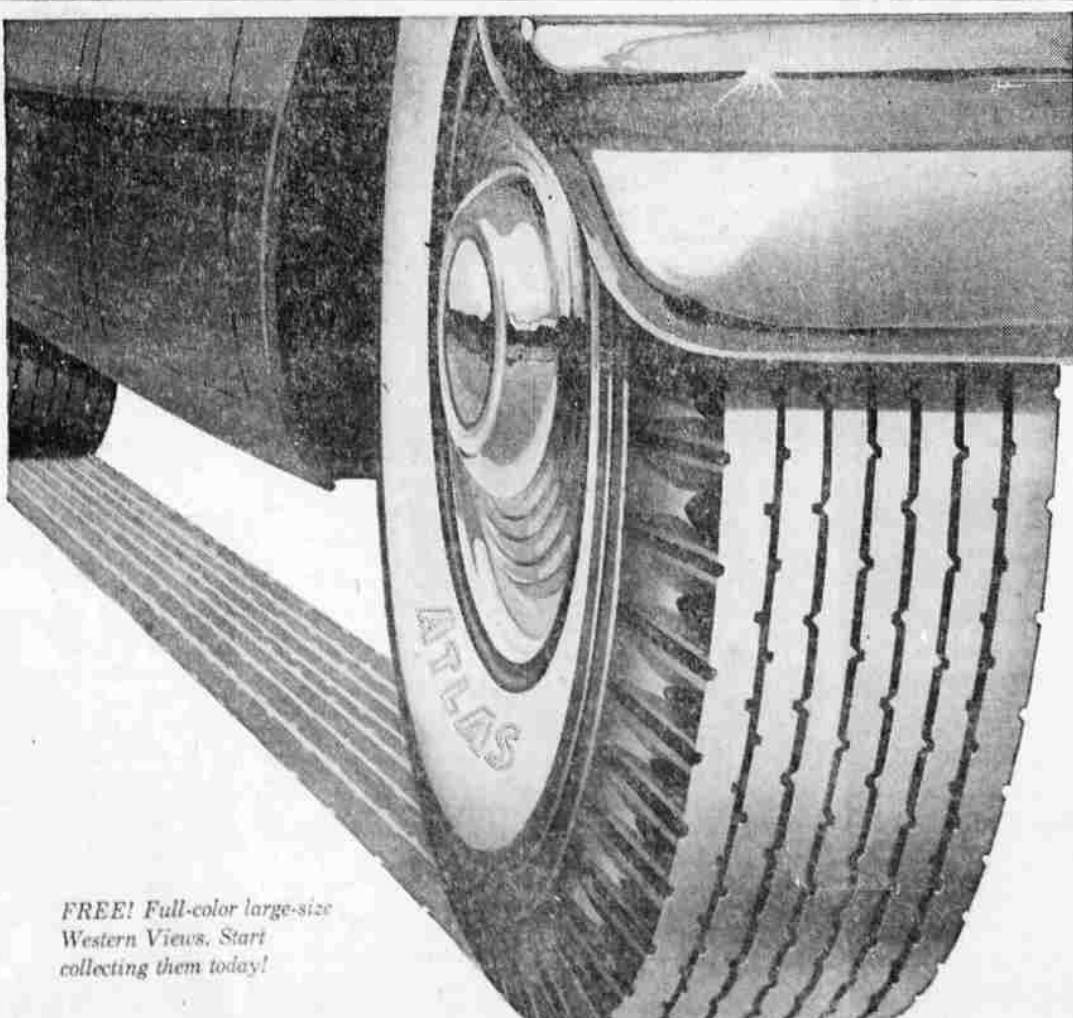
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
