Doris Hart Wins To Reach Semis

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Doris Hart, a former Wimbledon tennis champion and top-seeded player this year, easily won her way into the semi-finals of the Wimbledon championships Tuesday with a 6-4, 6-3 victory over Mrs. Dorothy Head Knode of Alameda, Calif.

Miss Hart from Coral Gables, Fla., won the singles title in 1951.

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Four American women tennis stars, headed by former champions Doris Hart and Louise Brough, swept into the semi-finals of the Wimbledon women's singles division Tuesday with straight set victories.

Mrs. Beverly Baker Fleitz of Santa Monica, Calif., seeded third, completed the quartet with a 6-2, 6-2 victory over Britain's last player, Angela Buxton, after Miss Hart, Miss Brough and Darlene Hard of Long Beach, Calif., had won easily.

The ambidextrous Mrs. Knode, who hits forehand shots from either side, was the fifth-seeded player.

Louise Brough of Beverly Hills, Calif., also a former champion and seeded second to Miss Hart, also won an easy straight set match, beating Beryl Penrose of Australia, 6-2, 6-0.

Yesterday, in the men's singles, Tony Trabert of Cincinnati, defeated defending champion Jaroslav Drobny, Egypt, 8-6, 6-1, 6-4. Budgie Patty, of Los Angeles, upset Australia's Lewis Hoad, 6-4, 6-4.

Bums Win At Same Rate As Last Year.

If it's any consolation to the rest of the National League, Brooklyn is back to normal again. The Dodgers aren't winning any more games these days than they did in the past three seasons.

Trouble is, of course, that the Brooks won the pennant in two of the last three years.

The Dodgers have been playing .730 ball for June. That's about the same winning percentage they enjoyed in 1952, when they won, and in '54, when they lost. They traveled at a .734 clip for June in both years.

Too Slow in '54

Last year it proved too slow a pace. The New York Giants raced along at an .857 clip, taking the lead for good in June.

In '53, the Brooks moved past the Giants into first place during June and had a 3½-game lead at the end of the month. They made it two straight the following year although barely above .500 for June. Neither of the contenders at the time—Milwaukee and St. Louis—did much better, however.

This time, though, the Brooks have that big edge they piled up in April and May to lead the second-place Chicago Cubs by 12½ games. The Cubs, incidentally, have played just .444 ball for the month yet have stayed a half game up on Milwaukee.

The Braves have been winning at a .610 pace—their best June since shifting to Milwaukee—but they've had to come from way back.

Sox Set Pace

In the American league, the second-place Chicago White Sox and the Boston Red Sox have been the winningest teams this month, each with a .705 percentage. They haven't been able to make up for bad start and still have ground to close on the New York Yankees.

The Yanks have been winning at a 2-out-of-3 pace for the month (.667) making sure to grab the big ones. They have a three-game lead on the runner-up White Sox. The Red Sox, much like the Braves in the National, were back in the next county when they started to pick up and are 11 games back.

The Cleveland Indians have their 28 June games and trail the Yanks by six.

By comparison, the Tribe played .690 ball in June when they set the league record with 111 victories last season to take the flag.

No games were scheduled yesterday.

Sidelineer

Although the current seven-team Southern Oregon Baseball League may not have the first and second place power of the Drain and Coos Bay teams of 1953, it is by far a better balanced league and has more top to bottom power than the 1953 edition.

That is the opinion of Roseburg Chief's Manager Hal Zurcher. He is amply supported by a look at the standings.

The Black Sox and Coquille, with identical 6-2 records, would seem to be the power of the circuit. Closely bunched behind them are the remaining five teams. Bend is two games behind in third place and the other four, Grants Pass, Medford, Roseburg and Bandon, are three games down apiece.

ACTUALLY, the best indication of the league's balance has been in individual games. Of this past weekend's six games four were decided by a difference of one run. The remaining two games were decided by the margin of three runs.

The Chiefs have dropped three of their eight games by one run, have lost one by two runs and another by four runs. The last three straight setbacks have been by the one-run margin.

They have won two games by three-run margins and one game by a whopping 16-run difference. ALL OF THIS points out the closeness of this year's race and the capabilities of the local team.

A little improved play at key points in the ball game will make the difference between losing and winning for the Chiefs.

As Manager Zurcher attests: "We are playing good ball, but we need to tighten up a little more defensively."

The Chiefs have strengthened comparatively in keeping with the rest of the teams in the league, since the season began. Additions in the past two weeks include pitcher Ron Whitaker and Dave Gambee, infielders John Ferrell and Tony Arana and outfielder Jerry Waldrup.

Of the other league teams, Coquille has been marked by a greatly strengthened pitching corps. Grants Pass by stronger support afield, Medford and Bend by all-around improvement and addition.

DRAIN, which started the season stronger on paper than the rest of the league, has added only that support which has been necessary, possibly the least of any team in the league, since play began.

The Chiefs found out though last weekend that the Sox can be beaten and Manager Zurcher does not find the Sox' armor impenetrable or infallible.

"They have some weaknesses alright," Zurcher observes, "but on the other hand they're the type of ball club that you can't give a thing — without they're taking advantage of it."

REEDSPORT'S Carl Peterson, infielder for San Diego of the Pacific Coast League, rapped out two hits in only eight appearances at the plate last week for a week-long .250 average. But the mark only cost Peterson one percentage point on his season-long average which now stands at .308.

He has 88 hits in 288 times at bat and has scored 62 runs. He has 16 two-base hits, two triples and one home run and 14 RBI's.

Douglas County's only other PCL entry Glenn Elliott from Myrtle Creek, saw no action during the week for the Portland Beavers.

Mike Coen, Roseburg pitching protegee with Terre Haute in the Three-I League of the Midwest, worked two innings last week without decisions, leaving his season's win-loss record at 1-4. For the two innings he threw last week, Coen pitched hitless ball, walked five and struck out three.

DECISION SOON

Agganis' Death Mourned Today

BOSTON (AP) — An outwardly-hardened sports world was shocked and saddened Tuesday by the unexpected death of Harry Agganis, the "Golden Greek" who passed up tempting pro football offers for a baseball career with the Boston Red Sox.

The brilliant athletic career of the 25-year-old Red Sox first baseman and former Boston University football great was closed out abruptly Monday as he succumbed to a long ailment at Santa Maria Hospital in nearby Cambridge.

A fierce competitor on the playing field but a happy-go-lucky type when not in action, Agganis apparently had been making a successful recovery from his second bout with a virus infection since mid-May.

The news of his death stunned the entire sports world and messages expressing sympathy and shock poured in from all sections of the country.

The "Golden Greek", so called for his glittering performances in baseball, football and basketball while a student, was hospitalized for 10 days in May, but returned to the lineup and played in two games at Chicago June 1 and 2. He was stricken again while in Kansas City June 5 and flew home to enter the hospital.

On June 6 it was announced he was suffering from virus pneumonia in the right lung. Dr. Eugene E. O'Neil said then that Agganis apparently started playing too soon after his first hospitalization and "this time will wait longer before returning to the Red Sox."

Doctors said in a statement they believed his death was due to "a massive pulmonary embolism." A loose definition would be death caused by a clot or obstruction in the flow of blood in the lung.
